President's Report

Although I will never tire of the beautiful sunrises, I am sure many of you are tired of reading about the CC&R and By-law changes. But a ballot was mailed to all residents on April 19, 2018, and we need you to vote to complete the process. A copy of all the documents is available on the HOA website.

There are four items on the ballot for your consideration. After many comments from residents, the Board decided to present the following four items for a vote:

- 1. Item 1 includes all the proposed changes to remove Pulte from the documents where applicable, and all changes required because of new state laws. If item 1 passes, then the CC&Rs and By-laws listed would become the current documents. Since Pulte is no longer here, it seemed responsible to remove them from the documents wherever possible. The other changes are changes that are required because of changes in the law. If item 1 passes, the documents will become clearer without Pulte being listed where applicable and, since we must implement new laws anyway, the documents would reflect that which is required by law.
- 2. Item 2 is a vote to remove term limits on committee members. Currently, there is a two-term limit on committee members. Some have felt that some committee members should stay longer if they are willing because of their expertise. A vote in favor of this item supports removing term limits.
- 3. Item 3 is a vote to remove cumulative voting for Board member elections. Currently the HOA uses cumulative voting every other year in the election process when three Board positions are up for election. When only two positions are up for election, regular voting is used. In regular voting

- you may not put more than one vote to any one candidate. In cumulative voting, you may put more than one vote to any one candidate. This is the difference between the two voting methods.
- 4. Item 4 is to change the minimum rental period from 90 days to 45 days. It will also remove the language, which allows homeowners to rent for less than 90 days, if they use a management company to rent their homes. Current language allows homeowners to use a management company and rent for as little as one day. So, if this item passes, no resident will be able to rent their home for less than 45 days, and there will be no more exceptions.

These are the four items to vote on for the changes to the CC&Rs and By-laws. It is important that all homeowners vote so we can conclude this process, which began about three years ago. The HOA has spent over \$40,000 on the process to update our governing documents so they are more concise and easier to read. We need everyone to vote so this effort is not wasted. Homeowners may mail back their ballots or place them in one of the ballot boxes located near the reception desks at each of the clubhouses. If you need another ballot, for any reason, please contact the HOA office and we can provide one to you. We are trying to complete this process by November 13. So please send in the ballots right away.

If you have questions, please let me know or contact other Board members or staff.

Once you send in your ballot, take a break and watch the beautiful sunset, and once again we can all understand and say, "It doesn't get any better than this."

Do You Really Understand What's Coming?

Inland southern California is graced with spectacular scenery and diverse communities. Those lucky enough to live among the mountains, valleys, and deserts know how breathtaking the area can be. This region has been fashioned by tremendous geologic forces and, like all of California, is earthquake country. Understanding the risks and preparing to survive and recover can help keep your family safe.

Most people in inland southern California live less than 10 miles from a fault that can have a damaging earthquake. A large part of the population lives along the most potentially damaging fault of all – the infamous San Andreas. We in SCSH, however, live within a mile of the fault. It slices through the region, having the potential to produce a devastating earthquake. Nearby faults such as the San Jacinto fault create smaller, yet more frequent earthquakes.


Life After a Big Quake

These earthquakes will disrupt services like electricity, water, and sewer and may limit access into and out of the region. Fire and police departments will be dealing with the most serious situations and may be unable to respond quickly to issues in our community. Government assistance may not be available or insufficient to replace your damaged belongings or repair your home. Good news! Preparing now will give you confidence that you and your family will stay safe where and when the earth shakes.

The inland southern California area is highly susceptible to earthquakes and earthquake-related effects. The two most active faults in California run through the most populated areas of the region, and the

likelihood of a very large earthquake in this area is higher than almost any other place in the state.

Designed for the original ShakeOut in 2008, the ShakeOut Scenario portrays a magnitude 7.8 earthquake along the southern San Andreas fault. Much more can still be learned in preparing for such a large earthquake! The Scenario is a product of the United States Geological Survey, Multi-Hazard Demonstration Project, led by Dr. Lucy Jones.



