

From the General Manager

New Service from Burrtec

Recently Burrtec, our trash service company, has added an additional service in our community. If you would like to have a green waste container to dispose of your yard clippings please contact Burrtec Waste Customer Service at 760-340-2113. Please identify yourself as a Sun City Shadow Hills Community resident. Currently Burrtec is set up to deliver the new trash containers once a month to our community.

Time Warner Cable Bulk Contract

The Time Warner Cable bulk contract will be ending in December. Because of this there have been many questions as to what will happen then. In order to keep the community informed I have provided some information below.

When the 2007 Board of Directors negotiated the bulk contract with Time Warner, they chose an Opt In/Opt Out format that Time Warner was offering to our Association. In choosing this type of contract, the Board's goal was to provide a service to the members but not obligate the entire Association to a bulk contract. Most bulk cable contracts require all members to participate, whether they want it or not with the cost of this service being included as part of the member assessment. Our current agreement requires that the Association track participation, report this to Time Warner, bill the participating owners and also pay in advance for the full cost of the service. This provision has proven costly to the Association over time as we are restricted on the types of collection efforts we can use on unpaid fees such as cable. Additionally when a member sells their home, the new owner automatically "inherits" the contract and is unable to opt out of the existing contract. Over the duration of the contract this has proven problematic for many owners – either when selling their home or purchasing a home.

In evaluating whether to continue to offer bulk cable to the community the Board of Directors has

researched Time Warner as well as Verizon FIOS bulk contract options. In the case of Time Warner we could continue with a similar contract to what we currently have but the Board has determined the cost to the Association outweighs the benefit, as a provision for unpaid cable fees ultimately would have to be borne by all owners and included in assessments. Both companies also offered an "all in" contract that would require all owners to participate in the selected bulk cable program. The Board found that many members are currently in agreements with other cable TV providers or are part time residents and therefore does not want to obligate every member of the community to a single vendor bulk agreement. Based on their research, the Board of Directors decided that it was in the best interest of the community as a whole to not move forward with a new bulk cable agreement.

Time Warner will provide us with the name and number for those who would like to maintain their Time Warner cable service. The Association will be sending out correspondence to those owners on the current contract providing information as to the process that will take place as we wind down this contract.

New Landscape and Security Contractors

At the end of July after considering several qualified contractors for both our community gate and patrol services and Phase I and II landscape service, the Board of Directors selected new companies for both services. Beginning September 1, Artistic Landscape will begin the maintenance of our landscaping in Phase I and II. Artistic is the current contractor in Phase III where they have provided excellent service. Beginning September 4, Universal Protection Services will begin providing our gate and patrol services for our community. Universal Protection has an excellent reputation. We look forward to having both companies working with us to continue to provide the level of service that we expect. Please welcome them to our community.

If you have any questions please feel free to contact the Association staff. We will be glad to help you or direct your questions to the proper staff member so that your questions are answered in a timely manner. The Association office staff is looking forward to assisting you.

Employee of the Month August 2012




Victor Farius

Committee Reports

Tree Trimming Time

If you haven't trimmed your tree(s) in a while, it is probably time to do so. Removal of crossing and parallel branches and branches that pose hazards to foot traffic should come first. You may also need to thin (lace) the tree(s). A thick, full tree acts like a sail in the wind and will lose branches or be blown over in a windstorm. Thinning removes excess branches in the interior of the tree allowing the wind to pass through without causing damage. Removal of large portions of the tree canopy (more than 30%) during any one pruning session can lead to aggressive, unwanted re-growth, limited root development, and increased vulnerability to sunburn injuries that can be colonized by wood-boring insects. No more than 20% of the tree foliage should be removed at any one time, with 80% of this pruning concentrated on the new growth on the outer third of the canopy. Before cutting a limb, shake it to see how much of the tree you will be removing.

Periodically stop and step back to take in an overall view of the tree from ALL sides. Repeat this process several times while pruning. Remember that excessive branch removal and improper or inappropriate pruning can act to stimulate unwanted growth. Sharp tools that make clean, smooth cuts will heal most quickly. Use pruning tools that are appropriate to the size of branches being cut. Do not leave a stub when removing a branch.



