Association Committee Reports



Design Review (DRC)

In the recent issues of *The View*, the DRC has reviewed requirements for maintenance and improvement of Sun City Shadow Hills residences. You may ask, where do these requirements come from? All new homeowners were given a “Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions” when they purchased their homes. Articles V, VI, and VII describe the Review and Approval of Improvement Projects; set Minimum Construction Standards; and describe Association and Homeowner Maintenance Responsibilities.

Article V establishes a Design Review Committee. The DRC meets on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month to review and approve improvement applications. The DRC does periodic inspections of SCSH to see that maintenance guidelines are followed. The DRC uses the “Design Review Guidelines,” established by the Board of Directors, as it carries out its duties. The DRC will make recommendations to the Board when there are instances of non-compliance with the Guidelines.

The committee consists of five residents appointed by the Board of Directors for a one-year term. Non-voting subcommittee members are appointed by the DRC.

Just a reminder: the recent rains are producing a bumper crop of weeds. Please remember to take steps to eliminate the weeds while they are just emerging. For corner lots, don't forget the area along your wall on the side street.

Emergency Preparedness

As we are all aware of the recent horrific news of major earthquakes in Haiti and Chile, it is now more important than ever to be prepared for an eventuality that has been forecast for California for decades.

Being prepared for an emergency is like buying insurance. We buy insurance to protect ourselves and our property in case of a catastrophe or eventuality. After that we forget about it, paying our premiums each year and knowing that if that eventuality becomes a reality we are covered. This gives us peace of mind that we have done all we can to cushion the impact of an unexpected event.

Buying an Emergency Survival Kit or putting one together yourself is just the same. You only have to think about it once, purchase the needed items, and store it in a suitable location in your home and car. After that, you can forget about it for a few years or until it is needed, just renewing your batteries each year and your food and water every five years. It is a good idea to mark the date on the container when you do this.

Today's kits include food and water developed by the US Coast Guard that can be kept for five years without replacement as well as batteries for your flashlight and radio that can be kept for up to a year. For the most part it is simple, practical and for a small outlay, you will know that you are as prepared as you can be to survive a major catastrophe like the ones in Haiti and Chile.

We have been told by Emergency Service Departments that it can take 10 days or more before those services can get to our community. There is a priority list of locations that the departments have to take care of first:

the worst hit places, hospitals, schools, freeways, etc. During that time we could be without electricity, gas and, above all, drinking water, as the water we have access to may become contaminated. The human body can survive without food for a long time, but not without water.

Emergency Survival Kits contain enough water for two people to survive for 6–12 days depending on the size and type of kit you purchase. AM/FM radio, flashlight, emergency survival sleeping bags, tube tent, respirator dust masks, work gloves, plus hygiene and sanitation packs are all included in various kits available to you. Kits have been designed using advice from experts in the emergency preparedness industry, following guidelines from government agencies. All can be supplied to you here in Sun City Shadow Hills. The resident vendors selling them are happy to deliver them to your house and they are Sun City Shadow Hills Merchants currently offering a 10% discount.

In the event of a major earthquake, you cannot rely on the charity of those people who have prepared themselves even though they may be willing to help you. Give yourself peace of mind and act now before it is too late. Put together a kit, or purchase one of the many that are currently available. Be responsible for your own survival, and do not forget to have extra medications at hand as well as food for your pets to last for at least 10 days.

News on Assessments

At its March 15 meeting, the Board of Directors of the Sun City Shadow Hills Community Association voted to accept the operation and maintenance responsibility for the first nine holes of the North Golf Course in accordance with the Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&R's). Per the subsidy agreement with Del Webb, this action triggers an increase in the monthly assessments. The monthly assessment will therefore increase to \$237 per month; the new level will go into effect May 1, 2010.

Homeowners' monthly statements will include a similar note in April with the actual increase appearing on the May statement.