The driving force of earthquakes in California is movement along the San Andreas Fault and the many associated faults within the San Andreas Fault System that form the tectonic boundary between the Pacific and North American tectonic plates. The San Andreas Fault is the most active in the contiguous United States, but the fault has not ruptured in this southern section for over 300 years. The ShakeOut Scenario describes what

may happen when a large earthquake on the fault finally happens again (which could be today).

Yet, while the San Andreas Fault is the longest and fastest moving fault in the state, it is by no means the only one to be concerned about. Many other faults are found directly beneath our cities in some of the most densely populated areas. The San Jacinto Fault is the second fastest moving fault in California and, in combination with the San Andreas, it accommodates most of the relative movement along the plates in southern California. Also, the Eastern California Shear Zone in the western portion of the Mojave Desert is an area of multiple faults that has produced large earthquakes, including the magnitude 7.3 Landers earthquake in 1992 and the magnitude 7.1 Hector Mine earthquake in 1999. Because of their location in a less populated part of San Bernardino County, these quakes caused relatively little damage.

People in the inland southern California area have special concerns that might not be relative to other areas. Many people cross the San Andreas Fault when traveling between home and work. During a major earthquake, freeways may be broken and take days or weeks to repair, making it difficult or impossible to return home.

In addition to damage caused directly by ground shaking and related ground failure, other hazards such as fires can easily start during and shortly after an earthquake. Fires may spread quickly in densely built neighborhoods (consider our North CV winds!), enabling them to sustain for long periods, spread over large areas and, due to broken water pipes and the number of ignitions, simply overwhelm the abilities of firefighters to control them. On the other hand, earthquakes occurring during periods of heavy rain can produce destructive and life-threatening, slurry-like debris flows that originate on the steep slopes and gullies of the many rugged mountain areas. And these can flow into adjacent communities.



Earthquake Shaking Potential, Inland Southern California Area

Large earthquakes anywhere in the inland southern California area can affect you, even if the shaking is not strongly felt where you happen to be. Consider what might happen to the nation's economy if the freeways and railroads passing through the Cajon and Banning Passes were put out of commission, and the normal flow of goods were to be disrupted. What if a freeway overpass along your commute were to be heavily damaged or destroyed? How would you find drinking water if subsurface supply pipes were broken? We all must consider these and other plausible scenarios that can happen at any time and take measures that would minimize their impacts.

Since you live in the inland southern California area, it is likely that a damaging earthquake will occur and affect you during your lifetime. You decide your fate. You decide your future. The steps you take now can mean the difference between your success or failure after the next big quake. Start now!

Work Completed

The FAC continues its work with management and the Board on behalf of the Association including:

- Review and recommend Board approval of the unaudited August 2018 financial statements of the Association including the:
 - Financial statements prepared by DRM and Troon to be posted to the Residents Only section of the website.
 - Combined financial statements of the Association presented in the Treasurer's report to be posted to the Residents Only section of the website.
 - Variance analysis of Operating Fund revenue and expense accounts prepared by the Controller.
 - Variance analysis of revenue and expense accounts prepared by Troon for golf and F&B operations.
 - Summary financial information on financial positions and results of operations included in the Controller's report to be posted to the Residents Only section of the website.
 - Condensed financial information of the Association to be published in The View.
- Review and recommend approval of the 2018 Forecast including eight months of actual results and four months of forecasted results with comparison to the 2018 Budget and the prior 2018 Forecast.
- Review of historical rates of collection of assessments receivable and evaluation of allowance for potentially uncollectible assessments receivable.