The Times of Mel Gold

1:36 and 3:30 were important times for SCSH resident Mel Gold.

1:36 was the time it took for Mel to win his first horse race as a professional jockey. Becoming a jockey seemed a natural fit for Mel. Horses were a love of his from the time he was five or six, growing up in the Culver City neighborhood of Los Angeles. At age nine, his father bought him his first horse, Nip. He, his friends, and twin sister Mavis rode all over what is now Baldwin Hills. They even put on amateur rodeos complete with roping and riding steers.

His first real summer job was working for a horse owner who had bought 41 brood mares from Prince Ali Khan. (Khan was a racehorse owner, socialite, and third husband of actress Rita Hayworth.) Mel was hired to help pick up the horses from all over Europe. So there he was, at age 16, flying on a DC-8, sharing the ride with eight million-dollar horses. "It took 25 hours from Paris to New York," he recalls. "There, we unloaded the horses and put them on the next plane. Then it took another 17 hours to reach LA. I was on a plane for over two days." Mel made three of those trips that summer.

After graduating high school, Mel began working at the Hollywood

Park racetrack full time where his job was primarily galloping horses. Soon, at age 18, all 5 feet, 6 inches and 102 pounds of Mel became a jockey and started riding races. "Riding a thoroughbred," Mel recounts, "is like getting into a car. Some horses are like driving a Ferrari and some are like driving an old Ford. Your job is to control the horse and make quick decisions. Running a race is a thrill. But you're so focused on the race, you don't really hear the screaming or yelling." Mel's first winner was Cover Me at Longacres Park in Washington State. Mel rode the west coast racing circuit for three years. But because he had continued to grow, Mel was then considered too big to be a jockey.

Luckily for Mel, it was the early 60s, and Hollywood was making quite a few Westerns. And Westerns needed professional riders. Mel became a member of the Screen Actors Guild and rode horses in movies such as *The Cowboy*, *The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance*, and *The Magnificent Seven*, to name just a few. He even rode as a jockey in *My Fair Lady*. (That's Mel on one of the racehorses in the scene at the Ascot Racecourse.) He also rode in most of the well-known TV shows of the time such as *Bonanza*, *Rawhide*, *Wagon Train*, and *The Virginian*.

What does a horseman do in movies? Mel rode in posses to head off the bad guys, herded steers in round-ups, and rode up and down dusty town streets as background. He also drove stagecoaches and

wagons. Because of his expertise he was called on to do horse stunts such as roping steers, chasing runaway horses, and even falling off horses.

Mel found that his height also helped him in a different type of film – Sci Fi. He played aliens and found himself the perfect size for an ape in the *Planet of the Apes* movies. That's where the 3:30 time came in.

Three hours and 30 minutes was the typical amount of time Mel spent in the make-up trailer having ape-like appliances and make-up put on his face. "They fed you a big breakfast," Mel said, "then, you were in make-up and costume for 12 to 14 hours, including the time it took to take the make-up and appliances off." Mel remembers Roddy McDowell from the Ape films. "He was a terrific guy. And he loved opera! At 3:30 am, opera was blasting in the make-up trailer as we were sitting there having our make-up put on."

Mel also spent time doubling for actors and did stand-in work for people such as Groucho Marx, Jack Lemmon, and Mel Brooks. After a long movie career, Mel and his wife of 25 years, Ellen, decided that it was time to retire from the make-up chair and the freeways of LA. They checked out Vegas, but decided to come to SCSH in the mid-2000s.

Mel still loves horses, though. Through another SCSH resident, Pam Ott, Mel recently got to do some horse riding in our local area. Pam boards her white Arabian, Caliph, at the Coachella Valley Mounted Rangers stables, which has

been doing local horse rescue for about 50 years. Pam let Mel ride on Caliph, which is the horse you see Mel on in *The View* cover photo.

With his professional horse-riding days behind him, the most important time for Mel now is 9:30 am. That's his tee time.

Bob Case, An Officer and a Gentleman

Sadly this month, we publish posthumously this profile about one of our neighbors, Bob Case, who died about six weeks ago. Bob's son, Ron, still lives in our community; and Ron encouraged us to run the article in memory of his father, which we are pleased to do.

