PRESIDENT'S REPORT

JOHN MACDONNELL | PRESIDENT

To borrow from the lyrics of a great song, "Well, here we are again, I guess it must be fate." By the time this message is available online on the official website or reaches the mail tubes in *The View* magazine, it will be the dawn of a new year for all of us and our Association. As President of the Sun City Shadow Hills Homeowners Association, I wish to offer my sincere best wishes to every one of our homeowners and residents for a happy, healthy, and successful 2023.

I also wish to extend my gratitude for being allowed to serve as Board President for the past 21 months. Many thanks go to all the Board members with whom I have been privileged to serve. Special thanks also go to the volunteers on the many advisory committees, the staff of our management company, and service providers—all of whom work together every day and night to make this community run as efficiently, safely, and economically as possible. Without all these people working in harmony and good faith in the community's best interest, it would be much more difficult and expensive, if not impossible, to preserve, protect and improve our facilities and homes as well as increase our property values. I also want to thank our owners and residents for their understanding, support, cooperation, and participation in the many events that truly make this community a happy and pleasant place to live, vacation, and enjoy.

As we begin another year together, we are approaching another annual meeting of owners on Tuesday, April 4, 2023, when again, in accordance with our governing documents, we will have an election of directors. At that time, owners will vote to fill two board member positions for two-year terms. At our Board meeting on December 19, the Nominating Committee announced the candidates that expressed a willingness and interest to serve in those positions.

Home sales each year bring us many new residents who may not be familiar with the election process

established by our governing documents. So, to review, our Board consists of five directors, each elected to serve a two-year term. As indicated, this year, we will elect two directors, and in 2024, we will elect three. There are no term limits for service as a director. After the election results are announced, the five directors meet to elect the president, vice president, treasurer, secretary, and member at large, each of whom will fill that position for one year. Thus, officers are determined and can change each year. Should a director or officer leave for any reason, the Board is empowered to determine, by a majority vote, who will fill the open position until the next annual election.

I strongly urge every homeowner to exercise their right to vote. At this next election, two directors will be elected; therefore, each home will have two votes. Votes cannot be cumulated (except when three or more directors will be selected, which will be the case in 2024). There will be many events that will assist you in determining whom you wish to vote for, including candidate forums, mailings and homeowner gatherings. I encourage you to educate yourselves in order to cast an informed vote. The selection of directors is an important right, and perhaps the most direct way homeowners can influence the atmosphere and direction of our community. So, please participate in this vital task.

Sometimes elections (because they are competitive) can be seen as divisive. The HOA strives to ensure that they are open, transparent, and fair to all candidates. Hopefully, our elections create opportunities for our homeowners to become informed and make wise decisions about who will represent them and make the hard decisions for no pay other than the satisfaction of contributing and a job well done.

As we enter 2023, I would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone a Happy New Year, with a reminder that patience, kindness, and compassion go a long way to make Sun City Shadow Hills a wonderful place where our residents, staff, vendors, and guests experience a true sense of belonging and happiness. We recently had an unusual incident at the HOA office in which a guest of a resident caused our team to fear for their safety. Due to this unfortunate event, you will see new cameras being installed in the next couple of weeks.

On October 31, 2022, the Board approved the 2023 Budget reflecting our new monthly assessment of \$337, effective January 2023, and the annual budget disclosure mailer was distributed to all residents. The 283 additional email consent forms received from homeowners helped to reduce the cost of that distribution by \$1,300. Our audit mailer is scheduled for the end of February, and it would be great to increase homeowner participation, so we can continue to decrease this cost. I encourage you to register for email consent which allows the HOA staff to email you written correspondence which will expedite the communication process and reduce our mailer cost. Connie has lots of great events coming your way over the next few months which we will all enjoy. FACILITIES & MAINTENANCE UPDATE