- Proposing written recommendation for approval of policy for establishment and maintenance of allowance for potentially uncollectible assessments receivable – FAC BAF 2018 #15 submitted to the Board for approval.
- Review and recommend Board approval of the engagement letter for the 2018 audit and the preparation of the 2018 tax returns FAC BAF 2018 #19 submitted to the Board for approval.
- FAC regular meeting on September 21, 2018.
- Preparation of the FAC monthly written report to the Board for its meeting on September 24, 2018.

Safety Advisory Committee

As we welcome our residents back for the season, it is important that the Safety Advisory Committee update our community on what has transpired over the last few months.

Unfortunately, in July and August we had a series of thefts from vehicles, some malicious mischief incidents, and a vehicle that was stolen.

While we live in a gated community that is relatively safe, we are not immune from those who come into our community to commit crimes. We have a very effective security force, but they are limited by law in what they can do. We can all support their efforts by making it more difficult for any of us to be victimized.

We are not the only community that has been targeted. Sun City Palm Desert and gated communities to our north and east have been victimized much more than we have.

During the month of July, we had 140 incidents of garage doors left open and unattended for extended periods of time. This is an open invitation for a crime of opportunity. Security will contact a homeowner to advise them of the situation regardless of the time of day. Please do not get upset with security when they

do so. They are looking out for you and your property.

Over the Fourth of July, there were approximately eight incidents in which unlocked vehicles left in driveways were entered and items were taken.

On August 13 a resident reported going out to his garage at approximately 4:45 am and finding a young man there. The resident had left his garage partly open. If residents want to leave a garage door open for air circulation, a height of three to five inches is sufficient. This allows for air movement but is not big enough to allow entry.

That same morning, two residents reported their unlocked vehicles parked in their driveways were entered and property stolen.

Additionally, that same date a resident left his vehicle in the driveway unlocked with the smart key left in the vehicle. It was subsequently stolen.

As one can see, these incidents could have been prevented. Please be aware of what you do with your homes and property, and don't make it easy to be a victim. Let's all maintain the safest community that we can.

Loma Linda University Children's Health — Indio (Jill and Barry Golden Pavilion)

March 12 was a significant day for all children in the Coachella Valley. This was the day the Loma Linda University Children's Health in the Jill and Barry Golden Pavilion (82-934 Civic Center Drive, Indio) opened its doors "bringing hope and healing to kids and their families."

Now 135,000 children in the Coachella Valley have access to comprehensive primary care, acute care, specialty team centers, emergency care, and so much more. For expectant mothers there is also a Total Care Birth Center including a Neo-Natal ICU.

Loma Linda University Children's Hospital (LLUCH) is a not-for-profit health care system serving children, especially the vulnerable and

those living in poverty. The hospital works with community leaders, organizations, and agencies to improve the overall wellbeing of area children.

In 1999, the Big Hearts for Little Hearts Guild (BHLH) was formed to support and enhance medical care at LLUCH in Loma Linda. As the organization's membership and activities expanded, they created four chapters of the Guild.

We are proud to say that SCSH resident Rhona Bader is now membership chair and former president. During her 2017-2018 presidency, Guild membership increased from 115 to 174.

The members and supporters of the Desert Guild, founded in 2005, are "committed to supporting the children hospitalized at LLUCH by developing programs and projects that address the critical needs of children and their families." Rhona's dream is to support medical care for all children in the Coachella Valley through the LLUCH in Indio.

The BHLH Guild has raised over \$4.5 million in 13 years. The men and women in the Guild organize events throughout the year such as cooking demonstrations and lunches at places like Ristorante Mamma Gina and Bellatrix; luncheon fashion shows; and the big event of the year, "Girls, Guys, and Giving," with fashion boutiques plus silent and live auctions. Rhona and her volunteers work hard planning these fundraising events. The money they raise has paid for playrooms, adolescent floors, Pediatric ICU and Pediatric Cardia ICU, and equipment such as a portable ECG machine. Lending your time, talent, financial support, or skills to this worthwhile organization will help the little children who really need your assistance.