Bob Case was born on December 19, 1915. This was also the year that the one millionth Ford automobile rolled off the assembly line, a first-class stamp was \$0.02, the Boston Red Sox won the World Series, and Cornell was crowned the NCAA Football champions. Unfortunately, a big war was going on, too. When I met him, Bob may have been 96 years old, but his mind was still sharp, his memory was filled with vivid details, his humor and wit were nothing like I thought a person his age would have, and his eyes were full of excitement and adventure. The interview consisted of two sessions and I feel honored to write about Bob's wonderful life.

Growing up in the San Francisco Bay Area, Bob graduated from Oakland Technical High School in

1932 and immediately started working full-time as an auto shop apprentice, making a whopping \$1 per day. Two years later Bob moved over to J.E. French, a well known auto body and paint shop in the Bay Area. He was so good at this job he was promoted to Shop Manager at the tender but business-savvy age of only 21. A year later, in 1937, Bob married his childhood sweetheart, June, and they purchased their first home in 1939 for \$5,110 cash plus \$695 for the lot. Bob didn't believe in paying interest or carrying a mortgage.

Before World War II started, Bob volunteered for the California State Guard (CSG, now called the California Army National Guard). After being released from the CSG, he was drafted into the armed services. He was stationed at Camp Hood (now called Fort Hood, TX) and Fort Bliss (El Paso, TX), where he was a sergeant in the motor pool working on, you guessed it, military cars and trucks.

With his honorable discharge in 1946, he went back to working with J.E. French (Dodge and Plymouth automobiles) and, after two years, started working for Berkeley Motors (Lincoln Mercury). Bob started in the body and paint department before moving over to learn about sales and purchasing as a buyer. Within a year Bob became a general partner, opened another dealership in Menlo Park (Stanford Lincoln Mercury), and started an auto leasing company. Bob ran these successful businesses for 28 years until 1976, when he decided to retire at the still young age of 61.

But Bob had way too much energy for retirement life, so he and a partner started a post-retirement business

buying and selling mortgages (and second mortgages) that stayed successful for 10 years. There were other things that interested Bob before and after retirement as well. These included: 1) working with stained glass, which lasted a decade; 2) boating (after purchasing three boats, he decided to join the Coast Guard Auxiliary as a volunteer, became a lieutenant, and taught boating safety classes to the public); 3) learning to play the accordion (he started playing this instrument in 1946 – in fact, his son Ron had to buy him a smaller and lighter accordion to play in his “golden” years); and 4) writing in general and writing poems, which he collected in a nice “book” called *Poems and Writings by Bob Case*. Reading some of Bob's stories and poems had me rollicking in laughter as I got to know his humorous side.

With over 40 years of experience in the automobile industry, Bob could still remember all of his favorite cars. His first was a 1920 Model T Ford, which he purchased in 1930 for \$25. Some of his others were a 1932 Star car for \$25, a 1929 Chevy for \$150, a 1935 Plymouth for \$350, and a 1949 Lincoln for \$2,500. Oh, and we must not forget that Army Jeep purchased in 1946 for \$725. But the best of the best was the 1969 Mercury Cougar XR7, one of the original “muscle cars” of the 60s. I grew up in the 60s and 70s and can definitely relate to the muscle cars from Detroit; I drove a 1969 Oldsmobile 442.

Bob also had many highlights during his auto industry career including: driving a Model T Ford, servicing the automobile of Admiral Nimitz, selling a car to a blind

person, introducing “hillbilly” advertising to the auto industry, and retaining a valid 2012 California driver’s license. But Ron was still hesitant about letting his 96-year-old dad drive his beautiful ’55 candy apple red and black big-block Chevy.

In Bob’s book, there is a wonderful and true story about his best friend of 60 years, Ivor John Ankunding (Johnny) from Russia, an expert auto mechanic and commercial airplane pilot. They became friends while working at an auto repair shop in Oakland. Johnny was brash, outspoken, blunt, and somewhat arrogant. He wasn’t the most popular worker but somehow had a deep interest in being friends with Bob. Gradually, Bob saw through Johnny’s brazen exterior and developed a friendship that lasted until Johnny’s untimely death a few years ago. Bob proudly remembered the handshake partnership with Johnny (without contracts), the many customer referrals from Johnny and, most of all, the verbal agreements between the two that signified the ultimate trust that two men can have for one another. Bob sorely missed his best buddy.