Facilities

- Replacement of 30 commercial high-efficiency HVAC rooftop units for the Montecito Clubhouse and Fitness Center.
- Repairs and recoating of approximately 34,500 sq. ft. of urethane foam roof for the Montecito Clubhouse.
- Replacement of approximately 8,400 sq. ft. of concrete sidewalk with commercial interlocking pavers at the Montecito Clubhouse.
- Restoration of the Santa Rosa walking track.
- Resurfacing of the Santa Rosa pool deck.
- Resurfacing of the Shadows Restaurant patio deck.
- Replacement of approximately 4,000 sq. ft. of failing concrete at the South Course Pro Shop, Snack Bar sidewalk, and golf cart stage area.
- Purchase and installation of outdoor patio dining tables, chairs, and umbrellas for the new Snack Bar Terrace.
- Replacement of the Montecito and Santa Rosa patio seat cushions and umbrellas.
- Replacement of the Montecito outdoor pool furniture.
- Repainting of the metal door and window trim at the Shadows Restaurant and Pro Shop.

Common Areas

- Rehabilitation of approximately 579,900 sq. ft. of asphalt street pavement.
- Restriping of Sun City Boulevard and Avenida Sombra street lines, stop bars, crosswalks, and legends.
- Installation of solar-powered LED flashing warning lights at all major pedestrian crosswalks.
- Renovation and repainting of all of Phase I common area block walls.
- Conversion of North Channel Pond #2 into a grass park with additional sidewalk path and seating areas.

Safety

- Installation of air-conditioned enclosures for all outdoor gates and surveillance equipment.
- Upgrade of all security cameras and surveillance equipment to high definition and night vision digital cameras.
- Replacement of Jefferson Gatehouse exit gates with commercial gate operator units.

Safety Advisory Committee

Keep Safety a Top Priority

Cities across our country face increasing rates of crime and violence, and our region is no exception. You and your visitors' safety is a priority for our security vendor, Allied Universal® Company and they have prepared these recommendations to communicate best practices for vigilance.

Staying Safe While Walking

- Be alert at all times, and refrain from wearing headphones to ensure you can hear your active surroundings.
- Carry your belongings securely and close to your body. Carry only the cash and credit cards you need at that time.
- Travel on populated and well-lit streets. Do not take shortcuts through isolated areas and, if you suspect someone is following you, head immediately to a store or another area with people.

- Avoid walking alone at night and, if possible, travel with one or more other individuals.
- When walking on the sidewalk, stay closest to the street and avoid areas with heavy bushes, dark doorways, or places of concealment.
- Should someone harass you, keep walking. Do not respond to them or engage. Should a motorist approach you while walking, reverse your direction. If they continue, seek a safe and populated location.
- Always have your door keys in hand prior to reaching your home. Never search for them while standing outside.
- Do not be afraid to yell for help if necessary. Your voice is a weapon.
- Always have your cell phone, know your location and, in case of emergency, dial 911.

Staying Safe in Hotels

- Be wary of unexpected persons coming to your hotel room. Never open the door to unsolicited room service or maintenance people. Contact the front desk to verify before opening your door.
- Be sure to give your luggage only to a member of the hotel staff, and insist on a receipt for stored luggage. Never leave any of your belongings unattended at any time during travel.
- If using a car service, contact a specific company directly rather than accept an unsolicited "car service" offering to take you to your destination.

Staying Safe on Subways and Buses

- Use designated waiting areas, ride in the conductor's car, or sit near the front of the bus.
- Be aware of your belongings in crowded situations and keep them close to your body.
- Do not display jewelry, cash, or valuables.

Staying Safe on Elevators

- If someone makes you feel uncomfortable while waiting for an elevator, leave the area and return for another elevator. Check the elevator's mirror before entering.
- Exit the elevator if someone enters who makes you feel uneasy.
- When in the elevator, stand by the control panel if possible. If accosted, press as many buttons as you can to get the elevator to stop at the next floor.

Staying Safe in Your Vehicle

- Always park in a well-lit area, and keep packages and belongings out of sight.
- When returning to your vehicle, always check the rear seat area before entering.
- If a van or truck is parked next to your car, be cautious before entering because you are out of public view.
- When getting gas, keep passenger doors locked and windows closed. Never leave your belongings on the seat in plain view.
- Maintain your vehicle to avoid unexpected breakdowns, and make sure you have gas in the tank.



