Design Review Committee (DRC)

AGI KESSLER | CHAIR

Working together: Homeowners, the Board of Directors, and the DRC bring an important change to our Design Rules.

In recent years, coyote sightings on the golf courses have become increasingly noticeable. Homeowners living on golf course lots have expressed concerns and inquired about how they can protect their pets. The Design Rules were silent on a solution, so a fellow homeowner who was experiencing this issue, plus two DRC committee members developed an excellent solution for the benefit of many.

If you have already implemented a temporary solution, the DRC requests that you replace it with this approved material.



4.29.4 Metal Fences/Wrought Iron Fences (lots adjacent to the golf courses or open spaces, typically lots with knee walls)

Metal and wrought iron fences are permitted on the rear property wall of lots adjacent to the golf courses or open spaces, provided prior written approval has been received from the DRC. The total fence height must not exceed an overall height of five feet from the existing grade of the lot as measured from the outside of the fence (this measurement is to include the knee wall and fencing). Increasing the height of a knee wall with block or any material is prohibited.

The color shall be one solid color, either black or tan. The design shall be the same or similar to the metal fences installed throughout the community and shall tie into the rear side property walls, in a stairstep manner, so as not to exceed five feet. When submitting

to the DRC, provide a plot plan to include an elevation rendering indicating the location, pattern, color, and dimensions of the proposed metal or wrought iron. Wire fencing (such as chicken wire, landscape wire, or other forms of wire fencing) is not permitted.

Non-metallic mesh may be woven through the pickets of the fence provided the material is almost invisible. An example of such a material is commercially available fiberglass mesh comprised of mesh elements having a diameter of 0.008 inch to 0.009 inch, arranged to make 8 X 8 (per inch) or 9 X 9 (per inch) grid cells (one vendor is Saint-Grobian ADFORS in charcoal color). A sample of the material must be submitted with the Home Improvement Application (HIA).

Any walls originally constructed by the builder and located adjacent to the golf course or open spaces shall be maintained by the owner. The owner shall be responsible for maintaining the knee wall in a clean and attractive appearance that is substantially the same as the wall's original appearance. The paint color name and ID for knee walls for phase one is Navajo White DEC772. Phases two and three are Sandal DEC715, which can be purchased at Dunn Edwards.

4.16 Garden Shade Cloth

Garden shade cloth may be used to protect plants and trees between June 15 – September 15 only. The shade cloth must be specifically sold for gardening shading: green, light tan, or black in color and woven from a synthetic product. The shade cloth must be secured to wooden stakes or poles. Netting, of any kind, is not permitted on any portion of the Sun City Shadow Hills' common area or any individual owner's lot. Nothing in this prohibition applies to the nonmetallic mesh described in §4.29.4.

Finance Advisory Committee (FAC)

RONN WILLIAMSON VICE CHAIR FOR RESERVE AND REPLACEMENT STUDIES

Question of the Month: What is the financial process that preserves our community's value?

When the new budget is released by the HOA board in November, you will notice a line item for replacement fund expenditures. It is a big number - likely more than \$3.5 million to be spent in 2024. Think of the replacement fund as part of the community's longterm maintenance plan to preserve and enhance property values.

The operating budget provides money for the dayto-day maintenance of common areas, including the golf courses. The replacement fund was created for expected long-term maintenance needs. It funds major repairs or replacement projects tracked in a "components list" for capital assets needing replacement during the next 30 years. This replacement fund components list is found in the reserve study report created annually and made available on the SCSH website in a folder titled "HOA Finances & Planning."

The component list is the roadmap for maintaining our community assets to ensure the community remains an attractive place to live. There are 858 components in the current list to be funded for eventual replacement in the next 30 years. Some components, such as riding mowers or fitness center exercise equipment, may be replaced several times over 30 years; while others, such as golf course irrigation pumps or a clubhouse roof, may be replaced once.