Along with the Queen of England’s Diamond Jubilee, Bob and June also celebrated their 75th Diamond Anniversary on March 13, 2012. Sadly,

June is afflicted with Alzheimer’s disease and is in a care facility. Although she enjoyed the momentous celebration, she didn’t remember much of it the next day. Bob, who had a quadruple bypass in 1986, ascribed his longevity to no smoking or drinking; living a good, clean life; being honest, honorable, always maintaining integrity and respect for one another; and unflinching faith in his church.

Ron, a resident of SCSH since 2007, moved his dad into his home in January 2012; and together they visited June every day. That was the one thing that Bob looked forward to each and every morning...to see his beloved June, his soul mate and true love for over 75 years!

I surely miss him and in closing I can only hope to be as active in my 90s as my friend Bob.

The Climb to Machu Picchu

The brochure indicated the age requirement was from 18 – 55. We were 70 and 74, had been hikers for decades, felt we were quite healthy, and loved the challenge of long hikes. We convinced Kumuka Tours to accept us on their nine-week trip to South America and signed their statement that we were in good health and would not be “a nuisance to young people on the trip.”

The tour would introduce us to the indigenous people of Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia, and Chile but the

motivator for the whole trip was the four-day climb to the city of Machu Picchu, the sacred land of the Incas. Although the city is slightly less than 8,000 feet above sea level, the trek from the base (marked as the 82K trailhead) would lead us to 14,000 feet at Dead Woman’s Pass, several other 13,000-foot climbs and 29 miles of mountainous, sub-tropical jungle, three nights of camping, and spectacular views of lush cloud-forests. We were ready for this adventure.

Twenty-five of us left the base camp at 8 am. The sun was shining on my backpack of 11 pounds while my heavy hiking boots found their way onto the first of seven miles of stairs. The Incas built this religious trail of rocky steps into the mountain to make their climb easier, but the movement of the earth over the last 600 years has set some of the steps at one inch and some as high as 18 inches. With this inconsistency the 2,900-foot climb for this day is quite challenging. In addition many of the rocks have been made quite smooth and we had to be careful not to slip.

The next day we awoke in the morning to jungle rain and covered ourselves with slickers we had bought the day before from the natives. The rain cleared in some places so that we could appreciate the spectacular Andes soaring above us and the rivulets flowing to form the Kusichaca and Urumbamba rivers. Climbing mountains has always impressed us with the most spectacular scenery that no one gets to experience without the challenge of hiking.

The first part of this second day is tough with one of the steepest climbs ahead. The altitude increased along with the wind and rain as we hiked the seven miles to Dead Woman’s Pass. Joy, pleasure, laughter, lots of photos and, with plastic slickers smashing against our bodies, we still celebrated. Then as I looked through the pass to the other side and began the descent, fear took over. The rocks loomed large, smooth, and quite slippery with the rain. As I slowly maneuvered my boots to get purchase down this steep terrain, I murmured “What was I thinking? I’m going to die on this mountain and it will be days before they get out the body. Perhaps the body will just be buried here.” For two and a half hours I worried about my husband, Robert, as he struggled even more than I because of his limited eyesight.

In some places we were able to walk in the dirt, but as the rain got heavier the dirt turned to mud and then to puddles. Without warning my walking stick slid through the loose earth causing me to lose my balance. I heard the crack. I could not

get up on the slanted rock. Oscar, our guide who was ahead, finally reached me and radioed the camp for help. The rest of the group went ahead as we sat and waited for an hour for the porter to arrive. When we took off my boot the swelling was well under way but it was important to get the boot back on before it became impossible. When the porter came along, he enclosed my buttocks in a plastic blanket and, with his help, I hefted myself onto his back as he tied the blanket around his neck and I rode piggy back for 30 minutes. It was the opinion of the guides that I sprained my ankle, yet my body, soaking wet, was in shock.