Staying Safe in Bars and Restaurants

- Never leave your belongings unattended or over the back of a chair or on a stool. Keep your bag and belongings close to you at all times.

- Do not accept a drink from anyone unless you saw it prepared. Never leave your drink unattended.
- Travel to and from restaurants and bars with a friend or group.
- Always have money for a taxi, Uber, or other transportation and make sure you record the car numbers.




Beware of Scams

- Persons pointing to money, that you supposedly dropped, can distract you and take your briefcase or bags.
- Individuals offering to "clean off" mustard or ketchup squirted on your jacket distract you so they can remove your wallet or valuables.

Design Review Committee (DRC)

I'd like to remind everyone that the fundamental purpose of having a Design Review Committee (DRC) and Design Rules (DRs) is to maintain the value of the property in our community. In order to accomplish this, the DRC and the DRs deal with modifications to the exterior of our homes, including modifications to landscaping, and maintenance of home exteriors and landscaping. The DRC and DRs also strive to ensure that modifications by a homeowner do not adversely affect neighboring properties.

The fundamental source for DRC decisions is the DRs, a document, accepted by homeowners as part of every home purchase. The DRs are modified from time to time after proposed changes are publicly posted for comment for four weeks and subsequently accepted by vote of the Board of Directors. The DRC's job is to apply the DRs to improvements submitted in a Home Improvement Application (HIA).

Timely maintenance is important to maintain property values. If a homeowner neglects the maintenance of their property, not only is the property next door negatively impacted, but the value of all properties in the community are affected. An individual's neglected property has the same negative effect, although to a lesser degree, as neglected common area landscaping

or clubhouse maintenance. We all understand neglect when we see it. Here are some important **maintenance** issues everyone should consider:

1. Most of us have yards covered with 3/8" to 3/4" gravel, so look for bare spots where dirt is showing. See dirt? **Replenish the rocks.**
2. Some homeowners have property-line walls that, on their outside, face common property or are a knee wall facing the golf course. Maintaining the exterior of these walls, and in the case of knee walls or any fence erected on them, is the responsibility of the homeowner whose property they enclose. See peeling paint? **Time to repaint walls.** The HOA Office can provide a paint color based on your address.
3. Driveways in all phases many need attention. Rust stains, excessive tire marks, and damage to coating must be remedied. **Maintain driveways.**
4. Dead plants, tree trimming, tree stumps, and weeds all fall under **yard maintenance.** Now that the weather is cool, take a look to make sure you remedy these issues.

Question of the month: Why have the Association's insurance premium costs increased so much over the last two years?

It is extremely important to note that the insurance premium increase is not solely an issue for the Sun City Shadow Hills Association, but is a nationwide problem for homeowners' associations. The reasons are in part:

1. The vast extent of natural disasters that the United States has suffered over the last two years are a significant contributing factor to premium costs. For example, the wildfires in California have caused extremely high expenditures by insurance companies and worldwide the catastrophic losses have been \$210 billion due to natural disasters. The consequence is, that there are fewer and fewer insurance companies willing to cover properties that might be subject to a natural disaster whether that is wildfires, earthquakes, tornados, or hurricanes, and those that are willing to write the insurance, have significantly increased their premiums.

2. It is important to remember insurance companies "reinsure" the policies that they write, so they can control the extent of their losses on their policies sold. With large losses, a significant portion of the loss is suffered by reinsurance companies. Therefore, industry-wide reinsurance companies have been pulling back on how much risk that they are willing to accept. In addition, they have been increasing their premium charges to the insurance companies that they reinsure or in many cases simply refusing to write reinsurance for areas that have suffered large natural losses. For example, in northern California where communities suffered huge losses due to wildfires their insurance carriers passed a large portion of those losses on to reinsurance companies and many reinsurers have refused to renew policies. Nationwide insurance

premiums have doubled, tripled, or quadrupled and in addition deductibles have been increased to as much as \$100,000. The bottom-line is that this is not a Sun City Shadow Hills situation but a national situation of extreme insurance cost increases.

