Any of the Association staff should be able to direct your question to the proper staff member so that your questions are answered in a timely manner.

The heat of the summer is in full bloom so remember to take those extra precautions to stay cool and hydrated as well as look at ways to be more energy efficient in your home. Below are a few suggestions:

- Turn it up. Set your thermostat as high as possible. Start with 78 degrees when at home and 85 degrees when away. For each degree above 72 you set the thermostat, you save between 1-3 percent. Be sure to take into consideration your health and comfort, and drink plenty of fluids to stay hydrated.
- Circulate air. Use fans to create cool breezes and keep the air moving in your home. Ceiling fans, in particular, can create enough air movement to make it cooler by at least four degrees. This could translate into a significantly lower monthly electric bill, as ceiling fans only use about as much energy as a 100-watt light bulb.
- Shut the shades. Windows allow a lot of heat into your home. Keep drapes and shades closed during the day to keep the temperature down.

- Wash and dry wisely. Run only full loads when using your dishwasher or washing machine. Whenever possible, run those appliances during off-peak hours or when your air conditioner is turned off or barely running, which typically is during the evening, to save energy. Use the clothes dryer's moisture-sensing automatic drying setting if it has one, and clean your clothes dryer's lint trap after each use.
- Unplug. Electronics – such as TVs, DVDs, chargers, computers, printers, and other devices – use electricity even when they are turned off. By unplugging these devices when you're not using them, you only save a few watts, but they quickly add up to bigger savings over time. Use a power strip for multiple devices, and switch it off before you go to bed. Also, turn off lights in unoccupied rooms.
- Plan pool time. If you have a pool, shorten the operating time if possible. Switch the pool filter and sweeper operations to off-peak hours and during nighttime if the pool has automatic cleaning settings.

In addition to the steps that you can do to save on energy, you can stay cool by joining activities in the Montecito Clubhouse. Not only will you have fun and meet new friends, you may learn a new craft or game and stay cool in the process. Or you can join your friends and neighbors at the Café for Happy Hour or a quick bite to eat. We look forward to seeing you all around Montecito.

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Employee of the Month July 2012



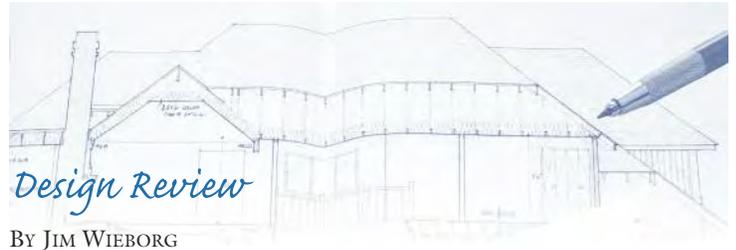
Jim Tapia

August Answers

We are in the heat of the summer, so remember to adjust the timing of your irrigation system accordingly. It is important to check your plants in the late afternoon to see if they are getting enough water. If your plants are drooping – too little water; if the ground around the plant is very wet – too much water. Talk to your neighbors to get an idea of how much time they are watering their plants. Also, it is a good idea to split your irrigation timing into three separate run times to give the water a chance to soak into the soil.

If you plan to change anything on the outside of your house or in your front or back yard, you must submit a Home Improvement Application to the Design Review Committee for approval prior to commencing work. Repainting your garage door the existing color does not require an application, only when making a change. If you are unsure, the HOA staff will tell you if an application is necessary.

Desert plants grow the most during the heat of the summer. They can get out of control quickly, so it is a good idea to do a couple of small trimmings during the summer. Remove dead and crossing or rubbing branches first. Trim back branches that are too long for the shape of the tree. Remove suckers from the trunk and branches. Removing some of the “sail” from your tree will help in windy conditions.

