

May your New Year be the best ever!




- 6.2 Dead Plants and/or Trees: Owners are responsible for removing and replacing dead plants and/or trees. The plant and tree minimum quantity requirement must be maintained at all times
- 6.3 Driveway / Walkway Stains: Stains on concrete driveways and walkways must be removed when excessive amounts of rust, oil or other stains are visible, as determined by the DRC. Proposed driveway coatings or decorative designs are subject to approval by the DRC. Clear seal coats may be applied without DRC approval.
- 6.5 Front Yard Maintenance: Front yard areas and other yard areas visible from the street, common areas and golf course must be mowed, trimmed, edged and weeded on a regular basis and kept clear of debris, weeds, clippings, etc.
- 6.6 Maintenance of Dwelling Unit (Structure): The exterior of the dwelling unit and all other property walls must be in good repair and maintained in a clean, neat and attractive manner at all times. House numbers must be visible at all times, free from obstruction by trees and other plantings. It is the

responsibility of each homeowner to replace the front porch light and the front garage light bulbs when they burn out. This is an important part of the street lighting and must be maintained correctly.

- 6.7 River Rock and Ground Cover: Insufficient (sparse) rock ground cover, as determined by the DRC, must have additional, approved or matching rock ground cover added as needed.
- 6.8 Trees: Trees shall be trimmed to allow for minimum of seven (7) feet clearance above public sidewalks and twelve (12) feet clearance above the street. Trees and/or plants of any kind shall not grow or encroach upon the property line of neighboring properties, without the neighbor's written consent. All trees must be trimmed, pruned, thinned, laced, etc. at least one (1) time per a year unless the species of the tree requires a different tree trimming cycle. Branches and limbs must not touch the ground or be allowed to grow into other plants.

Update: Earthquake Early Warning Systems

A question raised by a resident during the new website orientation suggested that the existing Earthquake Early Warning systems (cellphone apps) are obsolete and don't work. This is incorrect information, and this article will help correct any misinformation out there in Sun City Land.

No, the early warning systems are not obsolete, and they do work! The EPC strongly urges everyone with a cellphone to ensure an Earthquake Early Warning app is installed on their cell phone!

The View published two of the EPC Committee Reports on this topic back in October 2020 and again in July 2022. You can read them in *The View* archives. Having these cell phone apps will give you real-time warnings to DROP, COVER and HOLD ON!

To receive earthquake warnings, individuals and family members can download the MyShake app and ensure phone settings are adjusted to receive emergency alerts, including:

- MyShake App: Free smartphone app that provides iPhone and Android users with audio and visual warnings (magnitude 4.5 or higher and Modified Mercalli Intensity III or weak shaking).
- Android Earthquake Alerts: Android phones with updated operating systems are automatically

subscribed to Android Earthquake Alerts, which uses the same technology as the MyShake App.

Android and iPhone cell phone manufacturers now include the early warning apps in their default software, so no one needs to install an app separately on a newer cellphone. This applies to new and recent cell phones only. Those of you with an older phone may have to install the free app, available on the Google Play Store and/or the Apple Store. Once installed on, you will need to update some settings to make it work; most important, the location service must be turned on.

These systems have proven very reliable and accurate and are supported at the State and Federal levels in the USA. Mexico and Japan have used similar technology for years before the USA. However, no technology is perfect, and the systems are constantly being updated.

I strongly encourage you to read the FAQ page at this CalOffice of Emergency Services (CalOES) link. It is current and very informative:

Finance Advisory Committee (FAC)

ROBERT O. JESTER | CHAIR

Question of the Month: Why do we have separate accounts holding Association funds, and are those accounts dedicated?

As we enter the Board election cycle again, we always hear from a "vocal minority," whose allegations about the financial health of our Association many times are not true. I hope to give you some basis for testing these unsupported allegations during this election period.

The Association operates in compliance with the California Davis-Stirling Act that controls how an HOA is to handle its financial and governance affairs. As required, this Association, confirmed by its annual outside audit, has three distinct accounts to hold Association funds. They are the Operating Fund, the Major Repairs and Replacement Fund, and the North Channel Flood Control Project Capital Improvement Fund. Each fund is accounted for separately each month and reviewed for accuracy by the Finance Advisory Committee (FAC).

The first question that you might have is, "Why do we have three separate funds?" The answer is easy since each fund has a dedicated purpose. I will briefly examine each for you.

