PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Living in Sun City Shadow Hills is Pretty Special by Anyone's Standards

With 3,450 homes, we are not just a Homeowners Association but a vibrant community larger than many cities in California and the second-largest HOA in the Coachella Valley. As such we are a self-governing entity with five-member Board of Directors (BOD) at the helm.

There are two important meetings that your Board of Directors attend: executive session and open session. Executive session is not open to the membership, and by law it is only during these sessions that confidential matters may be discussed, such as personnel issues, contract negotiations, matters of rules enforcement and collections, and legal transactions. There can be as many executive session meetings as needed during the month. Usually there is at least one.

The other important meeting is, of course, the regularly scheduled open Board meeting, where all homeowners are invited to attend in person or watch the video from the comfort of their homes when it is posted on our website. At these meetings, homeowners can offer their input by submitting speaker forms, submitted prior to the start of the meetings. As with many meetings, Board meetings may not be your idea of a fun way to spend an afternoon. But remember this is your opportunity each month to see how our community is being managed plus how our money is being spent, find out what plans are in the works, and make comments on agenda items or policies and changes you would like the board to consider.

Managing SCSH is a big undertaking, and everything can't be done by the five members of the Board of Directors alone. The Directors are assisted by volunteer

advisory committee members. Our many committees investigate, evaluate, report, advise and make recommendations to the board. The work done by the many volunteer committee members assists the BOD in governing our HOA. Without the many hours of work that they invest and the reports they provide, the Board simply would be unable to manage the volume of work necessary to run the community.

The advisory committees include City Development, Finance, Safety Advisory, Facility & Services, Design Review, Covenants, Emergency Preparedness, Food & Beverage, Landscape Advisory, Health & Fitness, Golf Advisory, Lifestyles Advisory, Information Advisory, *The View*, and others.

In addition to our advisory committees, there are many homeowners who volunteer their time in the library, deliver *The View*, staff the Lifestyle desk in the Montecito, and elsewhere throughout SCSH. I invite you to bring your professional experience to a committee by letting us know of your interest.





Design Review Committee (DRC)

Just How Tall Can Those Plants Grow Before They Are Trimmed?

As good neighbors, we ask this question of ourselves and sometimes wonder about our neighbor's bushes as well. In a community like ours, the Design Rules address these concerns clearly. Softscape or plant material information can be found in Section 5.2.

Ground surfaces are considered part of the softscape, and there should be no bare dirt showing on a homeowner's lot. If there is, it is time to replenish with like material. An upgrade that is any more extensive will require an HIA application.

The maximum height of front yard plant material, within six (6) feet of the street, is forty-two (42) inches at maturity; and at least thirty (30) percent of the front yard plant material must be less than twelve (12) inches in height at maturity. An exception is made when plants are against the homeowner's dwelling, but they must not exceed the height of the roof line at maturity. An example would be climbing vines and bougainvillea.

5.2.1 Plant Material along Knee Walls: *The height of plant material along the knee wall may not exceed*

more than sixty (60) inches in height from the original grade and must be maintained on the golf course side by the homeowner. (Including the short fence joining the block wall.) Trees and palms are excluded.

5.2.2 Plant Material for Interior Lot – Side and Back Walls: *The height of shrubs for interior lots may not exceed more than twenty-four (24) inches above the top of the wall as measured from the original finish grade and must be maintained by the homeowner. Trees and palms are excluded.*

What to Do When Pigeons Are Nesting Under Solar Panels

This Committee wrote a lengthy article on this subject in the November 2021 issue of *The View*. It can be found online (www.scszca.com/pigeons) and is an important read for anyone with solar panels. There are financial, health, and other concerns caused by bird infestation. The best way homeowners have found to keep pigeons from roosting under solar panels is to install a barrier around the perimeter of the panels and the roof.

What To Do When You Get an Earthquake Early Warning


What should you do if you get an earthquake early warning? The best advice to give people when an earthquake strikes depends on where you are, among other things, but for the U.S., the advice is: **DROP, COVER, HOLD ON!**

Would you know what to do if you felt an earthquake while at work? At home? At the gym? Researchers who study earthquake safety want the answer to these questions to be “yes.”

Over the last few years, the U.S. has rolled out an earthquake early warning system for the West Coast called ShakeAlert. When an earthquake occurs, real time data from seismometers determines how large an earthquake will be and which areas will be affected. Alerts are then automatically sent to individuals and facilities likely to experience strong shaking. The system can give people a few seconds to protect themselves before seismic waves arrive. Get the MyShake app for your Apple or Android cellphone: <https://myshake.berkeley.edu>.