There are a number of reasons for this planned increase, including the opening of the first nine holes of the Phase III golf course (the North Golf Course), as well as increased costs related to but not limited to 24-hour roving patrol, security at the gatehouse, landscape maintenance, reserve contributions (monies put into a separate account to pay for future maintenance, repairs and replacement costs), and insurance premiums for associated property. While this means maintenance of the course will now be the responsibility of the

Association, it also means the Association has acquired a new multi-million dollar asset at no cost to its members, with potential positive impacts on property values at the community.

In the ordinary course of its operations, the Board of Directors will continue to review and adjust the assessment level based on the operating expenses of the Association. If at any point the assessment level can be reduced, the Board will be delighted to do so. Regardless, as we approach build-out of the community, we continue to anticipate assessments to be in a range of \$250-\$260 per month, per unit. This build-out estimate contemplates all aspects of the operation of the entire Community Association and all of its facilities.

Del Webb continues to pay assessments on developed lots and continues to be responsible for any deficit the Association may have.

As you know, maintaining the community and its facilities is the responsibility of the Board of Directors, and it is one taken very seriously by both Del Webb and resident board members. Together, and with the advice of our resident advisory committees, we work diligently with staff to keep assessments as low as possible while still maintaining optimal quality standards and property values in the community.

I know I speak for our entire Board of Directors when I say "thank you" for your continued support.

Trends in Volunteerism

National Volunteer Week will be recognized this year from April 18 through April 24. Many of our Del Webb communities in Southern California celebrate those residents who offer their volunteer services to their Association and to their local community, so we thought we'd share some surprising trends in volunteerism.

Since President George H.W. Bush inspired the Points of Light movement, the number of Americans who volunteer has grown significantly. The following facts are available courtesy of the non-profit Points of Light Institute in Washington, DC.

- 23 million more Americans are volunteering today than in 1989.
- Since 1989, the reported number of Americans volunteering increased from 38.04 million to 61.80 million last year, an increase of more than 60%.
- The rate of volunteering since 1989 has increased by a third, from 20.4 percent of all Americans in 1989 to 26.4 percent last year.
- More than twice as many youth are volunteering as volunteered in 1989.
 - 8.24 million young people ages 16-24 volunteered last year, compared to 3.53 million in 1989.
 - The volunteer rate for young people ages 16-24 has climbed over 60 percent from 13.4 percent in 1989 to 21.9 percent last year.
 - About a third of twelfth grade students (33 percent) volunteered at least once per month in 2006, up from 24 percent measured in 1991.
 - In 2008, 69.7 percent of students entering college believed it was very important to help others, the highest percentage since 1970, when 71.7 percent reported that they held this belief. In 1999, 60.8 percent of students entering college reported this belief.

- Becoming a community leader is also increasingly important to youth, with 35.2 percent of students entering freshmen last year rating it “very important” or “essential.”
- Baby Boomers and older Americans are both over 40 percent more likely to volunteer today than the same age groups in 1989.
 - For mid-life adults today (aged 45-64), the volunteer rate is over 29 percent, up from 22 percent in 1989.
 - Volunteering rates for Americans aged 65 and older rose from 16.9 percent in 1989 to 23.5 percent in 2008.
- Volunteering with educational and youth organizations is up around 75 percent.
 - People are more likely to volunteer with educational or youth service organizations today than in 1989 (26.0 percent of volunteers, up from 15.1 percent in 1989) and with social or community service organizations (9.9 percent to 13.3 percent).
 - In 1989, the most common place for people to volunteer was with religious groups (37.4 percent) and today it is still the most common (35.9 percent).

As you can see, trends in volunteerism appear to have increased dramatically over the past two decades. We consider this a very positive trend, because volunteerism is undoubtedly a “win-win” situation. Not only does it benefit the recipient, but the person donating his or her time and energy is rewarded as well. Ask almost any volunteer about their experiences, and they'll probably tell you they get back as much, or more, than they give.