The Operating Fund: The audit defines this account as the fund to be used for general operations, the chartered clubs, and for property and equipment maintenance needs that are not a part of the Reserve Study. This fund is the primary focus of our yearly budget as each department determines its needs for the coming year. This fund also has an impact on our monthly assessments, so the FAC always carefully analyzes it.

The last two years have seen significant inflationary factors that must be carefully considered to ensure that we have sufficient "operating cash available." In this valley, electric and gas rates have doubled in the last five years, our property insurance premiums have significantly increased, road resurfacing costs have skyrocketed, and average wages have increased 15% from 2022-2024. The local labor market remains extremely tight with new housing complexes like Disney Cotino being built.

We need always to have sound financial planning. Our "operating cash available" in this fund is always to be a minimum of 2 to 3 times our monthly average expenses. We find this minimum standard in the "Green Book" that provides HOA's accounting guidance consistent with the Davis-Stirling Act. I mention this because this is that "excess cash" that we so often hear about from the "vocal minority." Well, fellow residents, there is a sound, required, and necessary financial reason that the "operating cash available" exists, and it is not to be spent unless an operating expense necessity requires it.

Major Repairs and Replacements Fund: This is commonly known as our Reserve/Replacement funds that by law are reviewed every year by qualified experts to assure the Association that we are properly funding for the replacement of 834 components. We will probably never be 100% funded for these items that have a useful life of 30 years or less, but we try to maintain a "percent funded" of 70% going into the new budget year.

Our funding this year will not reach the goal of at or near 70% until year ten in the reserve study, and the FAC will be very watchful that this funding metric is monitored in the 2025 budget season. This has been another "vocal minority" subject, as it is suggested we are not constantly examining the 834 components to determine replacement cost and useful life. This is not correct. The Vice Chair of the FAC for the Replacement Fund works diligently with the Maintenance Department Director and the Troon General Manager to review and evaluate each of those 834 components, and they will continue this practice annually.

North Channel Flood Control Project Capital Improvement Fund: This is the dedicated fund to cover the construction of an access road to the flood channel in our Association, and to reinforce or rebuild the Jefferson Street Bridge into our Association. This fund was dedicated by a Finance Advisory Committee


(FAC) Motion to the Board on December 16, 2022, and reflects the hope that the funds preserved in this dedicated fund can cover the anticipated costs for all the areas that are the financial burden of this Association for this project. If it is not adequate, we run the real risk of a special assessment on all property owners.

The auditor designated this account in the 2022 audit as a specific separate fund, and the FAC will do everything possible to ensure it is maintained for its "dedicated" purpose. The FAC acknowledges that the Board has the ultimate control over Association funds, if those funds are not restricted by the Davis-Stirling Act, but a financially responsible Association Board will always try to honor dedicated funds unless there is

some extreme and sudden need of the Association caused by disaster or other unexpected financial event.

Conclusion: Remember that the FAC reports to the Board monthly in an open meeting where you may ask questions and test the statements of the "vocal minority." In addition, you may submit questions through the Association website. The FAC is here to help keep you informed financially and to act as this Association's financial "Watchdog."

The IAC acts as a link between the Board, our committees, and management to convey information to and from the residents. Information overload is unavoidable in this age of technology. We all pick and choose what we allow to penetrate depending on our priorities.

In an emergency, our priorities change instantly, though. We need to be safe and to survive. Full stop. It's now easier than ever to find the invaluable information on our website prepared by our Emergency Preparedness Committee chaired by Jeff Kirkpatrick. Just go to our website at www.scshca.com and log in or register. Then click on "Emergency" on the top banner, and the site will open.

The list of common disasters that can threaten our area may surprise you as well as what you can do before, during, and afterward. Three survival tips you may not know about include:


- 1. The Alert Notification System (AlertRivCo) and the ShakeAlert app are available on your smartphone. It takes seconds to add these resources, and they could easily save your life.
- 2. The Red Card/Green Card alert to be placed on your front window or garage door in an emergency

- to signal whether you need help. The cards are available at the EPC Montecito rounder. Be sure everyone in your household knows where they are stored and where to place them in an emergency.
- 3. The bright red Vial of Life decal that should be placed on your front door exterior at eye level for first responders if your survival relies on your medications. This decal signals to trained rescuers that a list of your medications is located inside a sealed plastic bag in your refrigerator door. The decals are available at the EPC Montecito rounder.