For the next day and a half, I climbed the mountains on the backs of two porters who changed off about every 15 minutes. Many times

they would walk the soft edge of the trail as I gazed down at 700 or more feet of drop-off. Even with me on their backs we beat any of the most able hikers to the camp by 90 minutes. On the fourth day, it was a very short hike to the Sun Gate where we expected our first view of the Machu Picchu Inca ruins. Sadly, all we saw were clouds but that was not the only surprise. A stretcher awaited to

enfold me in its canvas: arms, legs, and everything but my head. As we descended the two miles to the sacred land, my yellow scarf covered my eyes and I was unable to signal anyone since I spoke neither Spanish nor Quechua. I felt claustrophobic until one of the medics discovered the dilemma and lifted my scarf. I began to experience Machu Picchu.

After three weeks of hiking hills, climbing onto vans and boats in Bolivia and Chile, moving luggage, and finally walking in La Serena, Chile, for a good two miles to find a beauty salon, I learned that I broke both my tibia and metatarsal bones. The surgeon in Santiago offered to do surgery but I declined to have that done until I arrived home. I am so grateful that I was unaware of the breaks because I got to complete our tour, in spite of the three weeks of pain. The joy is in the achievement.






Book Review

Norwegian Crime Fiction Author: Jo Nesbø

The best current Nordic writer of crime fiction has to be Jo Nesbø. If you like gripping stories of corruption, crime, and politics – and a hero whose worst enemy may be himself – then Harry Hole’s your man. One of the most compelling flawed protagonists in contemporary suspense fiction, Hole is an addictive alcoholic and an introspective, depressive police inspector.

Nesbø’s plots are precise and convoluted – brilliantly conceived, carefully worked out, and complicatedly satisfying. The narrative pace is unmatched. Suspense builds in parallel montages that induce and incite page-turning. Adrenaline-fueled action sequences abound.

As you’d expect in crime writing of the loftiest order, the characters are as strong and intriguing as the story. An atmosphere of evil permeates; tension initiates in the first chapter and never lets up. As he explores the darkest criminal minds with serious and somber delight, Nesbø places his killers where you least expect to find them. In fact, events occur so rapidly that you barely realize that his sinister characters have managed to evade scrutiny.

Captivating from the very first page, Nesbø’s writing has a laconic tone that is exactly where it should be: when circumstances are most dire and corpses pile up, the prose is sharp and suspenseful, yet also entertaining. With rare ingenuity and complete confidence, Nesbø’s novels are spine-chilling, macabre, and disturbing. And Harry Hole is all a fictional detective should be! In one (invented) word, the stories are: un-put-down-able.

Here are a few titles to enjoy (with synopses extracted from Amazon.com):

- *The Redbreast*: Detective Harry Hole has embarrassed the force, and for his sins he’s been reassigned to mundane surveillance tasks. But, while monitoring neo-Nazi activities in Oslo, Hole is inadvertently drawn into a mystery with deep roots in Norway’s dark past – when members of the nation’s government willingly collaborated with Nazi Germany.

- *Nemesis*: Grainy closed-circuit TV footage shows a man walking into a bank and putting a gun to a cashier’s head. He tells her to count to 25. When he doesn’t get his money in time, she is executed. Hole is assigned to the case. But is someone trying to frame him for this unexplained death? Meanwhile, the bank robberies continue with unparalleled savagery.
- *The Devil’s Star*: It’s a sweltering summer in Oslo when a young woman is found murdered in her flat. One finger has been cut off, and beneath her eyelid is a tiny red diamond in the shape of a five-pointed star. Hole is put on the case, but he unwittingly finds himself forced to make difficult decisions about his future as a detective.
- *The Snowman*: Harry Hole receives an anonymous letter signed “The Snowman.” In November, Oslo’s first snow falls, wives and mothers go missing, a snowman is left behind. As the police reopen old missing persons cases, something rings familiar: as Harry thinks differently, he soon realizes he’s been set up to play a darker, deadlier, more sinister game.
- *The Leopard*: Two women are both found drowned in their own blood, and the crimes offer no clues. But when a third victim is found, Harry Hole’s instincts take over: someone has a deadly obsession.

Good Neighbors Club

In Your Backyard...