Guild members interact with the patients and their families through "Hugs Help Healing" activities like the twice-a-year "Build a Bear" event and the "Santa Stroll," which brings every child a bear plus a cuddly blanket along with socks for the mother. The "Bunny Hop" is new this year. Guild volunteers will distribute little

stuffed animals to all the children. The Guild also funds the "Bottomless Bookshelf" which encourages children to take, read, and keep its books.

Rhona truly believes that happy, healthy children accomplish more — and they are our future.

After we moved to the city, things were never the same. Because I was a poor kid, I went door-to-door "trick or treating" on Thanksgiving, too. That was great because a lot of people gave me turkey legs and pie.

As the years went on and I married, we loved Halloween and enjoyed the little kids coming to our front door. I

certainly scared my share of little kids until someone


The band members joke that they played in garage bands as teenagers, and now it has come full circle: they are once again rehearing in the garage, although lately they have moved to the


The "Dancing Lady" Has a Dream to Share with You!



What Makes Shadow Hills High School "Unique?"

On Thursday, August 23, nearly 30,000 public school students in our area returned to classes for the new school year. Desert Sands Unified School District (DSUSD) is responsible for educating these students. The district runs 18 elementary schools, one charter elementary school, six middle schools, one charter middle school, four comprehensive high schools, two continuation high schools, one alternative education school, one early childhood learning center, and two district preschools.

Did you know, though, that many high school students in DSUSD can choose which institution they'd prefer to attend? Now, there's a switch from "back in the day."

One of the reasons they can do this is the Career Technical Education program, or "CTE," which is rather unique to DSUSD. When we were in high school all those years ago, CTE may simply have been called "shop" – classes in which skills of automotive repair, wood and metal working, and perhaps (if you were fortunate) mechanical drawing were taught, mostly to male students.


DSUSD's closest comprehensive high school is Shadow Hills High School (SHHS), at the corner of Jefferson Street and Avenue 39, home of the "Knights." As you may remember from past issues of *The View*, several SCSH residents volunteer there in a variety of ways: Pete Anderson with the California Cadet Corps, and Chris Bryant with "Knights of the Roundtable."

SHHS students are eligible to select from several CTE programs, just like at other DSUSD comprehensive

high schools. Palm Desert High offers a health careers academy; La Quinta High, a culinary pathway; and Indio High, health and nutritional science, animal science, and ornamental horticulture pathways.

If they qualify, students at SHHS can enroll in a wide variety of CTE courses including an aviation academy, engineering and design, an emergency management academy, technology and landscape management, and education. This is, of course, in addition to an academic track of traditional college preparatory courses of English, math, science, history, and foreign languages. Last year, 350 SHHS students out of the total population of 2,180 were enrolled in CTE courses. And there was a 100 percent graduation rate for the students enrolled in these CTE programs.

Assistant Principal Leslie Wells, a 20-year-plus veteran secondary education instruction in California, has been managing the CTE programs. Aviation is the most visible pathway and has been available to SHHS students for more than three years. The program was established because there is currently a shortage of commercial pilots and aviation mechanics; so these are the two core areas of preparation. Fortunately, the aviation program has partnered with Bermuda Dunes Airport; and that facility offers internships for a handful of the roughly 85 SHHS aviation students. Esteban ("Steve") Ramos is the teacher who runs the aviation program, and openings on an aviation advisory council Ramos established last spring may be available for interested and qualified SCSH residents.

Also focusing on areas in which jobs exist is the technology and landscape management program, TLM was established because over 230 golf courses exist in the Coachella Valley area. TLM is the oldest and strongest academy at SHHS. It is funded by a grant called the California Partnership Academy. Unfortunately, 50 percent of the students in TLM are considered "at risk." Gonzales has nearly 150 students under his wing, learning not only landscaping science but also basic woodworking. Each student must be capable of constructing various nursery bins and storage items while in an internship program or, later, on the job. Paul Mendoza assists Gonzalez in this CTE pathway.