3. One must also factor in recent inflationary forces with building costs increasing at least 8 to 10 percent along with supply issues nationally. These inflated costs have a direct impact when an insurance company determines premium costs, especially when one has "replacement cost coverage." If replacement costs continue to go up, the consequence will be continued increases in insurance premiums.

4. One specific factor that touched our community is we had two large liability losses due to personal injury claims in the period of 2018 to 2019 and those losses, combined with the natural disasters, caused our 2021 insurance carrier to not renew our policies. The good news is we have not seen large personal injury losses since 2020 and those past losses will be approaching 5 years old, which means they should no longer have an impact on our insurance premiums costs beginning in 2023.

So just remember Sun City Shadow Hills is one of 50,000 community associations in California where 13 million Californians live in 3,727,000 homes, we are all in this together and we are all suffering from increased insurance costs. The California Insurance Commission is studying ways to try to help all 50,000 community associations find relief from these increases. Hopefully we will see constructive progress in the near future.

SNOW SURVEYS

Have you noticed that, in January or February, our local newspaper will almost always publish a photo taken in the Sierras that shows a team wearing snowshoes and weighing a long metal tube? The accompanying article invariably explains that the picture depicts the annual Snow Survey at Phillips Station near Highway 50 at Echo Summit.

The orange signs identify the site for the measurement. (Note that the tape measure is being handed to the lead surveyor in order to identify the exact spot to take the survey.)

Snow surveys are taken at the same time and same place each year. The survey site is always in a clearing in the forest marked by two orange signs posted high on trees at each end of the site (*see photo at right*). The location where the snow is measured and weighed is at a specific distance between the orange signs. In the picture, you can see the tape measure being handed to the second team member. The depth of the snow and its weight, which reveals its water content, are used to forecast the availability of water for the coming year.

These newspaper pictures always bring a smile to my face for three reasons. First, we owned a cabin on Echo Summit and drove by the snow survey site just before we reached our place. The newspaper picture gave us a good idea about how much snow we would have to pack or shovel to reach the cabin.



Second, in my high school years, I went on several snow surveys, as I explain below. And finally, I wonder, will new technologies (like aircraft that use laser imaging) make this old, manual method a thing of the past?

California inaugurated Cooperative Snow Surveys 93 years ago, and now there are over 260 sites statewide where the snowpack is measured annually. Although the actual method of measuring the depth and weight of the snow is not challenging, getting to the site is another matter! Fortunately, I was able to accompany a snow survey team several times when I was a senior in high school.

We used a snowcat to get us to and from the survey site. However, our snowcat was nothing like today's snowmobile.

The military had converted a few WW II Jeeps into snowmobiles, and our team used one. It only had two seats and I, as an unpaid observer, had to tow behind on my skis or sit in the wooden fenders just above the tracks. Up front were two skis interchangeable with wheels, which we had to put on if we ran out of snow.

I remember one trip in 1949 where we drove the truck until the snow stopped us. There we unloaded the snowmobile, put the skis on up front, and off we went – that is until we rounded a curve where the road was in full sunlight, and all the snow had melted. So we had to stop, take off the skis, reinstall the wheels, and proceed down the dirt road until the snow stopped us, where we put the skis back on again.

We used the snowmobile as far as it could take us. Then we strapped on our skis and backpacks and skied the rest of the way to the site, hoping to find the survey cabin before dark. I vividly remember that the first thing we did upon arriving at our one-room cabin was to put wood in the stove and start a fire — only to find that rats had built a nest in the stovepipe that made smoke pour into the room!

On another trip up the slopes of Mt. Shasta, we left early in order to complete the survey and return the same day. I recall daylight was fading as we descended the mountain at top speed. I was on skis towing behind the snowcat when I fell and watched the snowcat keep going. Luckily, my team noticed my absence and returned to pick me up. After that, I sat on one of the wooden fenders as we made our way back to the truck.