Here at Del Webb, volunteerism has always been celebrated because we see it as a lifestyle opportunity. It is similar in many ways to golf, fitness, clubs and hobbies. It's a way to be active, and it contributes important social, mental, and physical benefits to one's quality of life.

To all the residents who volunteer their time – no matter how much – thank you for everything you do. And keep up the good work!

Highlighting The Sun City Shadow Hills Library

“Reading is to the mind as exercise is to the body” ~ Joseph Addison

For the “older” (that’s over 60) members of the SCSH community, the importance of reading and the power of books were ingrained early in their education. However, in the mid-1950s, research showed that Americans were spending less time on books and more on radio, television, and musical instruments. This led to the first National Library Week in 1958, and it is the annual celebration of the contributions of our nation’s libraries and librarians. This year’s NLW is the week of April 11–17, which makes it an appropriate time to highlight the SCSH library and the community members that not only made it possible, but are responsible for its continuing success.

When Lil Greenhut arrived at SCSH a little more than four years ago, she quickly noticed that we really didn’t have a professional library with an inventory of books to serve our community. She began coordinating efforts to establish a full-fledged library, fill it with books and set up a lending library procedure to serve our members. Working with three other residents — Phyllis Tunis, Dee Dee Toner, and Barbara Perler — these women were responsible for getting our library off the ground. They advertised in *The View* for books and volunteers and had an overwhelming response to both requests. DeeDee Toner, a former librarian, established organizational methods for handling incoming books and getting them shelved, getting returns back on the shelf and, in general, running a library. Barbara Perler continues to play an integral part organizing library volunteers and communicating information to them.

The library owes its success to the

over 20 residents who give their time to this effort. Many have been teachers and librarians, but they have one thing in common: they love books. They also enjoy giving back to the community, and get great satisfaction in what they are doing. The current core group of volunteers includes:

- Rita Hamlin, past president, has made some important suggestions to keep the library running smoothly. She says most users are recreational readers and that the library is able to maintain up-to-date books and current authors. Consequently, most books read are fiction, biographical, and historical. The library also maintains large-print books and is establishing a collection of books-on-tape. Recent magazines are also available.
- Sandy Kanellis is the library’s reporter and writes *The View* monthly article. Her article keeps the community up to date about new goings-on within the library. Sandy stated that the library is run on an honor system and the committee appreciates the timely return of borrowed books.
- Gail Clarke and Sharon Warner, co-presidents this year, are responsible for advising and implementing new ideas to improve library operations. Both women were proud to relate the library lent out 966 books during the month of February. That’s great usage for a library this size. Sharon

emphasized the many compliments they get every day and the feeling that comes from that appreciation.

- Darcy Muir is another volunteer who helps with processing books, shelving, and looking at ways to continually improve the library.
- Joanne Summa is a significant help to the library. She collects books that are duplicates, donating them to local hospitals and senior citizen centers. She also sells the duplicates that are in better condition on-line, and the committee uses those funds to defray the cost of library supplies.

Our library is not a static entity. It is always evolving and adding new books. Today the library represents a wide range of books including recent bestsellers and many of the classics to attract the widest possible readership.

According to a recent Associated Press poll, 73% of Americans read books each year; the heaviest readers are those with college degrees and those over age 50.

Libraries are the heart of every community, and our library and its volunteers help our community thrive. These books are donations from the SCSH community who believe in the importance of reading a good book. In a recent movie, *Shadowland*, Anthony Hopkins said, “*We read to know we are not alone.*” And books are truly our best companions.



News About Indio

Hi again, Hillites.

The \$30 million neighborhood park and sports complex is nearing the final stages of receiving Federal grant funds. The initial request of \$5 million grant was submitted in early March. Approval of that request will determine if the city can move forward. Designs for the park include four baseball diamonds, two lighted baseball diamonds, two lighted basketball courts and two football fields. The sports complex will be built at the northwest corner of Jackson and Market streets and will also include a dog park and an open play area. The future phases of the 54-acre proposed Indio Central Park and Public Safety Complex will include a water park plus a new fire station and police headquarters at each end of the complex. City leaders expect to hear back by September about whether we qualify for the \$5 million application to the state as well as \$8.5 million in Federal stimulus money, which could be enough to build the park and sports complex.