But once people receive the warning, what should they do? People who haven’t experienced an earthquake before are most likely either to freeze or flee, according to studies. They may pause to see what others are doing. But during a large earthquake, a few seconds of hesitation could be costly. No two earthquakes are alike; the dangers vary depending on building construction, the type of earthquake, and even the time of day or season.

U.S. injuries during earthquakes have occurred from tripping and falling while moving, from objects falling and flying, and from the collapse of building exteriors such as windows or facades. A common misconception is that doorways are a good place to go – but in truth doorways are not a stronger part of the building, they and don’t protect you from flying debris. Getting low to the ground and under a sturdy table or desk can best protect people from falling objects. Wheelchair users may not be best served by dropping but should instead lock their wheels, cover their head and hold on.

Although there is no one perfect response that accounts for every scenario, thinking through and practicing your actions ahead of time gives you the best chance of survival.

Question of the Month: What is the Replacement Fund?

Last month we discussed the Reserve Study, and this month we will learn how the Reserve Study affects the Sun City Shadow Hills Replacement Fund. The items that need replacement after their useful life are found on the replacement fund list if they have a useful life of 30 years or less. This list is created by the experts we hire to conduct the Reserve Study.

During a Type 1 Full Study, these experts visit our community, take photographs of equipment, and record measurements. Then the experts develop a useful life schedule and determine an estimated cost to replace each item at the end of its useful life. Once the experts make these determinations, they then determine an amount each year that our HOA must put in reserve to replace that item at some predetermined time in the future.

When an item needs replacement, it is identified on the reserve study so that the department head, such as maintenance, can seek bids for its replacement. The department head evaluates the quality of the suppliers and suppliers' product and prepares a Board Action Form (BAF) to which the suppliers' bids for replacement are attached. There are usually at least three bids on each replacement request.

This BAF then goes to the SCSH General Manager who will in turn forward it to the Finance Advisory Committee and its Sub-Committee for pricing investigation, inspection of the item for which

replacement is requested, and preparation of a recommendation to the Board about whether the replacement request is justified and priced properly. The Board makes the ultimate decision on the replacement purchase using the replacement funds.

The list of items covered by the Replacement Fund numbers in the hundreds. The items range from patio furniture to ice machines and golf course mowers. The FAC Sub-Committee has members who have experience in various fields like construction, purchasing, and engineering. These members are all volunteers who spend their time assisting our community in evaluating if the replacement request is justified or if it can be safely deferred.

A lot of consideration has gone into keeping this community in first class condition, and we are fortunate to have had management practices over the years that have created a sound replacement fund to meet the needs determined by the Reserve Study, without which we could be exposed to special assessments or community loans.

The FAC Sub-Committee has two openings. If you possess specialized skills or experience from your past or current work activities, we encourage you to complete a Committee Interest Form and help us keep this community financially sound.

Active Shooter: A Growing Epidemic

This information will not surprise anyone who stays abreast of current events in our world. Active shooter incidents in the U.S. are on the rise. Between 2000-2020, there were 373 active shooter incidents in the country. A tragic shooting at a Tops Friendly Markets store in Buffalo, NY, left 10 people dead and three others injured. This marked the 202nd shooting incident so far this year. That same weekend, two people were killed and seven injured during separate shooting incidents at a church in Laguna Woods, CA, and a flea market in Houston, TX. These are some of the recent shooting incidents across the country. As attacks persist and rise, preparation and vigilance will help to keep you safe.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) defines an active shooter as “an individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area; in most cases, active shooters use firearms, and there is no pattern or method to their selection of victims.”

Fifteen minutes is the average time between the initiation of an active shooter event and the arrival of law enforcement personnel. In that time, the incident can be completely over.

During an Active Shooting Incident

In the event of an active shooter incident, the DHS advises people to utilize the “Run, Hide, Fight” method.

When there is an active threat, run. Once you are safe, call 911.

If escape is not possible, hide. Block the doors to prevent the shooter from entering your hiding space. Avoid windows and silence your phone.

Only as a last resort if your life is in danger, fight.