The information you need to implement these three tips is located on the Emergency web page. Many more practical recommendations are also provided. To see a list of the 50+ residents who are members of the EPC Volunteer Cadre, go to HOA on the purple menu bar, click on Committees, then EPC. You may know some of these dedicated residents who are there to help you if needed - and more volunteers are alwavs welcome.

WINTER IN CALIFORNIA What Kind Of Winter Would You Like?

December 21 is the official start of winter. Our winter residents come from a wide variety of locations like Canada, Minnesota, Oregon, and Montana, just to name a few. Newcomers sometimes ask, "What's winter like in California?"

As a native Californian, over the years I have been asked that question hundreds of times. Usually, my response would be something like, "Well, it depends on what part of California you are asking about. We have the second-highest mountain in the United States (Mt. Shasta, at 14,172 ft.) and the lowest elevation (Death Valley, at 282 ft. below sea level). The hottest temperature was recorded in Death Valley (134 degrees) and, in the Sierra Mountains, snow depths of 12 ft. are not uncommon. There are dozens of beach towns like San Diego and Santa Barbara along California's 844 miles of coast, where one can surf, sunbathe, and look for seashells. Our mountains offer a multitude of lakes, campsites, hiking trails, and fishing streams. Our national parks, like Yosemite and

Big Trees, are world-famous. We have large and famous metropolitan cities like San Francisco and Los Angeles, in contrast to our vast agricultural areas that are so large it is estimated they produce approximately 70% of the nation's fruit and vegetables.

There is a simple answer to "What's the winter weather like in California?" You can find almost any kind of weather depending on what location are you asking about. This photo, taken right here in SCSH, typifies California in the winter: our beautiful sunny golf course in the foreground in contrast to snowcapped mountains in the background.

So, get out and enjoy your winter in California, no matter where you are!

OG TRAINER TO THE STARS

Vickie Marx was born in 1950 in Manhattan, New York City, and grew up in Queens. She graduated from Queens College, with honors in psychology in 1972. This education would prove to be an asset in her eventual successful profession as a dog trainer.

In 1977, Vickie's career began when her animalloving dad showed her a New York Times ad seeking dog trainers. Within two years after she was hired, she became the Director of the Pet Education Center at the Humane Society of New York. This was when Vickie became one of the first to learn and apply the "Reward and Praise" method of training.

Vickie has been around animals her entire life. Growing up with an Irish Setter, her favorite place to visit was a petting zoo, Lollypop Farm in Syosset, Long Island, NY, where she loved interacting with and seeing the animals. During her college days, her everpresent companion was a Boxer dog.

In 1980, Vickie moved to sunny Orange County, CA, where she opened the West Coast Academy of Dog Training. The academy specialized in correcting behavior issues such as separation anxiety, excessive barking, and housebreaking.

Vickie reflects, "There is a lot of self-satisfaction in teaching blind and deaf dogs and helping people with disabilities (like wheelchair-bound owners)." She also points out that small dogs are more difficult to housebreak, and large dogs tend to be more destructive. But among large dogs, Vickie especially enjoyed working with Rottweilers because she found the breed to be intelligent, loyal, calm, and easy to train.

"The reason I became a dog trainer was to save as many dogs as possible from winding up in shelters."

The LA Times, the Orange Coast and Beach Cities magazines, and local radio and TV shows featured Vickie's business. This was when Hollywood personalities began reaching out to Vickie to train their dogs.

Vickie went to the home of Willie Ames (Eight is Enough) to train his Golden Retriever and Basset Hound. Gail Storm also hired Vickie to train her standard poodle puppy, Jolie. In addition, Vickie helped train a beautiful West Highland Terrier for Connie Hines (Mr. Ed). And comedian Steve Martin gave Vickie a photograph he autographed with "Dog's Best Friend" because she was instrumental in helping train his parents' mini-poodles.

As she gained invaluable experience with training dogs through her successful business, Vickie discovered there are a few key things that all owners should remember:

- Always teach dogs correct manners and behaviors.
- Never call a dog to you and then scold it.
- Never scold a dog AFTER the fact.
- Never hit a dog. This can make the dog more shy or aggressive.

Sometimes, Vickie says, owners can be just as difficult as their dogs. And finally, she reminds people that training dogs is a very physical job, no matter the animal's size - she has the scars to prove it.