Regal Horned Lizard

Out of 10 species of horned lizards, the one most like the Regal Horned Lizard, better known as the Horny Toad, is best described as looking like a small dinosaur. It has a flat, squat, toad-like body with thorns along the rear of its head and is sandy or tan in color with darker tan spots on its body and often scales along the sides of its body.

As a child while living in Burbank, California, I used to catch these lizards and put them in a shoe box, where I fed them grass and leaves. Little did I know that their favorite food was Harvester ants. While the bite of Harvester ants can be quite painful to humans, the ants don't seem to bother the esophagus or stomach of these lizards. Sometimes when I played with my captive lizards they would lie still, and I would pet them. Now I know that these lizards freeze or play dead when they think a predator is approaching. When approached by a small snake, this lizard will turn its largest side to the snake; that and its thorns quickly discourage the snake from attacking. One reason it was probably easy for me to catch these horny toads is that their large, thorny bodies made them move more slowly than a slender lizard.

One time when I had a horned toad in my hand, it suddenly shot blood out of its eyes on my hand, which truly frightened me. It seems that these lizards have tiny capillaries around the eyes and, as a defense mechanism, they constrict the capillaries so the blood shoots out. Occasionally the lizard will just suddenly run away but, if faced with a predator, sometimes



it will just suddenly turn and face it and make a hissing sound. I never kept my prisoner in the shoe box for very long. My mother would urge me to set it free, and I would. She was probably afraid I'd let it loose in the house like I did a toad one time. It only took three days to locate that amphibian.

These lizards lay three to 45 eggs between May and August; out of those only about two will survive to sexual maturity.

Although this tiny lizard has survived many thousands of years, about the only place where you might see it in our area is in the sand dunes along Washington Street opposite Sun City Palm Desert. There, on a hot day, it will burrow its way into the soil, using the scales along its mouth to cut the earth. Then it'll vibrate its body until the soil covers its head and can be seen no more. Its flat wide surface can be compared to a solar panel, so it has many adaptations for our desert. It likes the sand dunes best but, as property is developed and our desert floor is covered with concrete and asphalt, it is losing its habitat and has become endangered. I never thought much about endangered species until I learned that my pet lizard was one of them. That presented a different picture to me. I hope now it stays around, and that some day you'll get an opportunity to see one of these strange critters.



Golf Operations

Rules of Golf

Rule 3-3 – Doubt as to Procedure

a. Procedure

In stroke play, if a competitor is doubtful of his rights or the correct procedure during the play of a hole, he may, without penalty, complete the hole with two balls.

After the doubtful situation has arisen and before taking further action, the competitor must announce to his marker or fellow-competitor that he intends to play two balls and which ball he wishes to count if the Rules permit.

The competitor must report the facts of the situation to the Committee before returning his score card. If he fails to do so, *he is disqualified*.

Note: *If the competitor takes further action before dealing with the doubtful situation, Rule 3-3 is not applicable. The score with the original ball counts or, if the original ball is not one of the balls being played, the score with the first ball put into play counts, even if the Rules do not allow the procedure adopted for that ball. However, the competitor incurs no penalty for having played a second ball, and any penalty strokes incurred solely by playing that ball do not count in his score.*





Focus on Women:

Saving enough money to pay for retirement can be challenging for women, when compared with men, earn less, spend fewer years working, and live longer.

These concerns are often more acute for women who are divorced, widowed, or otherwise single, or spent adult years caring for children and other family.

According to the US Department of Labor (DOL, 2011), less than half of all working women in the US participate in a retirement plan, and a woman retiring at age 65 can expect to live another 19 years.

Also, the average woman in the US who is employed full-time earns 80 cents for every dollar a man earns. Women are further disadvantaged when their jobs do not offer retirement benefits.

Many women do not receive enough in Social Security benefits to meet their basic needs. The Social Security Administration (SSA, 2011) reports the average annual Social Security income received by women 65 years and older was \$12,155 in 2009.

Further, married women often do not realize that the retirement benefits accrued by their husbands may be reduced if they are widowed or divorced. These factors put many women at high risk for poverty as they age.

Dues for the club are only \$10 a year, but you're welcome to attend a meeting before you officially join.




Table Tennis Club