Thirty students are enrolled in engineering and computer science. Under the leadership of Derek Orkney, a part-time engineer, they learn the basics of computer science and robotics. Many can move on to college courses in coding and programming upon graduation.

A CTE pathway also prepares students for several positions in elementary, middle, and even secondary school classrooms that do not require a four-year college degree. The program, led by Ms. Cristine Gilbert, equips students to be classroom aides and paraeducators after they complete a two-year college degree program in the same field. Nearly 100 students are enrolled in this pathway.

An Emergency Management Academy (EMA) program will also begin in the school year 2018-2019. SCSH resident Jeff Kirkpatrick has served as an advisor to assist in developing and rolling out this program. Like all the CTE programs, this will be a three-year sequence, starting in 10th grade. The EMA will focus on emergency response and touch upon law enforcement, fire science, homeland security, and emergency medical treatment. All students in the academy are expected to become CPR certified and can earn basic EMT certification by the time they graduate.

Myriad choices and opportunities exist for students at SHHS thanks to CTE and its dedicated teachers and administrators. Clearly, today's public high school educational experience – as most SCSH residents remember it – has vastly changed, and all to the good.

Antique Photos Are His Specialty

If you know SCSH resident Tony Davis, you may have first encountered him at the Opera or Paddle Tennis clubs. He founded and was president of both, which through no fault of his own, no longer exist. But then, one of Tony's real passions deals with keeping alive times, places, and people that no longer exist. He is an antique photo collector.

Actually, by his definitions, Tony is not just a collector. "If you collect systemically and with forethought, you are a collector. If you buy everything that is out there you are a hoarder," maintains Tony. He admits to being a little of both and also a seller of antique photography. Interestingly enough, Tony got into that business to promote another business.

Thirty years ago he and his wife, Judie, decided on selling antique textiles. Tony's idea to promote sales at antique shows was to buy photos showing how the garments looked on people of more than 100 years ago (primarily Japanese). The problem was his display photos were often drawing more attention than the textiles.

Tony remembers, "People would come up to me and ask, 'How much are the photographs?' After months of saying, 'They are not for sale,' I put some prices on the photos figuring buyers would now know how much to pay, and I wouldn't annoy them by saying they couldn't. The photos sold, all of them."

So, Tony bought a few more with the same results. Photographs were doing better than textiles. Ultimately, the Davises sold off their textiles inventory and put all the money into antique photos. As a result, Tony has amassed some amazing works, including the only three of Krakatoa's deadly volcanic eruption of 1883, taken by a sailor on a ship fleeing the area.

Likewise, Tony has seen valuable collections most haven't and probably never will. As a volunteer at the Getty Research Institute in Los Angeles, he had access to the archive vaults. While amazed, Tony also witnessed a reality, "Maybe 5 to 10 percent of a collection goes on display at any one time. Institutions would love to show everything, but they don't have the space or staff. It's a great pity."

Sometimes it is who you know that creates an "in" to a rare and historic collection. Such was the case for Tony, who made the acquaintance of a person who became the curator of the Queen of England's private collection. After months of government security protocols and scrutiny, Tony and Judie were allowed into the Queen's private quarters at Windsor Castle for only about two hours. What they saw still thrills Tony.

"Everything in the collection was absolutely pristine and immaculate. The first album I chose was a presentation album the Czar of Russia gave to Queen Victoria. It previously had been opened just once. The photos of every member of the Russian Royal Family were large format, probably 12" x 15." Each photo looked like it was taken yesterday," Tony recalled.

Some things you should know about Tony. He was born and raised in London, England, and specializes in collecting 19th century photos of India. "The architecture is fascinating — buildings constructed in the 12th, 13th, or 14th century and still standing. It's photography of a bygone era. I am also interested in photos depicting people around the world in their natural habitat and national costume or lack thereof," Tony said.