Replacement timing starts with assigning a "useful life" for each component because everything ages differently, and we want to replace things before their age is a detriment to our community. (The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines asset useful life as "the amount of time during which something is in good enough condition to be used.") Some people believe that, to be good fiscal agents, we should use things until they fail. But that generally results in unhappy

residents waiting for components in poor condition to be replaced.

Our written replacement fund policy directs that "all common areas should be maintained in a minimum rating of 'good' condition." For example, whether a component is assigned a 15-year useful life or five years, once it reaches "zero" years of remaining useful life, it may no longer be in good condition. This is when we evaluate it for replacement. We currently expect 88 components worth more than \$3.5 million to be at "zero" remaining useful life during 2024. This is the largest number of components targeted for replacement in a single year so far at SCSH, but it is a natural consequence of our community getting older.

As 2024 begins, our maintenance managers will create a monthly replacement forecast to achieve minimal community disruption, consider seasonal issues, and to allow an orderly process for approval of expenditures of Board Requests for Action (BAFs). With each BAF, the component condition is evaluated by staff and designated committees. Competitive quotes are obtained if replacement is advisable; and work plans are proposed. The FAC provides a final BAF financial review and recommends that the Board approve the replacement action.

In the final analysis, there are many components to monitor. Critical judgment is required to assess the condition of each component and act before it negatively impacts our common areas and amenities. Differences of opinion can occur on timing and acceptable cost, but the result of our collective efforts should be that replacement funds are used to keep our community attractive to residents and prospective buyers in the future - just as attractive as when we each decided to purchase here.

DESERT TRAINING CENTER

Given all the interest in exploring Revolutionary and Civil War battlefields, it's surprising that the Desert Training Center gets so little attention. The Center played a critical role in our winning World War II, and it's only about a half-hour drive from here.

At the start of WWII, Americans wanted no part of the conflict. Roosevelt was able to persuade Congress to supply equipment to the Allies, but even getting that was tough. That obviously changed after Japan bombed Pearl Harbor. The U.S. declared war, but we did not have an army that was anything close to combat ready. In fact, we barely had an army at all.

By 1940, the Nazis had pushed the Allies out of Europe and into North Africa. Germany occupied Paris, and the Suez Canal was at risk. Churchill persuaded Roosevelt that the U.S. should enter the war in North Africa. However, German General Erwin Rommel (the Desert Fox) was a very capable adversary. This was the era of the Blitzkrieg and tank warfare, and Rommel was the master of these tactics.


The U.S. needed a place where its troops could train in secret, and General George Patton was put in charge of locating it. He proposed the Desert Training Center, an enormous 18,000-square-mile area headquartered at what is now called Chiriaco Summit. Patton wanted the ability to simulate conditions in North Africa, with plenty of room so that infantry, tanks, and airplanes could learn to work together. Because he was raised in Southern California, Patton knew that the Mojave Desert provided what he needed.

The Army built 12 camps, five Army Depots, five major airfields, and seven hospitals there. Although this infrastructure was permanent, the men lived in tents in simulated battlefield conditions. There were no mess halls, permanent latrines, or showers. They were exposed to the elements.

We have all experienced strong winds here, but imagine what it was like back then when the Coachella Valley was almost all desert. Sand was everywhere and

> in everything. The wind would pick up and blow away the tents. The soldiers were dirty, tired, and harassed every day for the three months or so they spent there.

> Remember, these were mostly 17-year-old boys who had never been away from home. Most came from the East Coast and the South. They had heard they were going to California and pictured Hollywood and the beach. Imagine their surprise when they got off the train at Chiriaco Summit. Their spirit differed from today, though: they knew they were fighting for their parents, sisters, and a way of life. They were focused.

If you are interested in seeing how things were laid out, check out Google Earth. Tank centers were spread throughout the base. Introduced in WWI, tanks became a vital part of tactics in WWII. Because tanks took time to build, scaffolds were put on jeeps so the men could simulate tanks in training.