That's the way snow surveys were taken back in the 1950s, but believe it or not, they are still taken the same way today – except the snowcats are significantly improved! There is, of course, new technology to obtain the data that these old-fashioned snow surveys gather. An Airborne Snow Observatory utilizes aircraft with special laser equipment, allowing the planes to overfly large areas and provide data not previously available.

Will this new technology replace the old manual method? I don't have an answer to that question, but speculation is that new techniques will replace some snow surveys and provide data for previously unreachable areas. At this point, though, it appears some manual snow surveys will remain. I sure hope so! I'd like another youngster to have the opportunity to go on an unforgettable snow survey like I did way back when. And the newspapers will still have a story plus pictures to print around the first of the year!

EVERYTHING OLD IS NEW AGAIN

The grant application process was long and intimidating. The U.S. Department of Education would award funding to the applicant whose submission would best attract female middle and high school students interested in exploring nontraditional careers for their gender. Other funding agencies wanting to support these same goals were the New Jersey Department of Education and the National Science Foundation.

During the staid, traditional, old-fashioned 1970s, Ivy League Universities and scores of other colleges and trade schools would not admit female students. Other institutions of higher education had strict quotas


allowing only a few girls to enter and only to study courses leading to traditional female careers. Female physicians, lawyers, and dentists were, pardon the expression, as scarce as hen's teeth. Surely, women could be attracted to enter these traditionally male fields.

In the highly gender-stereotyped 1970s and 80s, the goal was to encourage girls and young women to explore lucrative employment in careers like plumbing, welding, airplane maintenance, scientific research, auto repair, medical practices, or becoming astronauts. We wanted female pilots, doctors, scientists, and trade workers. Creating programs to meet these

employment goals was a challenge only equaled by writing the grants to fund them.

Specific grant writing guidelines and rules had to be obeyed. Grant applicants were required to adhere to strict word counts. The text and project summaries had to be brief but explanatory. Recognizing both these limitations and the stiff competition, my colleagues and I nevertheless decided to apply to each of the funding sources. By 1980 we were going full steam ahead trying to fill the female employment gap.

We needed to choose our limited number of words carefully to adhere to the restrictions of the grant applications, so we decided to invent an acronym to describe our project. After much discussion, we found the perfect phrase. Instead of repeating many times over that our program was geared to attracting students to study science, technology, engineering, and math, we called our creation STEM education.



Stop laughing! That acronym, STEM, our creation coined in the early eighties, won highly competitive and much sought-after grants. We developed materials, posters, videos, conferences, speaking engagements, teacher training programs, and more. Year after year, our grants were resubmitted and subsequently renewed plus expanded as time went on. Our programs, collectively known as Futures Unlimited, were widely respected; and thousands of teenage girls entered new career paths after attending one of our many STEM programs.

Scores of young women began to enter nontraditional fields of employment. We located and vetted women who were rare pioneers in nontraditional fields. They became our students' mentors and role models.

There were always waiting lists as untold numbers of schools wanted to enroll their students in a Futures Unlimited program until the early 1990s, when funding evaporated due to Congressional budget cuts. Funds were cut across the board for many institutions along with special research and medical projects. The U.S. Department of Education, and other funding sources, ceased funding many successful programs.

Here we are in 2022. A new educational need has been identified within the last 20 or so years. Recognizing the United States' dearth of professionals in STEM fields, there is now a push to catch up with other countries and societies that are leaving the U.S. behind. Once again, it has become essential that we recruit both male and female students and encourage their interest and excellence in the sciences and technology. Now the STEM acronym is everywhere, cropping up in the news, in discussions, and in research. STEM is education's new best friend. Everything old is new again.

Today, we old relics of the 70s and 80s, who were instrumental in pushing for higher education way back then, shake our heads in disbelief — one step forward, two steps back. Well, okay, let's just reinvent the wheel.