Now, if you are interested in collecting antique photos, Tony wants to point out you can only go back as far as circa 1826/1827. That's when French photographer Joseph Nicéphore Niépce took the first known, surviving camera photo, an almost undistinguishable view of the scene outside his workroom window that is on permanent display at the University of Texas, Austin. However, photography did not become an official art and used widely until Louis Daguerre announced his process, a non-negative image on a metal plate, called a Daguerreotype, on January 22, 1839.

You may recognize Tony as president of the Writers Club. Writing is another of his passions. He has three published books. Ironically, only the latest about his favorite photographer, *The Love of Nature: The Life of Photographer Samuel Bourne*, deals with photography.

Some valuable advice Tony passes on to would-be antique photo collectors:

"Old family photos of people you can't identify are usually not valuable."

"Don't buy an antique photo unless you like it. Bottom line — could you live with it hanging on your wall?"



Soon Tony will be re-publishing The Love of Nature: The Life of Photographer Samuel Bourne to include some of Bourne's picturesque photos of India's bygone era.

We have all heard the phrase "you can't go home again" – a bittersweet warning that our own memories of the past are often so different than current reality that we are likely to be disappointed.

I first saw Budapest as a 19-year-old college student spending a year studying abroad. I was struck by the city's majestic site on the Danube River, at one of the waterway's widest points. And I marveled at the exotic nature of the Hungarian language plus the mix of cultures that I discovered.

But what was it like for our neighbor Alex Nagy to return this summer to his hometown for only the second time in more than 60 years? In November 1956, at age 15, Alex had fled Budapest with his parents and sister as Soviet soldiers moved in brutally to crush a fledgling Hungarian uprising against Communist rule. Alex recalls that the family traveled by night, in freezing weather and on foot, until they could cross into Austria.

From there, passing through several refugee camps, Alex and his family reached England and eventually Canada, where the Canadian government paid their passage and settled them in Vancouver, BC. The family worked at agricultural jobs in orchards to make ends meet. Alex learned English, attended high school and then the university, and earned an engineering degree that made him attractive to Boeing as the "space race" with the former Soviet Union spun up in the 1960s. Boeing made him a generous offer for a job in Seattle upon graduation.

But it had been a long road and, although Alex had only distant relatives who remained in Hungary with whom he had no contact, still, his roots were there. During the Communist era, particularly because of the sensitive work he was doing for Boeing, Alex knew it was inadvisable for him to travel there. But in 1997, nearly 40 years after he left and about eight years after "Socialism" collapsed in Hungary, Alex returned to Budapest by train from Vienna with his wife, Diane, and their 14-year-old son.

Understandably, the trip brought on a lot of mixed emotions. Customs officials and soldiers with dogs had stopped and closely searched the train at the border. During their stay, Alex felt vaguely that he was "being watched by the government." And he worried that what



he would discover in the current day would eclipse his fond memories of growing up in Budapest's beautiful downtown area. But the city's core had been beautifully reconstructed – if for no other reason than to promote tourism – and Alex found the city crowded and bustling, "just like it used to be."

Fortunately, his sister had stayed in touch with a female friend who remained in Budapest with whom Alex connected. The friend's husband was a true history buff and happy to act as their tour guide, so Alex and his family were able to visit a number of historical and cultural sites.

But one of the biggest highlights for Alex was returning to the apartment where he grew up. It was in an elegant, mid-rise building only four blocks from the Danube; a graceful, arched entryway crowned with lovely mosaic tiles led to a beautiful central courtyard. Alex's family lived in the rear, on the third floor away from the main street, because (as he recalls) the rent was cheaper. Even though the building had an elevator (barely big enough to accommodate two "very friendly" people), Alex and his family never used it because they had to pay the superintendent to operate it.

The current occupants of the apartment most graciously allowed Alex to visit inside. He recalls it was just as he remembered it, "only it seemed a lot smaller!"