I watched documentaries and listened to interviews with men from the infantry. Multi-day forced marches with limited food and water were standard. Troops were given two hours to dig a foxhole and told that a tank would be driving over it afterward. It was intense.

But the men did get some time off. They played cards and dice games and wrote letters home. Occasionally, there were dances, when women from LA came out for a few hours to lift the men's spirits. The USO arranged for Bob Hope and other celebrities to entertain and keep the men smiling.

There were two churches built at each camp, one for Protestants and one for Catholics. Because the men knew they were going into battle, they took spirituality very seriously. One of the altars still stands at the Center. It makes me reflect on all the prayers that must have been said there.


Patton was a remarkable man. Raised in Pasadena in an affluent family, his only wish was to become a decorated soldier. Patton was a candidate to command the U.S. campaign in Europe against the

Nazis, but his brash behavior and erratic temper cost him that opportunity.

Although Patton conceptualized and planned the Center, he was soon called back to Washington to plan the North African campaign. When it mattered, though, Patton met up with the men later to lead them into battle. But first, he had to retrain them. The fresh troops were not in fighting shape and suffered some early defeats. The movie Patton captures this well and continues to be one of my favorites.

The Desert Training Center was only open for about two years. Between 1-2 million men were trained there and, without this exposure, they would not have been prepared for action in North Africa. At the Center, they learned to fight a coordinated battle. Those skills won the war in North Africa and eventually enabled the Allies to prevail in Europe.

For a memorable experience, watch the movie Patton and then visit the General Patton Memorial Museum in Chiriaco Summit the next day. There are plenty of tanks, weapons, and military memorabilia to see there. The Center is a big reason why we are the country we are today.



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REMEMBERING FAMILY WHO SERVED IN WW II My Uncle Roy's Story

What can I say about my Uncle Roy? He had a lively sense of humor which, as a mouthy kid, I could relate to. He used to say, in his most film noir imitation of a street cop, "Don't give me any lip, kid!" when I'd try to tease him. He had a brush with fame when he won an important Pro-Am golf tournament and became the youngest golf pro in Nebraska at age 22. He had movie star good looks, but not the ego. He was a good man. He was also one of the unsung heroes of WWII.

Roy Andersen was one of the early volunteers after Pearl Harbor. Right after his training, my aunt hopped a train and went across country to get married before he was sent overseas. Little did they realize he'd be gone fighting for our country for four and a half years. Roy started as a 23-year-old buck private and came home with a battlefield promotion to a Second Lieutenant plus four Bronze Star medals for his service. He was 28.

In November 1942, Roy was part of Operation Torch, the Allied invasion of North Africa under Patton. He received his first Bronze Star then. His unit also helped to retake Kasserine Pass, a strategic mountain route for German Field Marshal Rommel's troops. This earned Roy his second Bronze Star, with oak leaf cluster, and Good Conduct Medals. (The Army r ecognizes additional awards of the Bronze Star with oak leaf clusters.)

Next, Roy was sent to Sicily, where he received a third oak leaf cluster for his combat service. He received a fourth oak leaf cluster after the Battle of the Bulge in France. As a result of this action, Roy was also awarded the "V" device; this denotes a specific act of combat heroism. Later, he was given a battlefield commission as Second Lieutenant while still in France.

Mostly, my uncle never talked about those years. Much of the information I have came from the American Legion via the Army and a few conversations with Roy. But I know he had nightmares about them. I heard him in the night yelling out more than once.

Uncle Roy started out in North Africa under General Patton. He had some direct contact with Patton and, on a rare occasion, acted as his relief driver. I only know this because I had a friend from Tunisia whom I introduced to my uncle when he and my aunt were visiting my mom.

Meeting someone from Tunis opened a door for Roy to talk about his time there. He recalled Patton's very tough talk plus how hectic and constantly changing things were then. He felt he never knew what would happen next. Roy also talked about how beautiful, but daunting, the Sahara was to travel across and about the many children who would follow the soldiers around begging for candy. My friend said his father was one of those children.