The Aftermath

During and after an active shooter event, immediate medical attention will be required for individuals who are injured. The U.S. military looked at data from casualties during the Vietnam War and learned that simple actions can make an enormous difference, especially before paramedics arrive with advanced medical care. One helpful technique is applying a tourniquet, which is a constricting band wrapped around an arm or a leg to cut off the blood supply and therefore stop bleeding. It is important to place a tourniquet high and tight. If someone is bleeding from a part of the body where a tourniquet won't be useful, wadding up a cloth into a firm ball and applying pressure on the injury is recommended. Use two hands if possible, and get your body weight over your arms. Hold firm pressure on the injured area for three full minutes. Anyone can learn how to perform these simple, potentially lifesaving techniques without special training.


From the Earth, for the People

They say “it takes a village to raise a child,” and that’s true even when the child is an organic farm. Temalpakh Farm was the brainchild of Mary Ann Martin, the former leader of the Augustine Band of Cahuilla Indians. Today the farm and market are a beautiful and serene reality thanks to years of planning and hard work.

This is even more remarkable when you understand the situation of this industrious tribe in 1988. At that time, there were only three adult members of the Augustine Band: Mary Ann and her two brothers. They petitioned for recognition of the band by the Federal government and, as a result, it became the smallest Native American band in the U.S.

But that was just the beginning. After her brothers passed away, Mary Ann became the last surviving adult member. She went on to build the Augustine Casino located in Coachella. Mary Ann also had a dream to build an organic farm in order to provide healthy, organic food. She didn’t live long enough to see this become a reality; but her daughter, Amanda Vance, the current Tribal Council Chairperson, moved it forward and Temalpakh Farm officially opened in 2021.

Pathway to the Pollinating Garden

Recently, Sun City Shadow Hills Desert Gardeners club had a firsthand view of what Temalpakh Farm is all about. Temalpakh means “from the earth” in the Cahuilla language. This 20-acre haven grows a large variety of fruits and vegetables year-round. The goal is to produce healthy, organic, affordable food for the community and our valley. No harsh pesticides or chemicals are ever used. They make their own compost from the farm’s refuse. They’ve added a pollinating

garden to encourage the bee population. They built a 25,000-panel solar farm in 2010 and, this past January 2022, opened a farm-to-table market where they sell their produce. Finally, they’ve created a beautiful venue where visitors can relax, enjoy the peaceful surroundings, and renew themselves.

After our club’s tour of the farm and its workings, our tour leader, Juanita Oaks, took us to the man-made mound where we had a bird’s eye view of the whole farm. The mound is topped with seven large feathers made from rubber. This artwork represents the seven current adult tribal council members of the Augustine Band, the children of the original three members from 1988.


Big Bear Lake, located in the San Bernardino Mountains, is completely snow-fed and measures seven miles long and almost three miles wide. At an elevation of 6,743 feet, the area offers an escape from LA's urban sprawl. On the east shore is Big Bear City and on the south shore, Big Bear Lake. Both are small towns that offer creature comforts for the escapees. While the lake provides fishing and water sports, the surrounding forest boasts some of the best hiking trails in California.



THE BARTENDER TO THE STARS

The Bartender to the Stars

Joey Randazzo, an only child, was born in 1945 in Chicago, IL. In 1923, his Sicilian parents had met each other on a trans-Atlantic ship bound for New York City, where they instantly fell in love and married in 1928 after moving to Chicago.

Joey's father worked at a local brewery that, unknown to him, was owned by none other than a Mr. Alphonse Gabriel Capone, aka "Scarface" to many other people. Joey's dad started as a truck driver but – through hard work, loyalty, and dedication – moved up through the ranks to become a foreman.

In 1951 the family moved to Burbank, CA, where Joey, as a small-framed youngster, was constantly picked on by the bigger kids. Then one day a friend told the bullies that Joey's father was "connected" to the mafia, and the bullying immediately stopped.

In 1963, 18-year-old Joey and his friends frequently went dancing at the Cinnamon Cinder, a nightclub in nearby Studio City that was owned by Bob Eubanks. At the time, nightclubs could not serve alcoholic drinks, only sodas. One evening, the regulars were

doing a new dance called the "Dirty Dog" and, when Mr. Eubanks saw Joey's very sexy and suggestive moves, he kicked him out of the club. Later, Joey was allowed to return; and Mr. Eubanks even hired him as a bartender because the clubs were now allowed to serve alcohol.

But then Joey was drafted into the Army in 1966, where he served until 1968. Even though he was in Vietnam, Joey did not see action; he was a colonel's driver. Upon his honorable discharge, Joey attended a maître d' school in Las Vegas, NV. His first job as a maître d' was at the Las Vegas International Hilton, and the opening act on his first night there was none other than Elvis Presley.