Alex also found everything in his neighborhood just as it had been: a pharmacy, a grocery store, his grade school. Only his favorite "street food" was missing, a deep-fried bread dough generously rubbed with garlic.

Another highlight was visiting Margaret Island, in the middle of the Danube, a huge park with a swimming pool, hot springs and thermal baths dating to Roman times, and tennis courts where Alex used to work as a ball boy.

Alex and his family explored the city just like he did as a boy, on trams and streetcars. Back in the day, his family could not even afford to buy him a bicycle, let alone could they own a car. But Alex remembers there were still occasional luxuries. His mother somehow managed to afford a season pass to the opera; and he occasionally got to stand in the wings because a classmate's mother furnished props for the performances.

Now, fast-forward to more than 20 years later: in May 2018, Alex and Diane again traveled to Budapest, the starting point for a river cruise they booked. This time, they arrived by air at the capital's airport, located far outside the city. On the drive to their downtown hotel, they passed many dilapidated Communist-era buildings. Alex was sad to see that many people are still living in these crumbling conditions even though the city's downtown is beautiful and prosperous.

As we concluded the interview for this story, Alex and Diane already were excitedly making plans to visit Budapest again – this time to stay for a few weeks so they can explore other parts of Alex's beautiful homeland.

Sometimes, then, it seems you can go home again after all! In Alex's words, "You should go back. It is where you are from...you cannot deny it, and you should not...it is an important part of who you are." If you are going to take the grandchildren, though, Alex advises to do it "when they are old enough to understand and remember, but not too old to be embarrassed about traveling with their grandparents" – as with their own son, the early teen years seem best.

My wife, Kathy, is a super gal and a soup'r gal. Sometimes the universe sends your life in an unexpected but wonderful direction. That was the case for Kathy and me, now nearly 30 years ago, when we were living in Oregon.

In 1990, the United Nations went into Cambodia after the Khmer Rouge generation had been nearly eliminated and found an astounding number of orphans living in horrible conditions. One of the American doctors working in the refugee camps in Cambodia started an adoption program, and the desperate situation of the orphans touched Kathy's heart. With only 48 hours' notice, Kathy was suddenly off to Southeast Asia to pick up our two new boys. I stayed behind to take care of our two older sons (Matthew and Paul), the house, the dogs, and the job.

As Kathy navigated through the Bangkok airport weary after her 24-hour flight, she overheard a small grandmotherly woman with a Texas lilt in her voice mention Hotel Reno, the headquarters for the adoption program. Kathy walked up and introduced herself. Whether it was fate or the hand of a divine power, Kathy had met "Aunt Lou," the mother of the American doctor's girlfriend, who was in the country to help with the adoptions. They shared a taxi to their hotel, finally arriving at their room about 2:30 in the morning.

At 6 am, there was a frantic "bang, bang, bang" on the door. Bleary eyed, Kathy opened it; and hotel staff handed her two infants with no paperwork, no supplies, and no idea of what would happen next. These were not the five-year old kids that Kathy was expecting! It seems that Thai Airways refused to allow 25 children onto the plane unless each one was accompanied by an adult, and

the adoption workers were scrambling to find passengers willing to take a strange baby on the flight out of Cambodia to Thailand.

Meanwhile, dizzy from lack of sleep and confused about what to do with these kids, Kathy and Aunt Lou finally made their way to the American Embassy in Bangkok with the babies to get the local paperwork started. Street merchants were very leery

of them saying "Thai baby?" until it was clarified that they were Cambodian infants. Then the merchants were very helpful and guided the troupe to the embassy (and to the local McDonalds, which had an Asian garden in the middle of the dining area).