In 1996, Vickie became more involved with showing dogs. Her first was a Ridgeback named Jasiri (courageous in Swahili). Her next Ridgeback, Zane,

became a dual champion. He was a Confirmation Champion as well as multiple Best in Field Champion. Next came Arlo, a Wirehaired Pointing Griffon who quickly achieved his championship.

Currently, Vickie is working with Saffron, another Ridgeback, who came in 2nd Place among 28 other females (twice in the annual Palm Springs event). This year, the Kennel Club of Palm Springs Dog Show is on January 8, 2024, at the Empire Polo Field, with over 3,000 dogs entered.

After training thousands of dogs over the course of nearly 43 years, Vickie decided to retire at age 70. In February 2020, she closed her business and moved to SCSH. Most important for her are our dog parks and dog-friendly community. Vickie loves living here and seeing other owners walking all varieties of dogs along Sun City Boulevard.

AN UNUSUAL PROFESSION

I wonder if anyone is aware of one of the truly unusual professions I was privileged to witness growing up in New York City? This unusual occupation was familiar; and the practitioners were some of the most interesting emotional, spontaneous, and well-known neighborhood method actors of their time. They had to be on call 24 hours a day to participate in a very important and consoling way. I remember hearing that some women would attend special neighborhood seminars to learn how to become part of this unusual profession.

To qualify, the chosen ones needed to have multiple personalities plus be able to speak and act spontaneously in front of people. Those selected for this distinguished profession were handsomely compensated financially because they would have to give the performance of their lives each time they stepped up to the plate. Some of these women won awards for their sincere performances earning their neighborhoods' highest praises and special acknowledgment.

I guess you are trying to figure out what kind of profession I am writing about. Before I divulge it, I need to give you some background about my childhood. I was raised in a large Italian family, and children had to learn how to act respectfully on all occasions. We had to attend weddings, baptisms, first Communions, Mass, and graduations. Believe it or not, the most dramatic ceremonies were funerals. Lots of older relatives frequently departed.



When I was seven years old, I attended my first funeral with my mother and father. One of our family members passed away, and we had to pay our respects to the immediate family. It was really scary walking through the hallway in the funeral home because I could see bodies lying in coffins in the viewing rooms.

My parents took me into one room where our relative was lying in the coffin. They brought me to the wife of the deceased husband and told her that we were sorry for her loss. The three of us walked up to the casket and viewed the body, and my parents recited a prayer for him. I stared at Uncle Joe; he was very still and looked like he was sleeping peacefully, but I noticed he was not breathing.

My parents and I sat in the room with many relatives and stared at the casket. All of a sudden, a woman began crying, and she got louder and louder. Another woman joined her, and their voices became louder and louder. They were yelling and howling, and all hell broke loose. The women walked to the casket and threw themselves towards the body yelling,"don't leave us," "come back," and similar laments.

I asked my mother who the two women were. She looked at me and said they were very close family members who felt very sad. Uncle Joe's funeral was the beginning of my experiences at wakes, and it seemed like every wake I attended in the future included the same ladies doing their thing.

The performance was always the same. After attending these rituals, my older cousins informed me that the two women were professional mourners. They said the family members were expected to join by in crying and carrying on to honor the dead person. The families and funeral directors hired these ladies to rouse the mourners' sympathetic responses, set the mood, and honor the deceased.

If you have seen Good Fellas, The Sopranos, or other gangster flicks, you can watch professional mourners hired to fire up relatives to honor the deceased mobster at a funeral viewing. I learned that these pros were paid generously, and it was a good advertisement for the local funeral businesses. Who knows, their performances might be nominated for an Oscar for best dramatic acting role at a funeral.



My mother knew all the Italian ladies in the old neighborhood and continued attending funerals with her lady friends. Mom would tell me how great the dead person looked, describing the hairdos, facial expressions, and clothes. My mother and her friends would advise funeral directors that the pros did a great job and recommend their funeral home to their friends.

You may wonder why I wrote this story about professional mourners. A good friend of mine who passed away about two years ago appeared in my dream recently. We played music together since we were 12 years old. In my dream, he was playing his saxophone in a band on the other side, maybe in the twilight zone. He told me he was looking for a really good drummer to play in his jazz band and asked if I would like to join him.