JFK Hospital's lawsuit against the city of Indio, Indio City Council and Joint Replacement Hospitals of America citing

environmental concerns is still on hold. The lawsuit alleges that the city violated the California Environmental Quality Act by approving the project without environmental review. The city of Indio contends that the hospital is using the environmental review angle to stop the project and that the real concern is competition.

Mrs. Laree Youngblood-White, spokeswoman for the Department of Consumer Affairs spoke before 30 of our residents. She pointed out that seniors have been 30 percent more affected by scams in the past few years. Some tips to avoid scams include:

- Be wary of appeals that are high pressure or that tug at heartstrings, like pleas about children, law enforcement, or patriotism.
- Ask for the name of the charity and what percentage of the funds will go to administrative costs.
- Do not agree to donate over the phone or at your front door and never, ever wire money.

Indio has a brand new facility housing Public Works, Fleet Services and the Indio Water Authority. It is a \$16 million, 39,000-square-foot, single-story building at 83-701 Avenue 45. The new building replaces a much smaller 60-year-old structure. The new building contains a customer service and payment area for residents, administrative offices, conference rooms, fleet service warehouse facilities, a fleet fuel island, maintenance shops, and a scrap transfer facility. The funds for the new structure did not come from the city's general operating budgets, but from Indio Water Authority Revenue Bond B funds and Public Buildings Development impact fees. The new corporate yard building joins the Senior Center and Teen

Center as a network of facilities built recently to accommodate the growth and needs of a city of 82,000 plus citizens.

Indio's Performing Arts Center (IPAC) will play an instrumental role in the 2nd annual Coachella Valley Latino International. The festival, which will be held from October 15-17, will have a new location for the screenings because IPAC does not have the right equipment to show the films. IPAC will still be used for press conferences. There is a possibility the movies may be shown at Movies 8 in Indio. The festival will showcase eight screenings. Organizers are looking for feature films that promote a positive depiction of the Latino community from its culture to socioeconomic and political standpoints.

I'm sure most of you are aware that our city government is under question on numerous issues relating to credit card use, putting Federal funds at risk, investigations by a Grand Jury, a multimillion dollar deficit, city spending habits, early retirement deals, pay to our city manager, and the hiring of Orange County-based Urban Futures to "right-size" City Hall. I have received a lot of inquiries, verbal and written, to spell out what is going on. My advice is: get involved. These are your tax dollars at work. Go to council meetings and listen.

That's 30! Shop in Indio and drive carefully.

Why? Volunteer

To celebrate National Volunteer Week (which began in 1974, and takes place this year from April 18–24), we present the inspiring stories of three neighbors who epitomize what it means to “give back” to our community.

A year ago, Andy Fisichelli and his wife Ellie attended the Volunteers Appreciation luncheon hosted by the Association and Del Webb at the Montecito Clubhouse. There they listened to the guest speaker, Indio Human Services Manager Dave Ison, talk about the need for residents of Indio to volunteer in the community. Several months later Andy went to see the city’s brand new Senior Center. Impressed by what he saw, he asked how he could help, and was put to work as a monitor and instructor in the fitness center. He has been there ever since, volunteering two or three hours every Wednesday.

“The Center serves a fairly elderly population,” Andy said, explaining why he volunteers. “Some who come in are very limited in their physical abilities. You see people with walkers,

some who can’t bend their knees, or can hardly move. I show them how to use the machines and weights correctly to make sure they don’t hurt themselves. In a couple of weeks they invariably start to feel better.”