Golf Course Contract

- The Board has extended the Billy Casper contract for 18 months

“What now?” That was the question which presented itself soon after my retirement from the stress and vinegar of my career at Kaiser Permanente in 2003. Funny, when you’re ensconced in the working world all you want is the sweet luxury of nothing to do. But then, when “nothing to do” becomes reality, you want nothing more than to fill your time. But, now, I thought, “I’ll fill my time with *fun!*”

So, what would be *fun*? It had been a long, long time since I had much actual fun. I knew I had fun when I was a little kid and I spent a lot of time “pretending” – pretending to be something I wasn’t – a mother, a nurse, a doctor, a teacher, a nun. Sort of rehearsing for life. But it was *fun*, wasn’t it? That’s it! I’ll do movie/TV “extra” work, pretend I’m something I’m not, and play dress-up in the bargain! That sounded like *fun!* But how in the world would I become an extra?

I started with asking around and, sure enough, somebody at Kaiser had a relative in the “industry.” My friend Sue Hildreth and I scheduled a morning and showed up at Central Casting in Burbank to register as “background actors.” We imagined there would be a dozen or so other hopefuls on the scene with us. Instead we found about 200 people

registering for one of the three scheduled weekly registrations.

The registration form asked questions like: What kind of costumes do you have? What kind of wardrobe do you have access to? Are you willing to do nudity? Do you have objections to portraying a homosexual? Do you have wigs? Do you play an instrument? If so, which instruments? Do you dance? If so, what kind of dancing? Tap? Ballet? Ballroom? Belly dancing?

We registered and then I sort of forgot about it. There was a hotline to call if you were seeking work, and it seemed that the Women’s Hotline needed a lot of “hot, hot, hot-looking girls” OR women who strongly resembled Reese Witherspoon or Sandra Bullock. So I gave up. Three or four weeks passed, and then one day the phone rang and I was told a director had “picture-picked” me for an infomercial and was I available the next day? Yes! Call this number for details and show up! The number detailed wardrobe to wear and bring (casual, Sunday-around-the-house stuff in earth tones), where to be and when.

A little nervous, I got lots of “wardrobe” together and drove to a residential area in the west San Fernando Valley as directed. After parking, I was directed to the living room with a half-dozen men and women about my age. We figured out that we were the “Befores” in an infomercial touting the benefits of a Human Growth Hormone product named Renova. In other words, it was not exactly a compliment that we were there. No matter! We were pleased, downright jazzed, to have

been chosen, no matter what the role. Soon the director asked me to change into a terrycloth robe, and I was shown into a bathroom that was crisscrossed with cables and outfitted with all kinds of lighting and paraphernalia. I was asked to step onto the bathroom scale, and look down at the numbers in horror. That was the scene. Well, this was “acting” but I knew this scene in my bones – a little *too* real!

And there were more scenes. I climbed stairs with an aching back. I was gardening and experienced a sudden pain in my wrist. I was tossing and turning in bed, unable to sleep. But the *pièce de résistance* was the scene in bed with my “husband” where I glanced at his sleeping form and conveyed “sexual frustration” (rolling eyes and all). I earned \$75 that day and I could not remember having more *fun*. *Fun! Fun!* And this was ACTING! I wasn’t just a face in a crowd, I felt like an ACTRESS! I was hooked. I registered with what is called a Calling Service – Extras Management – who for \$60 a month would procure bookings for me regularly.

I was booked as a football and baseball fan, a patron of upscale and downscale restaurants, a pedestrian, jury member, courtroom onlooker, ball and cocktail partygoer, law firm employee, casino gambler, political convention delegate, West Wing staffer, soccer mom, and wedding guest. Eventually, I became qualified to join Screen Actors Guild (SAG) and the American Federation of Television and Radio Actors (AFTRA), and my roles became more specialized or featured. I created a

niche for myself as a courtroom stenographer and was featured in lots of courtroom, boardroom, and deposition scenes, avidly plunking my “machine” as I studiously contemplated each courtroom speaker.