THANKS FOR BEING MY MOTHER

Glennetta Shaw was born in 1946 in Calcutta, India. She never knew her dad, had an up-and-down relationship with her mother, and lived with her grandparents. Glennetta's mom married in 1949 and, with her husband, relocated to London, England, in 1956 – but without her daughter. Glennetta remembers that she hardly saw her mom at all. She also recalls that her mother once told her, "I'm leaving away from here, but I'll be back and bring you some chocolates." Glennetta never received those chocolates.

Her grandparents were the ones who properly raised Glennetta and, along with her mother's two sisters, Daphne and Mae, they provided much of the love, protection, and care that a child requires growing up. Aunt Mae recalls falling deeply in love with Glennetta "the moment I set eyes on her." Growing up in an Anglo-Indian Catholic environment, her two "aunties" paid for Glennetta's schooling and dance lessons. They even arranged for a personal rickshaw to take the young girl to school every day.

In Calcutta in 1956, Aunt Mae officially adopted the 10-year-old and, along with Aunt Daphne, relocated to the United Kingdom in 1957. The journey began with a two-day train ride from Calcutta to Bombay, where they boarded the steamship SS Strathmore. Via the Suez Canal, the family arrived 17 days later in Tilbury Docks and then traveled on to London.

Aunt Mae married about five years later, and Glennetta remembers that her husband Jay was always kind, gentle, and good toward her. It was during this time that Glennetta also saw her siblings occasionally during Sunday dinners.

Fast forward to 1966, and the 20-year-old Glennetta was working full-time as a junior secretary in London. One night, she attended a dance with her girlfriends and met this rather comical guy, Terry, who just stood next to her all night and told a bunch of funny jokes. After the dance was over, everyone packed into a few cars for the short drive back home. In the overcrowded car that Glennetta jumped into, she was surprised that the only space left for her was to sit on Terry's lap.

After two and a half years of dating and listening to countless jokes, Glennetta discovered the other side of Terry. She found that he was insecure, quiet, shy, and reserved; and it took him a while to truly open up and display his feelings. Terry also had no clue about how to express himself emotionally, so Glennetta had

little idea about where their relationship was heading. But one night, as Terry was walking Glennetta home, she asked him, "How would you feel if I dated other guys?" Without even hesitating, Terry emphatically replied, "No way!" This was the moment of truth for Glennetta, for she knew that she had just found her soulmate for life.

But the bliss of being together forever had to take a little detour as Terry and his buddies were into surfing and planned to "surf the Atlantic" for six months or so.

With Terry having his own agenda, Glennetta and her girlfriend Angela hitchhiked and backpacked 9,000 miles throughout Europe (Spain, France, Portugal, and Italy). But at some point, the loving couple did somehow manage to meet up for a wonderful week in France.

In 1970, when the two of them had finally gotten their life-long adventuresome priorities out of their systems, they returned to London. On the escalator down to the train platform, Terry, the ex-surfer, proposed to Glennetta, the ex-hitchhiker, who was taken by surprise but managed to blurt out "yes" with a river of sweet tears rolling down her cheeks.

So how did the young couple finally end up in Sun City Shadow Hills?

While still in London, they started their family with a son in 1974 and twins (a boy and a girl) two and a half years later. Then they relocated to Calgary, Alberta, in 1980, where they lived for nine years. In 1988, on one of the rare occasions that Glennetta saw her siblings, she flew from Calgary to the UK to attend her half-sister Gina's wedding.

In 1989 Glennetta and Terry made a big push to the good old USA, moving to Minnesota for three years. Aunt Mae joined them shortly. The everlasting love between Glennetta and Aunt Mae was as strong as ever, and the bond between them was like mother and daughter. So it was a very sad day when Mae passed away in 2007. Terry and the kids also loved Aunt Mae. Her gravestone reads, "*Thanks for Being My Mother.*"

It was in 1993 when Glennetta and Terry migrated to the great state of California and ended up in Danville in the San Francisco Bay area, where they stayed for six years. Another move brought the couple closer to SCSH as they came to Laguna Niguel in 2000, where they lived for eight years.