Once Rommel and the Italians were routed out of Africa, my uncle was sent to the front in Sicily and Italy. I never heard any stories from him about his time there, but years later, he spoke to me about France. By then, Roy was retired and living on the Gulf Coast of Texas, where I was visiting. The Corpus Christi newspaper had a story about the D-Day landing in Marseille, France, with a photograph showing thousands of men on the beach that day. My uncle got teary-eyed and said, "I'm somewhere in this photo."

Then Roy told me the story of how they disembarked from a ship that brought them from Italy. The sea was rough, and the soldiers were climbing down the side of the ship to the landing crafts on rope ladders. They were wearing full packs, which were very heavy. The man in front of my uncle slipped and fell into the sea, where he was immediately pulled under the water. My uncle had to go next. He said many lost their lives that way.

Roy also showed me an old original carbon copy of a transcript of Patton's D-Day speech to the troops, which he made in London. My uncle's friend transcribed it and gave him the copy later. I had only heard about the landing in Normandy and had no idea there was a simultaneous landing in Marseille. A piece of history missed.

Uncle Roy's unit battled its way through France, freed Paris, and moved on to Germany. I think this was the most difficult time for him as he would only shake his head when I asked about his experiences. When Roy talked to me about France, he was in his 80s and in the beginning stages of dementia. Shortly afterward, he entered a nursing home.

After my uncle passed, all his mementos from the war, including his medals, disappeared. His son appealed to the American Legion, which secured replacement medals and presented them to my cousin in a special ceremony. The Legion also got accounts from the Army of how Roy earned these awards, filling in the details of his heroism his family never knew.

My last visit to the nursing home caught Uncle Roy on a good day. The first thing he said to me was, "Don't give me any lip, kid!"

We are fortunate to live in one of the most dynamic cities in the U.S. Indio has experienced an amazing rebirth in the 13 years I have lived here, and much more is on the way. This is the first in a series of articles about what is happening in our City.

First, some statistics: the City of Indio has 11 departments and around 350 employees. It has an annual budget of over \$300 million and about 40,000 homes.

The hottest topic for SCSH residents is probably the new Pulte development just north of us, Desert Retreat. About five years ago, the City adopted a General Plan that approved the development of 3,000 homes. But Pulte is proposing a development of about half that size. I know there are concerns about the pending increase in traffic, but it could have been worse.

Desert Retreat is a complicated development because three different entities are involved. The CVWD controls the water, the Imperial Irrigation District will supply the power, and the City of Indio is involved with everything else. A location for a new power substation has been identified along Avenue 40, but completion is probably at least two years away. Expect to see some land grading and pipes being laid, but vertical construction is still far off.

Before that, what's likely to happen is commercial development at the intersection of Jefferson and Varner Roads. The new Circle K gas station will be finished soon, and there may also be a small grocery store (think Sprouts or Trader Joe's).

More is happening at the corner of Monroe Street and Avenue 42. Leases are signed with Raising Cane's Chicken Fingers, In-N-Out Burger, and EOS Fitness. Another hotel is also proposed.

The two shopping centers at Jackson and Monroe Streets are seeing lots of activity, too. A new hotel is approaching completion, a Handel's Homemade Ice Cream store is going in by Dave's Hot Chicken, and Ono's Hawaiian Barbecue and a Texas Roadhouse recently open. Leases are signed with Tillys and Skechers, and they will be near Home Depot. The Tesla charging station is finished, and that attracts lots of high-end shoppers to the area. Developments are also planned for north of Avenue 42, where the Lights Golf course is. The Lights is also getting a new clubhouse.

A major reason for our desirability is our proximity to Interstate 10. Between 180,000 – 200,000 cars pass Indio daily. The idea of getting off the freeway to gas up, eat, and do a little shopping is attractive to travelers, and we are located between LA and Phoenix. This is why national chains are likely to spring up close to the freeway.