Then, with a fair amount of regularity, a director would look my way and find I was exactly what he or she needed for a particular scene and off I’d go. Here were some of my scenes:

- I walked into a sauna room only to find, to my great outrage, a copulating couple (Showtime’s *Huff*).
- I demonstrated that a particular Asian fellow mysteriously attracted “older women” (*Boston Legal*).
- I was bludgeoned to death by an outraged husband (Court TV’s *Canine Clues*).
- I was the administrative assistant to the head of the law firm about which the film revolved (*Fracture* with Anthony Hopkins).
- I was the English maid serving dinner to high society (*Gilmore Girls*).

Surprisingly, all the work I did involved a fair amount of acting; yes, acting. Even playing a restaurant patron requires a certain detachment, and all background actors become expert *pantomimers*! It’s the best of all worlds – the fun of acting – on a moment’s notice, in front of Hollywood’s cameras, without the hard work of memorizing lines.

I also rounded out my career as a stand-in,

which I did not really like, although it was fun standing in for Paula Deen in *Elizabethtown*.

I *loved* this part of my life, which lasted from 2003 through part of 2007. Moving to the desert effectively put an end to what had been a fun, although not lucrative, career. But it’s not over yet! I fully intend to go back some day... after all, they need *all* types of people, young and old...I bet I’ll be a great *old* old lady.

Meet Me at the Peanut Hut

If you're like many of us, when you first meet an interesting couple who have moved into our beautiful community, you want to ask: how did you both get together? Answering that question this month is guest author John Alley, who describes how he came to know his wife of 42 years, Nancy, and the intriguing journey of their lives together.

Just outside Los Angeles lies the small community of Monterey Park with its “nearly famous” gathering spot, the Peanut Hut. Nancy was a paralegal at a large law firm in southern California. Her work included probate cases and a program for the adoption of homeless babies from Vietnam. After a stint in the Navy, I had started a few businesses of my own. Eventually, one company selling pump parts grew into an international enterprise manufacturing special pumps for the oil industry.

My pals and I liked fishing in Mexico, and our stories over Tuesday night rounds of beer intrigued

Nancy so much that she wanted to be part of the adventures. We stalwart anglers could not convince her that the “hardships” we faced while fishing for marlin, drinking beer, and having fun would be too much for her to handle. So Nancy went, she learned – and she caught fish.

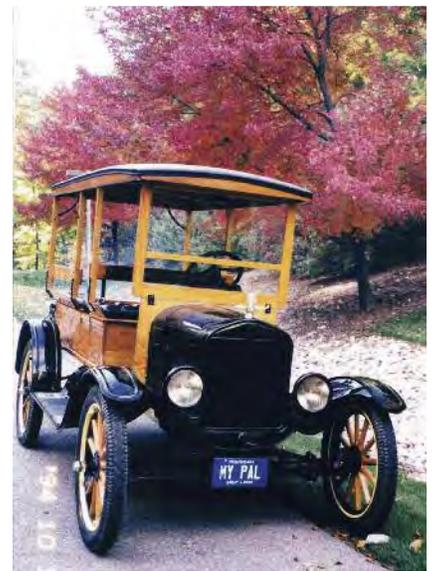
As luck would have it, we were both licensed pilots. So Mexico became readily accessible in later trips. After we married in 1970, we honeymooned up and down the Baja coast, flying to various resorts to play game after game of ping-pong and to fish. For us, it was the perfect romantic get-away.

We also loved to fly off for dinner to Palm Springs or Santa Barbara. One of us was always the evening’s “designated pilot.” But deciding who was “designated” was sometimes a challenge. On occasion it got down to a coin toss at the airport right before take-off.

Following my various entrepreneurial endeavors, while Nancy continued to work in the legal field, we swept across the wide areas of the U.S., living in Tulsa, Fresno, Huntington Beach, and finally here in the desert. In fact, we both lost track of how many times we moved! In between, we somehow managed to raise a

family of two children and one grandchild.

Our frequent travels for business and pleasure caused us ask ourselves: do we rely on public air and ground transportation, or do we provide our own? Our answer was our personal aircraft, a sleek white Beechcraft Bonanza. When we were not flying, we used family automobiles, including our professionally restored 1924 Model “T” with the license plate “MY PAL.”