Andy tells of one lady who came in so stiff and bent over she was barely able to breathe. “I put her on three special machines, and even though she was using almost no weight that very first day, she was thrilled with her improvement. ‘I can actually breathe,’ she said, taking a big breath. There is a lot of satisfaction that comes from helping people in ways like that.”

Like many who volunteer, Andy is involved with more than one organization. He also serves on the supervisory committee of the Palm Springs Federal Credit Union, a position for which he had to pass an exam on financial and banking regulations. “We conduct financial reviews and oversee audits and things like that,” he said. “There is a lot more scrutiny about these things now than there was a few years ago.”

Ellie, his wife, doesn’t volunteer outside the community, but does with the Association. She helps at the

Lifestyle Desk in the clubhouse, where she answers phones, greets visitors, sells tickets and generally helps other residents get answers to their questions. Both Ellie and Andy are also street leaders with the Emergency Preparedness Committee and participate in Neighborhood Watch. They are Resident Ambassadors as well, helping the Del Webb sales department to host prospective home buyers. Since they moved to Shadow Hills after many years in Palm Springs, they know the Coachella Valley well and can answer just about any question a visitor might have about the area.

With all they do the Fisichellis stay very busy. “Like the other day,” said Andy, “we left at 8:30 in the morning and didn’t get home until 7:30 at night. Fortunately every day isn’t like that. But we love it.”

Arnie Gilman is another resident who donates much of his time. “I volunteer a lot,” he said.

Arnie’s organizations of choice are the Jewish Federation of Palm Springs and the Desert Area and Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Desert. His association with the Federation is

a long one, going back to before he moved to Shadow Hills from Agoura Hills two years ago. “Between Los Angeles and here I’ve worked with the Federation for 15 years,” he said. “The Federation helps many organizations including Jewish Family Services and the Jewish Community Day School of the Desert, as well as organizations in Israel.”

Having worked in the garment business in Los Angeles, Arnie was chair of the Federation’s Fashion Division and as well as Super Sunday, an annual fundraiser for the Federation that is put on by more than 1,000 volunteers. He is currently vice president of the Federation’s Coachella Valley campaign. “There is plenty of need right here,” he said.

Like Andy, Arnie spreads his time over more than one organization. “I used to volunteer with Jewish Big Brothers, but after I moved here I went to one of the health fairs in the clubhouse and found out about Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Desert. Now I’m involved with them.”

He had to be vetted to become a Big Brother and pass a background check, then he went through an interview with a prospective child to see if they were comfortable with each other. They were, and now he mentors a boy who recently turned 13.

“He’s a typical teenager,” said Arnie, “so naturally his mother has problems with him. That’s normal, but in this case her husband has a terminal illness and she has another child. She has very little time for the boy. That’s where I come in. I’m not a babysitter, but I try to teach him right from wrong and help keep him out of trouble. I can be a friend to him, but with an adult mentality.”

Arnie spends time with his “little brother” every other week, taking him to the movies, or the Air Museum or Village Fest, or just talking. “When you make this kind of effort with a child, they’ll tell you things they might not tell their mom or dad. Of course, if he’s thinking or doing something dangerous, I’ll tell his mother. But otherwise I just try to be a shoulder to lean on.”

There is, Arnie said, an assumption that all such children come from low-income homes. “That’s not true. Children who come from wealthy families can have troubles, too. This child’s mom is a successful professional, but she realized she can’t handle everything on her own.”

Arnie sums up his philosophy about volunteering very clearly. “You have to help people,” he said. “I grew up very, very poor. My dad died when I was young. I know what it’s like to need help, and what it means to get help.”

Classic Rides to Take You Back . . .

At some point, you've probably heard the tongue-in-cheek observation: "The difference between men and boys is the price of their toys." Well, we can guarantee you that some gorgeous examples of this phenomenon will be on display in our clubhouse parking lot on April 10 from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm – along with lots of other fun included!