Downtown Indio is experiencing a renaissance, too. A hundred years ago, Indio was where the entire Valley came to shop. JCPenney was huge in the days before shopping centers, but the malls and strip developments changed that.

Now Indio is catching up. Imagine parking your car and enjoying small shops, restaurants, and entertainment. Six new eateries are under construction downtown plus a stage for concerts and other public events. And "Second Saturdays" features free monthly concerts.

College of the Desert is building a satellite campus and large childcare facility downtown. That will bring apartments and more nightlife for young people.

The Coachella Valley Art Center is located downtown. Although its focus is providing spaces for artists to create, there are regular exhibits and artist receptions. One is coming in November that will feature art created by Veterans.

The Indio Farmers Market reopened last month. On Saturday morning, it features food trucks, entertainment, and locally produced clothing, as well as fresh fruits and vegetables.



You have probably noticed the colorful new Indio signs, a conscious rebranding of the City. Millions of people from all around the world know about us because of the Coachella music festival. We want them to think about us for more.

The Jackalope Ranch has now reopened. Located on Highway 111 just east of Jefferson Street, it was a very popular place until it closed. The grounds are beautiful.

After resisting cannabis stores for years, the City has designated several locations. However, the State must approve them, so they won't open anytime soon. One location, planned for north of the freeway, at Avenue 42 and Jackson, behind Walgreens, should open next year.

You certainly have noticed the huge apartment project located just west of Highway 111 at Jefferson Street. This is in Indio, but the City has little control over it because it is a State-authorized project. Construction is underway for the first 200 of a 400-unit affordable housing project. The State is committed to building more: a 150-unit complex at Golf Center Drive and Avenue 44, and another in Palm Desert.

Fulfillment warehouses are the final thing. They offer some well-paying jobs, and Indio will receive a share of the generated sales tax. There is room for some in eastern Indio, and the City is receptive. They won't interfere with our lives except to speed up some Amazon deliveries.

As you can see, there is a lot going on. As more homes are built, more restaurants and retail stores become interested. This is likely to continue for years. It's going to be a fun ride.

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THIS IS PET CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

To nurture is to love; it does not matter who or what is the recipient of your affection. The only downside to loving and fostering a pet is our limited time with them. To enjoy every minute with your cat or dog, take care of their health with routine visits to the veterinarian and home examinations.

The Veterinary Cancer Society estimates that 1 in 4 dogs and 1 in 5 cats will develop cancer. Finding lumps on your pet can be scary, but remember that many may be benign. Your veterinarian should check out soft masses as soon as possible to prevent discomfort, rule out cancer, and give you guidelines for monitoring at home. It's important to examine your pet regularly and have your veterinarian check new or changing lumps.

Cancer is treatable for most pets, and an early diagnosis provides a better chance for longevity. Warning signs include masses, persistent vomiting, diarrhea, dramatic weight change, lameness or swelling of legs, bleeding from the mouth or nose, abdominal distension, major changes in appetite, and decreased energy beyond normal aging.

Many factors can influence cancer development but, as in humans, it is impossible to know why some pets develop cancer while others do not. Exposure to carcinogens like sunlight, chemicals, and cigarette smoke can play a factor. Also, certain breeds, such as Golden Retrievers, Dobermans, German Shepherds, and Boxers, are genetically susceptible to cancer. Some cancers are causally linked to obesity or infection, and incidence increases with age.

Annual cancer screenings are an important part of preventive medicine. Your veterinarian will look for lumps in the skin and then feel

for irregularities or unusual swellings along joints and bones. If they find a mass, the vet may recommend further testing such as blood work, X-rays, ultrasound, or biopsies. If your pet is diagnosed with cancer, your vet may refer you to a veterinary oncologist specializing in diagnosing and treating the disease.

If you are referred to a specialist, prepare specific questions to ask regarding tests and potential treatments. There are three types of vet cancer doctors: surgical oncologists specializing in removing cancer; medical oncologists focusing on chemotherapy and immunotherapy treatments for cancer, and radiation oncologists who use radiation to shrink a tumor.