I must confess, though, that the Model “T” was actually for rallies and parades. Sadly, we weren’t able to take it along on our wonderful trip to Dublin, Ireland, for the annual Gordon Bennett Rally (established in 1974 and held every June by the *Irish Veteran and Vintage Car Club*). We were lucky enough, however, to be invited to drive an incredibly rare French *Delage* convertible owned by our friend, Tom O’Neill from Dublin.

One thing that has made our lives together so special is that Nancy likes to give gifts that we can enjoy as a couple. One memorable present was a flight with a private Air Combat School. Here, with coaching from a former Top Gun pilot in the back seat, I learned the skills to “smoke” an aircraft in combat. (The planes were equipped with smoke generators so that, if you got a “computer hit,” the targeted plane would smoke as if shot down.)

Because she planned just to watch, Nancy chose to wear flip-flops that day. But another instructor pilot suggested she should also take some shots in another airplane while I was in the

air. Believe me when I say, Nancy did not hesitate to suit up and join me up there as my adversary – flight suit, helmet, call sign of “Killer Girl,” flip flops and all. Both of us “smoked” each other a few times and had a great time before the back-seat instructors called off the “combat” and we returned to base.

Now that things have settled down for us since we moved to our golfing community about three years ago, we regularly enjoy activities at the clubhouses. Nancy is a member of *Chaine des Rottisseurs*, an international gastronomic society whose history dates back to the year 1248. In addition, she has volunteered at Eisenhower Medical Center and works with “Forever Free Horse Rescue.”

And I continue to write just as I have as far back as I can remember, including articles for the monthly newsletter of the *San Gabriel Valley Airport Association* and the *Classic and Antique Motor Car Society*. I have also penned two books. The first, *Showdown at Changsha*, is a personal account of how a business trip can go seriously wrong in China. During a brief visit in 2003, Communist Party members seized my passport and my return ticket when I would not accept the Chinese Government as a partner in the project I was there to develop. (Luckily for me, the pilot on my return flight knew the ticket agent at the airport, who returned my ticket plus my passport. The pilot quickly spirited me aboard and hid me in the cockpit until departure!)

As I wrote at the end of my latest book, *The Tide of Time*, “Thank you for sharing my journey!”

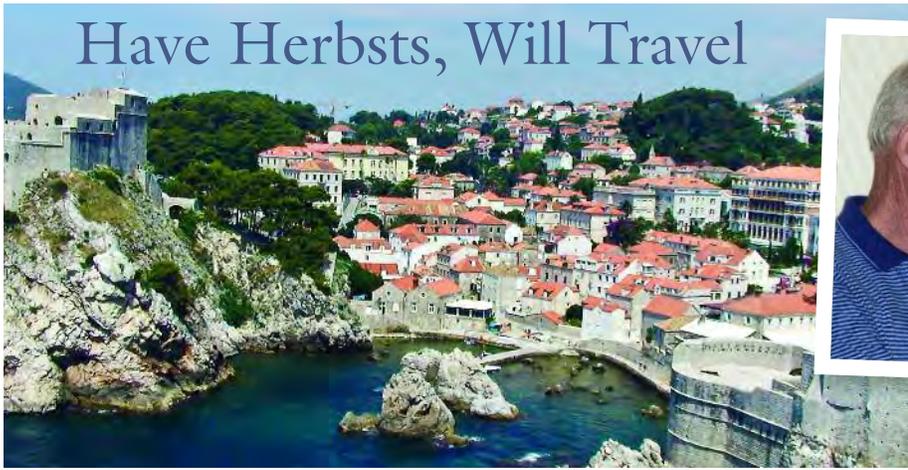

Benny and Anuga Herbst migrated from Israel to the USA in 1964 to attend Ohio State University, where Benny received his degree in Engineering. Since 1969, Benny's engineering work assignments have taken him to many different places outside of the U.S. Almost immediately Anuga started joining Benny on these business trips to exotic, exciting, and far away locations. In 1999, when Benny retired, they came to live in the desert before moving into SCSH in 2007. But they continue their annual treks to the various corners of the world. Their thirst for travel focuses on academia and learning about the history, culture, food, languages, and best of all, visiting the homes of local people and enjoying a home cooked meal with them. Their requirements are met by a travel agency which they have used for the past six years.