Elvis's manager, Joe Esposito, knew Joey's mom through his family in Chicago; and soon the three of them became close friends. When Elvis wanted to throw a private party, he told Joe to hire Joey as the bartender. At the end of the party, Elvis gave Joey a golden TCB (taking care of business) medallion as a thank-you memento. Joey remembers vividly how

“The King” treated him so nicely; was so charismatic, friendly, and warm; and was truly down to earth and genuine. Oh, and Elvis always paid Joey at least twice what the bill was.


Joey recalls that, after one of his shows, Elvis walked into a café to order a hot fudge sundae. He saw two girls at a nearby table and one was in tears. When Elvis inquired what was wrong, the sobbing girl replied, “My mom just died, and I don’t have enough money to go home to give her a proper burial. I just don’t know what to do.” Well, you guessed it. The King helped the grieving girl by paying for everything (airfare, hotel, funeral, rental car, food, etc.).

Joey also tended bar for a few “Rat Pack” private parties and remembers that they were all very nice and respectful, too, especially Dean Martin. They paid twice the rate, as well. And then there was the indomitable Jack Benny, the alleged cheapskate, who was very generous in paying for Joey’s bartending services.

From 1972 to 1983, Joey lived in Orange County and found work as a bartender at the Disneyland Hotel, where he met the always smiling 6’ 3” John Wayne; the drop-dead-gorgeous Liz Taylor; the hilarious Don Rickles; and the diminutive Tony Randall, who had a funny gait because of his tiny size 6 feet. Tony’s favorite drink was Smirnoff on the rocks. Joey reminisces about meeting Don Rickles for the first time when he approached the bar and shouted, “Hey, shorty, how long is it gonna take to get a drink?” They became good friends after that rather harsh introduction.

That was the way it was for the “bartender to the stars.” Joey recalls that nearly everyone he met treated him with respect and was very friendly. He never felt intimidated, embarrassed, or out of his league with these bigger-than-life Hollywood superstars.

Joey married in 1973 and had a son and daughter but divorced in 1978. Then in 1980, while working the bar at a restaurant called Rembrandt’s in Yorba Linda, he met Karen and her 4-year-old daughter. They married two years later.

From 1988 to 2005, Joey tended bar at the Revere House Restaurant in Tustin, CA. After that, Joey started promoting car shows, eventually buying and selling 51 classic cars over 10 years.

Finally, in 2019, Joey and Karen moved to Sun City Shadow Hills after his realtor-niece told them about a nice home here. It was love at first sight as they rejoiced in the welcoming atmosphere and overwhelming friendliness of people within SCSH. For leisure, Joey likes to golf and Karen loves to swim. Besides their three adult children, there are now five gorgeous grandkids.


DICK'S CHILDHOOD DREAM!

Rarely do we know from childhood exactly what we want to do when we are grown. However, Richard (Dick) Ewers understood from the moment he saw a plane fly overhead that he wanted to be a pilot. Of course, he may have been influenced by his father, a career Marine Corps aviator. The family traveled widely before returning to Tustin, CA, where Dick completed high school.

Four years later, after graduating from the Air Force Academy, Dick was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Marines. Then came "grunt training" in Quantico, VA. Luckily for Dick, he was selected for U.S. Navy jet pilot training. His dream was coming true!

Dick spent 21 years in the Marine Corps, most of the time as a fighter pilot flying A-4, F-4, and F/A-18 aircraft. His military career included combat in Vietnam and then tours of duty flying F-4s aboard the aircraft carriers USS *Ranger* and USS *Midway*. Dick says that carrier flying was fun, exciting, extremely demanding, and sometimes frightening. Night carrier landings meant flying in a totally black environment that pilots had never experienced ashore. Landing on a carrier with only a few dim lights for guidance meant that missing the runway would be disastrous!

While Dick was on active duty, he earned a Master of Science degree in Aeronautical Systems and graduated from the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School. Afterward, he could have joined the astronaut program like five of his test pilot buddies. But Dick decided this was not for him: there would be too much waiting for space travel and not enough flying. Instead, he served as a pilot on the F/A-18 Hornet during its early development and tested improvements to the F-4 and A-4 planes. His career ultimately led to his appointment as commanding officer of an F-4 fighter squadron.

Dick retired as a Lieutenant Colonel from the Marine Corps in 1989 and went to work as an engineering test pilot for Westinghouse Electronic Systems, where he supported the development of new and existing radar systems.