Once she finished at the embassy, Kathy returned to her hotel room and was about to open the door when it was swung open by an energetic child whom she recognized to be our "Sidon." A dozen unruly and rambunctious orphans were running all over her room, jumping on beds, and playing with the lights and the bathroom fixtures. None of these kids had ever experienced electric lights, running water, or toilets. Chaos reigned through the day until all the orphans made it out of Cambodia. Finally, Kathy was united with our second son, "Vandy."

Ten days later, weary and now ill, Kathy flew across the Pacific with our two sons and a baby, who was to be delivered in San Francisco. When she arrived in Oregon, I took her directly to the emergency room, where our brand new boys were excited to play with all the fancy "shiny" equipment and bounce around the exam room. Today, one adopted son, Anthony Sidon, is working in the Alaskan schools, and Patrick Vandy is a realtor in Oregon and Washington. Later we adopted two foster girls, but that is another story.

For 20 years, Kathy played social bridge with friends in Corvallis. This was a "boomers" group and consisted of professors from Oregon State University and engineers from Hewlett Packard, all competitive and competent players. After she retired, Kathy took up bridge competitively, traveling all over the country to play in tournaments, achieving the rank of "Life Master."

Living in Sun City Shadow Hills with me and our dog, Louie (the lovable, leaping Labradoodle), Kathy quilts with Needles & Pins, tastes wines with Tutta Bella Vino, takes Zumba and aqua fitness classes, and enjoys friends at the dog park.

Most of all, though, Kathy, loves to cook for a crowd. A vegetarian, she wears gloves when she has to touch raw





meat (uggghh!). Our kids tell horror stories about the time she made 20 meatloaves and froze them, forcing the clan to eat a meatloaf a week for two semesters. None of them has made or has eaten meatloaf since.

Last spring, our SCSH Bridge Club asked me to teach an intermediate bridge class called "Soup'r Declarer Play," and Kathy agreed to cook for the 32 students. Next was split pea with ham and apricot lentils. Then it was beef chorizo chili and roasted tomato citrus. Finally, the class enjoyed won ton and Chinese vegetable soups.

Without fear of contradiction, I can say that Kathy's culinary efforts were the highlight of the class. In a thank you card, attendees wrote "to our favorite chef," "great soup," "thank you for your efforts," "awesome food," and "fantastic soup and desserts."

Indeed, she is a super gal in so many ways!

The Benefits of Yoga

"The purpose of yoga is to create strength, awareness, and harmony in both the mind and body," explains Natalie Nevins, DO, a board-certified osteopathic family physician and certified yoga instructor.

Physical Benefits

"The relaxation techniques incorporated in yoga can lessen chronic pain, such as lower back pain, physical benefits of yoga include:

- increased flexibility
- increased muscle strength and tone
- improved respiration, energy and vitality
- maintaining a balanced metabolism
- weight reduction
- · cardio and circulatory health
- improved circulation and mental acuity
- better sleep efficiency
- improved athletic performance
- protection from injury

Mental Benefits

Aside from the physical benefits, one of the best benefits of yoga is how it helps a person manage stress, which is known to have devastating effects on the body and mind.

"Stress can reveal itself in many ways, including back or neck pain, sleeping problems, headaches, inflammation, and an inability to concentrate," says Dr. Nevins. "Yoga can be very effective in developing coping skills and reaching a more positive outlook on life."

Yoga's incorporation of meditation and breathing can help improve a person's mental well-being.

"Regular yoga practice creates mental clarity and calmness; increases body awareness; relieves chronic stress patterns; relaxes the mind; centers attention; and sharpens concentration," says Dr. Nevins. Body and self-awareness are particularly beneficial, she adds,

"because they can help with early detection of physical problems and allow for early preventive action."

Yoga and Breath

The breath is Prana or vital force. Our body requirements of oxygen or pranic energy change depending on our actions. Pranayama breathing focuses on breath techniques to further enhance the Asanas (physical practice).

A simple breathing exercise technique is to inhale for a count of four, hold the breath for four seconds (breath retention), then slowly and deeply exhale for a count of six.