The Herbsts have travelled throughout the world including Russia, China, Hong Kong, Japan, Cambodia, Thailand, Vietnam, Israel, Turkey, Greece, many countries in South America and Africa, all of Western and Central Europe, and the Scandinavian countries as well. Their most recent vacation was a 15-day escorted tour titled *Dubrovnik & Beyond: From the Adriatic to the Alps*. The tour started in Europe's best-preserved and beautifully restored walled city of Dubrovnik, along the Croatian Riviera, and culminated in the city of Bled in the Julian Alps of Slovenia, just across the border of Italy.

One of the highlights of the tour included the Learning and Discovery Sheets – current and historical facts and discussions about the areas being visited. These included:

- A survey of Croatian history from the 7th century to 1998.
- Timeline of Yugoslav wars from 1980 to 2006.

- Facts about Croatia.
 - Language lessons.
 - History of the Dalmatian dog.
 - Types of Winds along the Adriatic Coast.
 - Croatian wines
 - Nikola Tesla, a Croatian inventor, physicist, and mechanical and electrical engineer.
- These Learning and Discovery Sheets helped quench Benny and Anuga's thirst for knowledge.

When asked about their "best vacation trip ever" the Herbsts, with sparkling eyes, warm smiles, and fond memories, both replied "China in 2002." They booked a tour "following the footsteps of the ancient Silk Road." This included all the typical major sights of the People's Republic of China (China) and added a side tour to the Northwestern border of China, across from India, Mongolia, and Kazakhstan, an area where the Uighurs (pronunciation is ooy-goors) reside. These Turkic Muslim ethnic people of the Tarim Basin migrated from Mongolia in 842 AD, hence their European and Eastern Chinese genetic traits. Benny stated that "they are considered Chinese and they reside in China, but they don't look Chinese nor are their traditions typical of the Chinese people. Even their food is different." The Herbsts are proud to say that they were perhaps the last "tourists" that were allowed in that part of China at the time, although it is open now to foreign visitors.

But for Benny and Anuga it's always just a plain and simple question of "to where do we now want to travel?"

Geoff Toner: a spirit of serving

By the time our journey in life takes us to our retirement, most of us have been engaged in some serious searching for the meaning of life. “What can I do to give my life more purpose?” is a question we all ask and, more often than not, we come away with more questions and more doubts than answers. This path leads many of us to give back to our local and broader community in thanksgiving for what we have received and to give more value to our lives.

If you converse with Geoff Toner, you learn very quickly that Geoff found his path to a more fulfilling life in 1972 at the young age of 32, after attending a “Cursillo Retreat.” A life-long Catholic, he believes that he has been led by the “Spirit” to travel on a road of a more intense dedication to his Christianity. He taught himself how to play the guitar so that he could become involved in sacred music for his church. He has spent all these years in this music ministry and he continues using his musical talents in his special ministry, working with prisoners.

He began his work with prisoners in 1990 at the federal prison at Terminal Island, near San Pedro and Long Beach, he became acquainted with Kairos Prison Ministry International and ever since then has worked with them as a volunteer. Currently, he spends two three-and-a-half day weekends a year with the convicts at the Ironwood prison, twenty miles west of Blythe. In addition, he travels there once each month to reunite with those men who participated in the weekend program. Geoff plays his guitar while leading these prisoners in song. He feels the music binds the prisoners and the volunteers together

as “family.” Geoff feels his involvement with the program rewards him as much as it helps the convicts in their return to the world beyond the prison walls.