And finally, in 2008, the couple became residents of SCSH. For those of you who know Terry and Glennetta, WE are the lucky ones to have them with us. Oh, and FYI, they recently celebrated their 52nd anniversary.

A Dream Career In Your Post-60 Years!

Companies are devising ways to modify offices to encourage people to work later in life. Changes include flexible hours and more input into daily tasks. Teams pair young workers with older ones who offer training plus share knowledge and experience.

To tailor benefits to fit the priorities of older workers, companies can offer a range of incentives so mature workers can choose options like long-term care insurance, unpaid sabbaticals, or the opportunity to work as a consultant on projects.

Thinking about career options after 60, I discovered that my priorities shifted. I now want a paid or volunteer job with less stress and more time to be creative and mentor young people. I no longer want a pressure-filled management position like my career as a Human Resources executive. At this point, I prefer to focus on what I love most such as blogging, writing business training manuals, inspiring future business leaders, and penning best-selling mystery novels.

Speaking to friends in SCSH, I was excited to hear about their new post-60 careers. We have neighbors that are teachers, coaches, museum docents, authors of fiction and inspirational memoirs, ghostwriters,

bloggers, podcasters, musicians, actors, directors, volunteers, and fundraisers. There are no slackers in our community!

There are many creative ways to launch your new post-60 career. You can use sites such as LinkedIn, Indeed, and Monster. I found networking is the best way to promote your talents and learn about paid jobs or intern opportunities. Preparing a strategically written resume can help make age a non-issue. Below are some tips for crafting a resume that highlights your skills and work experience without drawing attention to your age.



Use the hybrid resume format, which combines certain elements of the chronological and functional resume formats. Many templates are available online to get you started. As an older job seeker, there's no need to share your entire work history. Include only positions most meaningful to the job you're applying for that you've held during the last 10 to 15 years. If there are major achievements you want to highlight that extend beyond that timeframe, add an Early Career section that does not feature specific dates of employment.

Leave graduation dates out of your education section. List the degrees you hold (with the most advanced degrees first), schools you attended, and any recent training or certifications. Modify your resume to highlight the most relevant skills for each job you seek. Feature keywords that make your resume stand out to hiring managers who have specific skills in mind.

Once called the "objective," the professional summary is an introductory paragraph highlighting

your greatest skills and achievements. Include industry credentials and specific skills, experience, and attributes that will show you are more qualified than competitors.

To show that you have kept up with technological advancements, highlight your experience with modern software and platforms (such as Microsoft Excel or PowerPoint). Using certain fonts can tip off employers that you're an older job seeker. Avoid serif fonts such as Times New Roman, which is rarely used in business today. Serif fonts are difficult for applicant tracking systems to read, which means a real person may never see your resume. Use smoother, sans-serif fonts in size 12, such as Arial and Geneva.

Using action verbs can help you create a more compelling resume that stands out to potential employers. They are valuable when describing work experience and accomplishments. Some examples are: enhanced, supported, proposed, created, performed, initiated, planned, introduced, collaborated, presented, negotiated, and designed.

Show you're current with the latest communication technologies by referencing your LinkedIn profile on your resume. Use a recent photo for your profile, don't try to appear younger, and wear interview-appropriate clothes. Include volunteer leadership positions and other accomplishments where your age is an asset. Note high-level volunteer roles, awards, or honors related to the type of position you seek.

Practice interviewing skills to prepare appropriate responses to job-related questions. Collect recommendations from former employers and friends who understand your professional worth.

Believe in yourself, dream big, and launch a new and exciting post-60 career this year. You will be amazed how your energy, creativity, and motivation will keep you moving forward into the future.

You can sign up for a long list of classes in art appreciation, painting, sculpture, music, singing, ukulele, literature, culture, religion, history, world events, science, technology, yoga, books, philosophy, and travel. Bring a very large wall calendar to keep track of all the events!

The big treat is the Utah Music Festival. Last year we saw six operas, including *Carmen*, *The Magic Flute*, and *Man of La Mancha*. Programmed for this year are *Aida*, *Oliver*, and more. Michael Ballam, founder and director of the festival for 30 years, is internationally known for recruiting performers from some of the greatest opera companies and Broadway stages.