Common cancers in dogs include lymphoma, bone, skin, oral cavity, and nasal tumors. Common cancers in cats include gastrointestinal tract, oral, lung, and nasal tumors. According to The City of Hope, several cancers are less likely to develop in cats and dogs if they are neutered before reaching sexual maturity.

There are different options for treatment. Seventy percent of localized solid tumors can be

> cured with surgery alone. If the tumor is too large or in an inaccessible location, and for non-tumor types of cancer like leukemia, treatments include chemotherapy, radiation, and immunotherapy.

> > Most people think their pet will suffer during cancer care. However, vets have found that pets tolerate cancer treatment well and try to avoid causing pain and Approximately suffering. 85% of animals who

undergo chemotherapy will not develop side effects.

Think carefully about what is most important to you and your family in caring for your furry companion. When considering medical choices, try to provide your pet with the best quality of life for as long as possible. The treatment should never be worse than the disease. Some pets may experience long remissions with treatment, but then cancer eventually returns. Is it realistic that your pet will be cured to give you more time together? As the responsible caregiver, carefully review the options the pet cancer specialist offers and determine a path.

Sadly, sometimes you must decide when not to provide cancer care and just enjoy the time that's left. If deciding on a less aggressive treatment means you get less time with your furry pal, but it's a really good time, then that's what matters.


Caring for a pet can provide an immense amount of joy. But it can also bring significant expense. The ASPCA estimates that the typical household spends \$225 per year for a dog and \$160 per year for a cat on routine medical costs. That number doesn't include emergency spending for upset stomachs, coughing, sneezing, skin infections, allergies, and limping.

Pet insurance can help cover unexpected expenses. Basic policies cover only accidents and illnesses. But some policies cover routine and wellness costs, too. A recent CNBC study recommended these pet insurance companies: Best Overall, Spot; Runner-up, Embrace; Best Cat Insurance, Pets Best; Best Dog Insurance, Lemonade.

We adore our furry pals and attribute human characteristics to them in many ways. Most of us appreciate our four-legged friends because they give us a type of unconditional love that human relationships can't match. Pet caretakers are responsible for a pet's entire world, including their toys, exercise, grooming, food, and medicine.

So please remember that early detection is the best protection against cancer. Be proactive. Check your pet's coat for lumps, and watch for any changes in eating, peeing, or pooping rituals. The best chance of curing pet cancer is when it is discovered and treated promptly.

PROSTATE CANCER AWARENESS

A Doctor's Perspective

Cancer? Find it as soon as possible! Remove or treat it. As fast as possible! That's what everyone believes about cancer. But prostate cancer, the most common cancer in men, excluding skin cancer, is approached differently.

First, some facts: Only lung cancer causes more cancer deaths in men. One in eight men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer, but many more will have it without knowing. Some urologists and pathologists think all men will get prostate cancer if they live long enough. Yet most men with the disease will die from something else.


When diagnosed, most men have local or regional involvement and a five-year survival rate of well over 95%, with or without treatment. Diagnosis includes grading (examining a biopsy to judge how aggressive the cancer is likely to be) and staging (radiographic studies to see if and where it has spread). Like other cancers, treatment options include surgery, radiation, and systemic medications (like chemo, hormonal, and immunotherapy). Treatment varies for each patient.

But prostate cancer treatment is controversial because it has significant side effects. Loss of bladder and even stool control, plus lifelong erectile dysfunction, are common. In the past, through screening for PSA (prostate-specific antigen), many men were treated for prostate cancers that would never harm or kill them and wound up with a significant reduction in their quality of life.

So, whom do we screen, and when? Certain subgroups clearly need assessment: men with a significant African heritage, men with a family history of prostate cancer in a first-degree relative (father or brother), men with certain familial genetics (Lynch syndrome or BRCA gene mutations), and perhaps men who've always been obese. These subsets should probably start screening even in their 40s.