Nine years later, Dick was hired as a research test pilot at NASA's Dryden Flight Research Center at Edwards Air Force Base, CA. This is where America's aviation history is made and our newest innovations are perfected. For example, the space shuttle made its first landings here; and this is where Chuck Yeager broke the sound barrier. Dick spent 18 years conducting high-speed flight research for NASA's Airborne Science program on F/A-18, DC-8, and Gulfstream III aircraft.

The DC-8 was built to be a trans-oceanic, 175-passenger airplane. But in 1986 NASA converted one to become a flying laboratory. The plane takes scientists and their highly sensitive instruments anywhere in the world to study issues like global warming, predict hurricane tracks, and assess airborne pollution. Every mission Dick flew involved up to 30 scientists who monitored and maintained their instruments during data collection. Each flight was over 10 hours long and ranged in altitude from the earth's surface to 40,000 feet.

The DC-8 cockpit was designed in the early 1960s, so no computers! It took three people in the cockpit to fly the plane: the pilot, co-pilot, and flight engineer. The flight engineer was responsible for all the tasks that computers now accomplish. Dick and his crew flew many missions into and through hurricanes, including Hurricane Earl in 2010, to measure wind speeds, pressure changes, temperatures, and turbulence.

To support polar science research, many times Dick flew 1,500 miles each way to reach Antarctica from an airport in Chile. The mission would then require flying precise ground tracks at low altitude for four to five hours, traversing the Antarctic ice fields. This was done, flying the same path every two years, to allow the scientists onboard to track changes in the thickness of the ice and the speed of glacial movement, plus attempt to quantify the effects of global warming.

Dick was retired by NASA on his 70th birthday. He jokes they didn't have enough defibrillators to support old guys like him who still loved to fly.

Dick met his wife, Sharon, at a party where she was the blind date of Dick's friend. The friend obviously was blind, and Dick certainly was not because he called Sharon the very next day.

During their 53 years of marriage, Dick flew his own Cessna T210. The couple has two grown children – their son Gary served 20 years as a Marine Corps helicopter pilot, and daughter Corie is a realtor – and three teenage granddaughters. Much to Dick's dismay, none of their granddaughters has expressed any interest in the Marine Corps.

Don't despair, Dick, they could still marry into the military.

SNOWBIRDS ARE GOOD EGGS

It would seem none of the permanent residents of the Coachella Valley are happy with the arrival of the snowbirds. I've heard people complain that they are unwanted troublemakers. Snowbirds have been victimized by many who claim they clog the roads, crowd the outdoor seating at our restaurants, fill the golf courses, and generally take up too much space.

We've become a society quick to blame, stereotype, and spread misinformation. What an injustice! These rumors and false claims spring from the mouths of permanent residents who just don't know the facts. There are many benefits to having snowbirds in our communities and, because they don't speak up in their own defense, I will attempt to educate the throngs of people who point accusatory fingers.

Snowbirds contribute to the diversity of our neighborhoods by adding to our knowledge and increasing our appreciation of our surrounding environment. Let me explain in greater detail. There are three easily identifiable categories of snowbirds. The first is the Western snowbird, the kind we see here a lot, and they tend to migrate from West Coast states like California. Next are the Eastern snowbirds who favor states like Florida. And finally, the North Central snowbirds who prefer to winter in the central U.S. Although many are seasonal residents, they often transition to permanent residency. However, during the breeding season, many migrate to colder weather

in Canada. Generally, they are monogamous and mate for life.

You look confused. Let me elaborate further. All three groups are called Junco birds and are in the sparrow family. They range between five to six and one-half inches in size. The Western snowbirds are black or gray, and some even have a pinkish cast to their sides. Eastern snowbirds are slate in color, and the North Central ones may have white markings.

Snowbirds have choreographed mating rituals.

Males bow and perform wing quivers and fan their tails to attract females. Female birds pick the fanning and quivering male they most desire.

It's interesting to note that snowbirds were identified as a class of Junco birds within the sparrow family as early as the 1600s. Originally the term was used to identify men who joined the armed forces and needed food and clothing during the winter months. It wasn't until the early 1900s that the term "Snowbirds" was used to define humans who moved to warmer climates each winter.

So, if you hear any disparaging remarks about snowbirds in our communities, I hope you will defend their right to stay here. We need all the diversity that nature provides.




Bunco

just slightly and you won't have to shoot through the plastic bag. This also works great in the rain, snow or at the beach. Also never change lenses in those situations unless you're indoors.