The choice of things to do is extensive. The Lyric Theatre Company offers drama and comedy in two historic theatres downtown. There are free Sunday band concerts and lectures in the park. Interested in genealogy? The Mormon Tabernacle allows free access to research their vast files. On weekdays there is a free concert by visiting performers. Logan has a variety of restaurants, shopping opportunities, parades, fairs, a rodeo, free parking, and free buses that can transport you all over the valley to nearby towns.

There are many day trips to take from Logan. The Golden Spike National Historic Park, less than 50 miles away, puts on a historical reenactment of the 1869 transcontinental railroad driving of the golden spike. 





Filling Divots

On occasion, I am asked about how to fill divots on the tees and fairways. The two questions I hear most are: “do I use the old divot?” and “should I fill the entire divot?” The answers are yes and no, and no.

If you have taken a nice divot, one with a good amount of soil around the roots, and you know that is your divot, use it. Make sure you put it back in the right position, step on it, and you are good to go. If you are not sure this is your divot, move on to your sand and seed bottle. Do not use an old divot that may be lying around.

When filling divots with divot mix, do not completely fill the divot. Overfilled divots will damage the cutting units on the mowers and any seedlings that appear will be scalped at the high point in the divot. Fill your divot about two-thirds full and tamp it down with your foot. This will give the seed some room to grow, and the reels on the mower will not contact the mix.

It is also important not to under fill your divot. This will result in a depression that could affect the lie of your golf ball.

Be smart and aim center of green and give yourself a putt for a birdie or a par — better than making that double bogey. Try this and watch your score get better.



Garlic Butter Spinach and Bacon Chicken

Ingredients:

- 6 chicken thighs
(I like thighs as they tend to stay moister.)
- 6-8 cloves garlic, finely diced
- 2 tbs. butter
- 1/2 onion, diced
- 1/3 to 1/2 cup chicken broth
(boxed is OK, or you can use white wine)
- 3 to 4 pieces cooked crispy bacon, chopped
- 1½ cups half & half
- 3 cups baby spinach leaves, stems removed
- 1 tsp. Italian seasoning
- 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
- 1 tsp. cornstarch to create a slurry with water
oil for frying, salt and pepper to taste

Directions:

Heat oil in a skillet, then season thighs with salt and pepper, and sear until cooked through. Remove chicken and melt butter, leaving juices from the chicken in the pan. Add onion and garlic, saute until fragrant. Pour in chicken stock and allow to reduce a little. Add the bacon and fry for a few minutes. Reduce heat, add half & half, and bring to a low simmer (high heat will make it separate). Add Italian seasoning, then the spinach, and let spinach wilt. Add cornstarch slurry (1 tsp. cornstarch to 1 tsp. water). Sauce will thicken. Add chicken back into the pan, and you are done. I serve mine with riced cauliflower to avoid the starch, but you can serve it over rice or pasta.





Genealogy Club

ENDOGAMY AND GENEALOGY

What a great word! It rhymes with “bigamy” and “polygamy.” Broadly defined, endogamy is the practice of marrying within a specific social group, religious denomination, caste, or ethnic group. Endogamy is common in many cultures and ethnic groups around the world. Endogamy may result in transmission of genetic disorders within the relatively closed community.

Endogamic marriage patterns may increase the frequency of cousin marriages in a population, and

may cause high probability of children of first, second, third cousins, etc.

In DNA, endogamy commonly refers to any cousin marriage that affects a family tree. And we know that cousin marriages do occur so, be on the lookout.

If cousin marriage has occurred in a family tree it is referred to as pedigree collapse. It creates stronger DNA matches (i.e., a higher centimorgan count) between the DNA matches than otherwise might be expected. Your investigation might confuse a second cousin with a third cousin for example, simply because the centimorgan level is higher.

And you thought you knew the relative values of centimorgans for various levels of cousins. Researcher beware of the potential for endogamy impact. It just might explain some otherwise confusing numbers.