But what about everyone else? The American Cancer Society (ACS) now recommends offering (not recommending!) PSA screening to all men aged 55-70. They chose 55 because it is a disease of aging. ACS also reasons that assessing men over 70 is unlikely to change how long they live. Together, the patient and his attending physician or a urologist discuss the patient's medical history and try to balance the risks and side effects of treatment.

Given the following three case histories, many may wish to question how the American Cancer Society treats prostate cancer so conservatively.



Bruce Marley Shares His Experience

I learned I had prostate cancer in the fall of 2020 because there was a steady increase in my PSA number over a period of more than five years (it had reached 7.5; under 4.0 or less is "normal"). My GP suggested I see a urologist, who recommended a biopsy. Two weeks later the urologist called to say he had both bad and good news: "You've got cancer. But it is easily treatable, and you have several options." Two of the 12 tissue samples were malignant.

The urologist described four options: do nothing; remove the prostate; insert radioactive "seeds" into the aland: or use radiation to neutralize the cancer. I chose radiation because it was the least intrusive, and the results are statistically good.

Age, physical fitness, overall well-being, and a healthy lifestyle affect your ability to deal with cancer. Soon after diagnosis, I received bone and body scans to see if the cancer had spread, or metastasized. A sign it may have spread is lower back pain, something I deal with, so I thought, "Oh, great, it has spread." Fortunately, this was not the case - but I still think about it because my lower back always hurts after golf, especially if I play poorly!

In addition to radiation, my treatment included a regimen of hormone infusions to neutralize testosterone, a source of fuel for cancer. I received four infusions over nine months. The side effects – and the ladies will love this - included hot flashes eight or ten times a day.

The initial infusion was in late February 2021, followed three months later by 45 radiation sessions. The hot flashes finally stopped near the end of 2022.

I've now had three follow-up PSA checks, and the urologist happily notes my numbers are less than 0.1. Prostate cancer must be taken seriously, but it is very treatable. Most men will get prostate cancer, but the later in life it is found, the more likely doctors will suggest no treatment. I believe medical science is on our side, and we will all be fine.


A Friend's Prostate Cancer Story

"Your PSA has increased over the past year from 8 to 12, and it's time to see a urologist." Those few words from my GP triggered more than a year of constant worry and stress.

During a consultation six months later, the urologist initially took a casual approach, suggesting that a PSA of 12 wasn't really high and that he could monitor my symptoms. After a digital exam, though, his tone changed dramatically, and he ordered a biopsy immediately.

The results were very scary: a Gleason Score of 9 out of 10. In layman's terms, this is very high-risk and aggressive, and the cancer is likely to have spread beyond the prostate. My stress meter for the next few weeks was extremely high until I could undergo CT and bone scans to detect any metastasis. Fortunately, the scans showed no spread to other organs, lymph nodes, or bones.

Treatment began with hormone injections every three months to suppress testosterone production, the culprit in cancer growth. Unfortunately, my side effects were frequent (including severe hot flashes); but the injections brought the PSA level below 1. This allowed brachytherapy, a treatment under anesthetic that

involves inserting 15 needles with a high dose of radiation into the prostate. There were minimal side effects.

Eight days later, I began 23 daily external radiation treatments through the abdomen. Side effects included frequent and urgent urination because the radiation caused swelling in the prostate as well as the bladder. Despite my fatigue, the urologist advised me to stay physically active.

I believe I recovered more rapidly because my wife and I continued our usual walking, cycling, and golfing. Two weeks after radiation ended, the side effects were well on their way to disappearing; and two months later I was back to normal. Follow-up involved periodic PSA tests and one more hormone injection for a total of four.

I recommend reading an extremely informative 100-page Patient Guide from the Prostate Cancer Foundation (pcf.org). The statistics are encouraging but also stress the importance of regular PSA tests: nearly 60% of all prostate cancers are diagnosed in men over the age of 65. And the five-year relative survival rate in the U.S. for men with local or regional prostate cancer is greater than 99%.