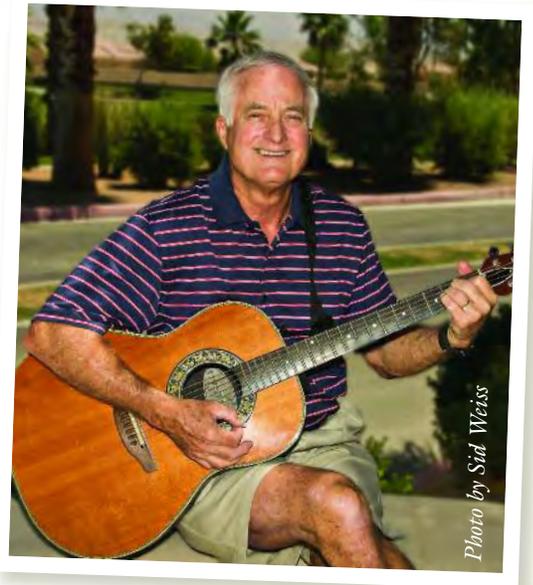
“There is unbelievable change in their lives even in dramatic ways, sometimes just after three and a half days. We are watching a miracle in their transformation. Their attitude changes. It’s the first time they’ve had joy in their lives, the first time they’ve laughed.

I’ve seen their faces change from hard masks to kids. They’re just kids in there, 19, 20, even 30. All of a sudden they start acting like kids again, joyful, happy kids.”

Geoff, a California native raised in Glendale, has been educated in Catholic schools, including Loyola, now Loyola-Marymount, until his graduate study at the prestigious Northwestern University School of Dentistry in Chicago. He has practiced dentistry in Newport Beach for forty years.

Undoubtedly you have seen some of Geoff’s beautiful oil paintings hanging in the Montecito Clubhouse. Geoff took up oil painting in 2008 after a class with Linda Wolf. To add to his busy schedule, Geoff plays golf twice a week. “I’m always in the money games because as a past athlete I enjoy the competition,” he says. He also participates in line

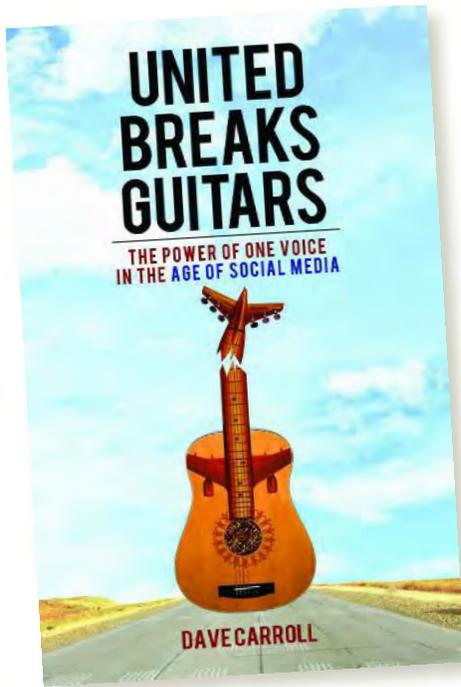


dancing as an exercise. Although he was the only male in the intermediate dancing class for almost two years, he is happy that five men are now steady attendees. He wants you fellows out there to know that it’s great exercise and fun. In addition, Geoff works out in the fitness center twice a week.

Geoff and his wife, Dee Dee, will be married fifty years this year. They have two children and five grandchildren and are fortunate to have their daughter and her family living here in Indio, and their son, a professor of mathematics at Victor Valley Community College, living in Apple Valley. The grandchildren in Indio carry on Geoff’s family tradition of Catholic education with the local ones attending Xavier High School in Palm Desert.

United Breaks Guitars by Dave Carroll

If you happen to be flying out of the Valley anytime soon, you'll want to take along *United Breaks Guitars*. It chronicles the tale of a musician named Dave Carroll and his interaction with United Airlines. What transpired altered the course of his life and has changed the way corporations conduct business in this age of social media.