That is when our Lifestyle Department is staging a classic car show expected to bring together about 100 of our Valley's most beautiful and inspiring rides. Exhibitors will compete for trophies in three categories (stock cars, modifieds, and a special Corvette class); and *you* get to choose the winners!

There will also be some 20 vendors offering auto-related items, and the jukebox will be spinning some great "oldies" music. Plus you'll be able to grab a quick bite and beverage from the food stands in the amphitheater area.

To get you in the mood to recall those good times you spent "cruisin'," this month we introduce you to two neighbors, each with a passion for unique classic wheels.

Irv Kushner (born in Chicago but raised in LA, and a Shadow Hills resident for about two years) is the proud owner of a 1955 Chevy Nomad. Although the Nomad was only produced for three years (1955–1957), it achieved almost instant "cult status" as the ultimate station wagon because it combined racy two-door styling with innovative engineering and a quality build. The Nomad's wrap-around rear glass, forward-slanting tailgate sporting vertical chrome "stripes," fluted rear roof, and powerful new V-8 engine — elements more like those of a sporty coupé — quickly put an end to Chevy's "stodgy" reputation.

Only a little more than 8,000 Nomads were made in 1955. Irv's is particularly rare because it has factory air conditioning that is usually found only on more expensive marques like Cadillac: AC was built into less than 0.1% of all Nomads made. At one car show, Irv recalls he was amazed to see a crowd gather around his vehicle because they had never seen one with factory air!

Irv's Nomad also has a "wonder bar" (signal-seeking) radio plus a rare "remote outside mirror" (adjustable from inside the car), features we now take for granted on our modern rides. And his Nomad also shares the same "waffle weave" interior vinyl upholstery as the 1955 Corvette.

Ultimately, though, poor sales (a total of only 22,375 units) doomed the original Nomad to extinction. Its \$2,571 price was \$300 more than Chevy's conventional 4-door wagon, and the Nomad's two doors — while daringly "cool" — made it less utilitarian for families. In 1958, redesigned 4-door wagons began to carry the Nomad name but, despite greater commercial success, they never inspired the passion of the first concept.

Jeff Rosenthal (born and raised on Long Island, NY, a California resident since 1969, and in Shadow Hills for 3½ years) owns a different breed: a 1965

Mustang. Jeff's is the rare, original factory GT model (with a heavy-duty suspension, fog lights, disc brakes, a four-barrel carb, and a five-instrument cluster). It also sports the deluxe, two-tone "pony" interior (featuring a running horse across the seatback).

When Ford introduced the original Mustang in April 1964 through the first modern "media blitz," the vehicle ignited the "muscle car" craze of the 1960s. Although the low-priced base models were designed for economical operation, Ford marketed Mustang's list of options — including a powerful V8 that generated up to 271 hp — as "the car to be designed by you."

The Mustang instantly proved one of the fastest selling vehicles ever: Ford booked orders for over 22,000 the first day. Enthusiasts dubbed the initial 121,000 models as "1964½" cars because they debuted before the traditional fall introduction of the new model year. In 1965, almost 560,000 Mustangs were produced. The long-hood, short deck design also earned the first automotive Tiffany Award for Excellence in American Design.

Different lifepaths led Irv and Jeff to the hobby that they now share. Irv (who spent most of his career in sales driving an assigned company car) says he "could never really afford a decent car" in his youth. He recalls it would have been "really cool to rev the engine and beat someone out of the starting block," something that just wasn't happening with the 1950 Plymouth station wagon he learned to drive on. So Irv began to "appreciate the cool cars, slick and sleek," especially because "they could attract the chicks."

By contrast, Jeff says that "cars have always been my life since 1962." What started as a part-time job with Ford in the service area while Jeff was

in college turned into his full-time career as a service manager in both New York and California.

Both men nonetheless agree on what makes a car a “classic:” its age (produced from the 1950s through 1970s), its popularity (as an icon of the times), and its unique styling or other innovative features. Irv says there is also a “wow!” factor about a classic ride: it may be “something you haven’t seen in years, even if it’s a 1951 Packard,” and it “brings back a lot of memories. Jeff agrees: “A considerable amount of the hype about a classic car is what it says to you.”