A Wife's Perspective – Julie Kelly

My husband died a preventable death! A few years before his diagnosis with prostate cancer, he had trouble urinating. He spoke with his GP who ordered a PSA test that was considered normal. The doctor prescribed a pill to help with his flow and said it was an aging issue. (I have since learned some individuals with PSA levels of 4.0 and lower do have prostate cancer.)


At that point, my husband should have seen a urologist for a full exam. I pleaded with him to see a specialist. He insisted he was fine because he was on medication, but the problem got progressively worse.

One day, my husband could not urinate at all. We went to the emergency room, and he left with a catheter plus instructions to see a urologist as soon as possible. The fortunate part was, he was able to get an appointment in two days. The unfortunate part was, he was diagnosed with prostate cancer, and further tests revealed it had metastasized to his bones. He lived in pain for two more years.

If my husband had seen a urologist at the very beginning instead of being so stubborn, he would probably be here with me today. Please, men, think of

> your partner, your children, and your entire family. They are the ones who will suffer with you while you die a painful death. A check-up is nothing compared to the suffering you will endure and the grief you will put your loved ones through if you don't catch prostate cancer early.

> I would do anything to have my husband back with me.

Tip of the Month

I see a lot of players with the dreaded flying elbow. This causes a lot of trouble with the golf swing. Your right arm dictates where the plane of the swing will go. If you look at your upper arm in the backswing it should be parallel with your right side if you are a right hander. The best drill is to reverse your hands on the club with the left hand low. Swing back the club and your right upper arm should be parallel to your side. Be sure to feel how the arm got there and try to repeat that move.

On the downswing, you will notice that the right hand will be in a strong position at impact, referred to as a "smash impact." It will decrease the loft for a little more distance. If you are having trouble, be sure to see one of your teaching Pros for a lesson.

This year I have planned a nice three-course traditional Thanksgiving feast with all the Shadows favorites.

One of my staples on Thanksgiving is my butternut squash soup. I created this recipe years ago and it has become a big part of my family's celebration. Butternut Squash Soup

2 butternut squash peeled, cored and diced 2 potatoes peeled and diced 1 carrot peeled and diced 1 stalk of celery veins removed and diced ½ medium onion diced olive oil and butter for sautéing 1 tablespoon of fresh thyme leaves 2 tablespoons of soy sauce

1/4 tablespoon of nutmeg

salt and pepper to taste

heavy cream (optional)

vegetable stock

• Toss squash and potatoes with olive oil, salt, and pepper.

- Roast squash and potatoes in a 350-degree oven until soft.
- In the meantime, season and sauté carrots, celery, thyme, and onion with a little olive oil and butter in a Dutch oven or large soup pot until cooked.
- Once the squash and potatoes are done, add them to the soup pot and add vegetable stock until just covered.
- Simmer until everything is fully cooked.
- Blend the soup in batches. Don't put too much in the blender at once to avoid burns.
- Put everything back into the soup pot then add the soy sauce and nutmeg.
- Adjust seasoning and add cream if you prefer a creamier texture to your soup.

Note: Soy sauce adds depth of flavor, or umami, to the soup.

Travellers in Ireland

The ancient Irish referred to these folks as "the walking people," meaning that they were perpetually on the move from place to place, providing seasonal labor or selling crafts, horses, and dogs. These folks had their own culture, language, and practices. They were often maligned as thieves.

In more recent times they were called Gypsies or Romani, but these appellations were incorrect despite the fact they then traveled in barrel-shaped horsedrawn wagons. In fact, the Travellers were native to the Emerald Isle and managed to survive through Ireland's extremely turbulent past.

Today, they are referred to as Travellers. They still are on the move but now, they travel in small caravans with modern camping trailers. They are still stigmatized and prefer to be among their own.

The Travellers have their own unique DNA groupings which prove they are of Irish aboriginal descent. Irish Travellers speak English and sometimes one of two dialects of Shelta, their unique language.



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


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
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