In 2008, Dave boarded a plane in Halifax, expecting to store his guitar in the compartment above his seat, but a flight attendant insisted it be consigned to cargo. As the plane touched down at O'Hare, he could hear passengers commenting that they could see baggage handlers "throwing guitars!" and he looked out the window just in time to see his beloved Taylor-710 land on the tarmac.

Taylor guitars are expensive and the repair cost \$1,200. He expected to fill out some forms and be compensated. Unfortunately, no one at United could or would authorize reimbursement for the repair. Various reps went to great lengths to never admit responsibility for the damage, while Dave remained polite, hopeful and non-confrontational. As his quest approached the 1-year mark, someone at United forcefully explained that he would never see the \$1,200 in flight vouchers he was requesting.

Dave's response was that he would write three songs describing his disappointing customer service experience and post them to YouTube as

videos. Why? In his own words, "I changed gears from someone who wanted something to someone who was going to do something. My motivation was never to force United to compensate me. I wanted them to see that there aren't two sides to consumer stories like mine, just one: the right side."

Dave hoped that, over time, a million people would view his videos and their collective reaction would somehow get United to rethink poor customer service policies. When his first video accrued four million views in as many days, United's stock lost 10% of its value and a surprised but happy Dave became a media sensation.

His life has been wonderfully altered because his videos went viral. He now sponsors a customer-service-resolution website (gripevine.com), lectures extensively and is thrilled that his winning strategies are taught at Harvard Business School. His trilogy of songs has gotten more than twelve million hits on YouTube. Ultimately, United did apologize and offer monetary compensation. Dave accepted their apology and donated the money to worthy causes.

United Breaks Guitars is a short, quick read, told in a folksy style. As he brings you along for the ride of his life, Dave's experiences and insights will broaden your horizons. His creativity will make you smile, his integrity will inspire and you'll want to recommend this book to your friends.

Pickleball Club Profile

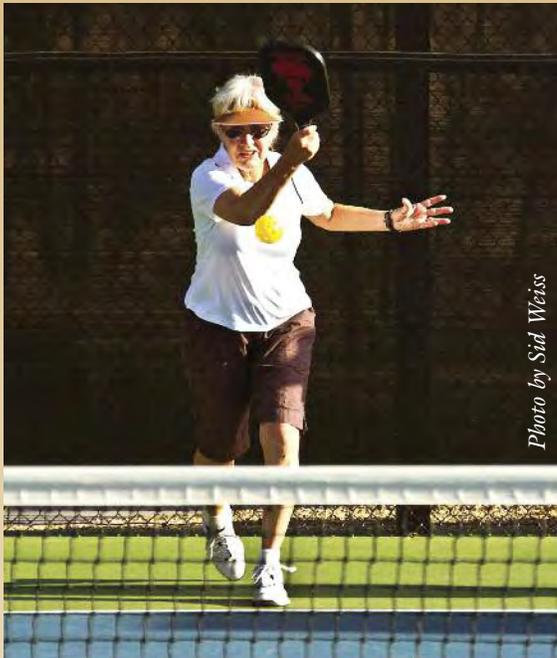

"That's my bowling ball," I said. "What's wrong, it's still round and should work fine."

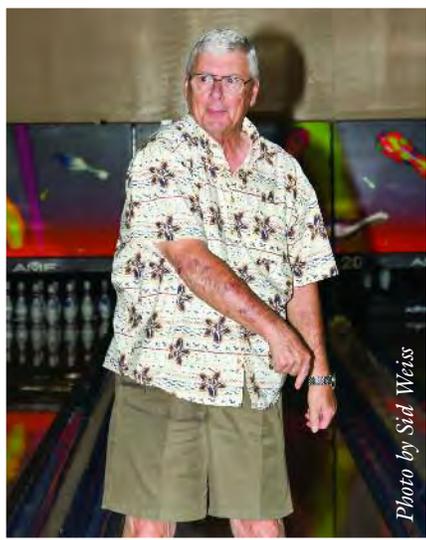
A look of pity crossed his face as he tried to control himself.

