No, this has been a lifelong hobby. I was going to do a presentation on Monday, but we couldn't get in our room. And my story started when I was 16 years old. My grandmother, my mother's mother gave me two pieces of paper that she had. And it was a family tree on one page and oral history written down on the other page. And it went back six generations for me. And because I was the last one on the family tree, I knew it was done the year I was born, which was 1952 because my little brother wasn't on there yet. So I that got me interested in it was about my grandpa, my paternal grandfather's, my maternal grandfather's family story, which I never knew that great grandfather. I knew my great grandmother, but he had passed before I was born. And it was his story going back into Europe, Eastern Europe. Going back to my great, great, great grandparents. So that gave me a lot of history on that branch. And then I started as I got older kind of dabbling in my other grandfather's information and then my dad's history.

And so how did the tools in the genealogy club help you on your search? Well,

in genealogy club, we learned how to use the various websites ancestry, my history. For me Jewish genealogy website was important. And we learn hearing other people's stories. They've had successes here are successes there. I hit a brick wall with my dad's family history, because he lost an older brother that he never knew in 1918 in the flu pandemic, and as an eight year old child, that baby that boy was picked up from the family home, and they never knew where he was buried, because it was the pandemic. So I learned how to do research to figure out how to track down a death certificate and find out where he was buried.

Well, that's an interesting story because my I started researching my grandfather's live because he was treated like a persona non grata growing up and no one ever talked about him and I had this real interesting curiosity. He was a physician. And he died the two years after I was or the year after I was born. And I knew nothing about him really because he was 64 when he died, and he was a surgeon, and he served in World War One in France, doing field surgery, so I, I it took me seven years to research his story. And doing the research culminated with using a lot of the tools.

I was going to ask how did the genealogy club tools help you with this search?

Well, it's interesting, because World War One was 100 years ago, when I started writing this in 2016. And so, I was sort of a neophyte to the genealogy clubs. So learning how to use ancestry.com, or family search, or the military application, which is called folds three, and using those tools and then following up with other materials you find on the internet help me I wrote a book on his on his service and published it.