In their lifetimes, both men have enjoyed a number of special rides. Jeff currently owns his fourth vintage Mustang and has had six other classics, including a 1960 Alfa Romeo and a 1959 MGA roadster. Irv has also had some 10 classics including a 1955 Ford Fairlane, a 1957 Chevy

BelAir, and two Chevy Impalas.

When it comes to restoring their vehicles, Irv and Jeff describe themselves as “purists.” They “like to see a car the way it was,” true to the original specs with no modifications. When repairs are necessary, they scout out “new old stock” original parts; they “will use a replica only as a last resort,” even though some are of better quality than the original parts. By their definition, a majority of classic cars that you see these days are not “stock” but “modified,” often including modern features inside (like a fancy sound system).

You might think that both Irv and Jeff would shun driving their rides, worrying that road damage might occur or that mileage will mount. But both say that driving their cars is half the fun. Irv declares he “couldn’t enjoy a car with a \$20K paint job.” And Jeff particularly recalls one great road trip on the original Route 66 from the SoCal coast over to Flagstaff, Arizona, and back.

Asked which classic car he would most like to own – regardless of price – Irv says he could not pick just one. His candidate list includes a Tucker from the late 1940s, some of the 1950s T-Birds and Corvettes, and a hardtop convertible by Ford from the late 1950s. “And, of course, a Ferrari!”

But Jeff is much more specific: a 1965 Shelby Cobra with the renowned 289 V8, in fire engine red.

If this article is starting to make you reminisce, be sure to mark your calendar now for April 10 – and come on out to the clubhouse parking lot for a nostalgic and fun-filled journey through automotive history!

HILTON HEAD, SC, MARCH 19, 2009: According to data just released by the Sporting Goods Manufacturers Association (SGMA), tennis is the fastest growing sport in America among individual traditional sports with an increase in participation of 43% from 2000 to 2008. According to the SGMA, tennis was one of only six sports to experience participation growth exceeding 40% from 2000 through 2008. Tennis is ahead of other traditional sports like baseball, ice hockey, gymnastics, and football, all of which suffered a decline in participation during the past eight years. In the last year alone, tennis experienced a 9.6% growth in participation.

The SGMA study is the latest in a series of reports and studies that have cited the extraordinary growth for tennis. In December, the Taylor Research Group (TRG) reported that tennis participation reached a record high of 27 million players in 2008, more than any other period in the past 15 years. Sales of tennis racquets and balls have both also increased significantly; most notably, there was an 88% increase in the sale of youth racquets from 2003 through 2008, according to the TRG report.

Exercise for Older Adults

How do I get started?

It is important to wear loose, comfortable clothing and well-fitting, sturdy shoes. If you are not already active, begin slowly. Start with exercises that you are already comfortable doing. Starting slowly makes it less likely that you will injure yourself. Starting slowly also helps prevent soreness from “overdoing” it. You don’t have to exercise at a high intensity to get most health benefits.

Walking is an excellent activity to begin with. As you become used to exercising, or if you are already active, slowly increase the intensity of your exercise program.

What type of exercise should I do?

There are several types of exercise that you should do. This includes some type of aerobic activity for at least 30 minutes on most, and preferably, all days of the week. Examples are walking, swimming, and bicycling. You should also do resistance, or strength training at least three days per week.

Exercise is only good for you if you are feeling well. Wait to exercise until you feel better if you have a cold, flu, or other illness. If you miss exercise for more than two weeks, start slowly again.

Things to remember!

- Warm up for at least five minutes before each exercise session
- Complete all movements in a slow, controlled fashion.
- Don’t hold your breath.
- Stop if you feel pain.
- Cool down after a workout for at least five minutes (longer in warmer weather)
- Stretch each muscle after your workout.