Ball Believed to Be Original Found;
Player Wishes to Ignore It and Continue
Play with Provisional Ball

Q. At a par-three hole, a player plays his tee shot into a heavy thicket. Since his ball may be lost, he hits a provisional ball that comes to rest near the hole. In the circumstances, it is advantageous to the player not to find his original ball. Accordingly, the player does not search for the original ball and walks directly toward his provisional ball. While the player is on his way to his provisional ball, a ball believed to be his original is found. The player is advised that his original ball may have been found. May the player ignore this ball and continue play with the provisional ball?

A. No. The player must inspect the ball that has been found and, if it is the player’s original ball, he must continue play with it (or proceed under the unplayable ball Rule). The provisional ball must be abandoned — Rule 27-2c. See also Decision 27-2b/1.

Keeping Your Skin Healthy in the Sun

Now that summer has officially arrived, you'll probably be spending more time outdoors. But whether you're in the garden, on the golf course or lying out by the pool, protecting your skin from the sun's damaging rays is of utmost importance. Too much sun exposure can not only cause wrinkles and age spots but it can also cause cancer. You can keep your skin healthy through the summer months and the rest of the year by following these helpful tips.

- Generously apply a broad-spectrum of water-resistant sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15 to all exposed skin. "Broad-spectrum" provides protection from both ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB) rays. Reapply sunscreen every one to two hours while outside.
- Wear protective clothing such as a long-sleeved shirt, pants, a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses.
- Seek shade when possible, and remember that the sun's rays are strongest between 10 a.m. – 4 p.m.
- Protect children from sun exposure by providing shady play areas, using protective clothing and applying sunscreen.
- Use extra caution near water, snow, and sand as they reflect the damaging rays of the sun, which can increase your chance of sunburn.
- Get vitamin D safely through a healthy diet that may include vitamin supplements. Don't seek the sun.
- Check your skin regularly, and if you notice anything changing, growing or bleeding on your skin, see a dermatologist. Skin cancer is very treatable when caught early.
- Sunny or Cloudy. You are just as likely to get too much sun on a cloudy or hazy day as you are on a sunny one. UV rays are strong enough to burn your skin even on cloudy days.
- Avoid tanning salons; indoor tanning has been associated with a significant increase in the risk of melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer.

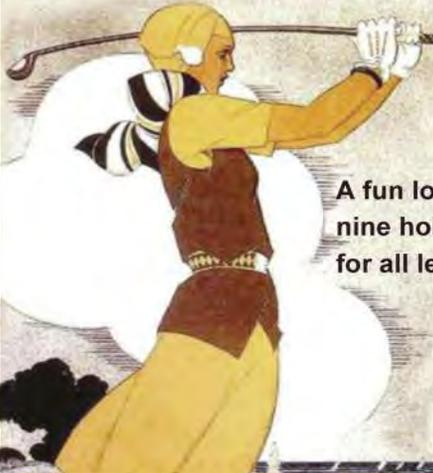

Retirement Club

Thinking of making one last move from SCSH to a life-care facility?



Some retirement homes and care facilities require the payment of an up-front life-care fee, often referred to as a “founder’s fee.” The question arises whether or not that fee might be deductible as a medical expense.

Within IRS limitations, taxpayers can deduct, in the year paid, the portion of a life-care fee or “founder’s fee” paid to a retirement home that is properly allocable to medical care if the payment is made in return for the home’s promise to provide lifetime care, including medical care. The same applies to monthly fees paid under a life-care contract.

The allocation method is typically a fraction determined on the basis of the facility’s own experience or that of a comparable facility. The facility should provide the allocation of the fee for the medical deduction by the time you are making your ultimate selection.

Obviously, there are other major factors to consider in the selection of a facility. Depending on your income level, the amount of potential deduction on your income tax return may help in the decision-making process. (The above is not intended as legal advice.)

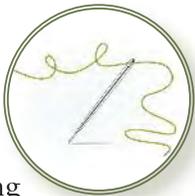


Table Tennis Club