My dream seemed real because the band was playing familiar songs and I recognized many wellknown musicians. My friend looked like he was in his thirties. I told him I was not ready to depart for many years because I hadn't finished what I came here to complete. He said he understood and resumed playing his sax with his terrific-sounding band.

RAISING THE BAR AT 75+: BARA ROSENHECK

If anyone has raised the bar at 75+, it is Bara Rosenheck. Since 2017, Bara has written four books and is working on her fifth. The first was her memoir, Courage: It's More Than Luck.

As she relates her struggle to prevail over unexpected obstacles in life, Bara acknowledges her many blessings while describing the challenges that life brought her. Bara was abused in childhood, and her intelligence was frequently questioned.

What is the message a young girl learns in this demeaning environment? To prove her detractors wrong, she continued her education in graduate school and earned a master's degree.

Bara has fought hard to overcome these belittling messages and credits them for stirring her passion for gender equality. She began as an administrator for a Title IX federally funded program at Rutgers University set up to promote equal and fair treatment for male and female students as well as employees of educational institutions. In this role, Bara was responsible for developing curricula and training teachers and administrators to ensure equality in schools, which became a reality throughout New York, New Jersey, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. She became a change agent for state Departments of Education, local school boards, teachers, and administrators. Even today, after 50 years, Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, part of Rutgers University, calls on Bara to speak to their staff.

After a devastating spinal cord injury at 52 resulted in paralysis, Bara made a remarkable recovery. In her memoir, she describes her journey to independence and self-sufficiency with humor and gratitude. Her goal of self-improvement - coupled with her desire to institute societal changes by becoming an activist and participant in the turbulent political era of the 1960s, 70s, and 80s - offers a window into that historic era. Written for and dedicated to her children and grandchildren, Bara's memoir weaves her family history and suburban lifestyle into a compelling view of her own

childhood and her motivation to become a change agent.

Quickly following her memoir, Bara's first novel, Justice for Julia, tells the story of a young woman with the courage to redeem her victimhood by becoming empowered. In 2022, Justice for Julia was honored as a finalist in the writing contest sponsored by American Book Fest. In 2020, Bara published her third book, Foolish Moments and Other Stories, which received five-star reviews on Amazon, as well as the prestigious recommendation as one of their Books of the Month. Her fourth book, a crime story, is entitled The Mid-Morning Murders.

In addition to writing and publishing these tomes, Bara has produced many humorous articles for The View magazine that keep our readers holding their bellies as the laughter pours out.

Bara rarely misses the weekly Writers Club meeting, whether it's on Zoom or in person. Her colleagues in that group look to her for insight and direction as they read aloud what they wrote for the week.

Arnold Choy says, "When Bara speaks, everyone listens intently because her words of wisdom just ring out. Her critique is gentle, usually right on the mark, and oh-so-helpful. She will give you her true thoughts, feelings, and insights, 100% real."

Beth Bolduc adds, "Bara is an inspiring writer, storyteller, and reader with a richly expressive voice. She is a strong member of the club, and her suggestions are "spot-on" and informative. We value her presence."

Because of that severe spinal injury, Bara is in continuous pain, living day to day with a seated walker by her side. But this has never slowed her down. At 83 years old, Bara continues to raise the bar for all retired folks.

THE SECOND CALIFORNIA GOLD RUSH

Everyone knows something about the California Gold Rush. It occurred in 1849, which is conveniently referenced in San Francisco's NFL team name. It opened California up to the world: the definitive book about the Gold Rush is entitled The World Rushed In.

Very few people actually got rich panning for gold, though. The big money was made by the people providing picks, shovels, blue jeans, and things like that to the miners. The second California Gold Rush brought quite a bit more shared prosperity, however, and that is the story I'd like to tell.

Oranges are not native to California. They were first brought here from Brazil by Spanish explorers, and the first trees were planted at Mission San Gabriel in 1841. A man named William Wolfson started a business shipping the oranges by rail to the Gold Country. Almost everyone there suffered from scurvy, and oranges were a great antidote. That was the start of a great new industry.

The big step forward happened in 1871, when Eliza Tibbets, the wife of a settler in Riverside, wrote a friend in the U.S. Agriculture Department asking for advice on what to plant. That's when the Washington Navel (a sweet seedless orange) was introduced. Two trees were planted in Riverside. Every California Navel Orange tree came from seedlings of those two trees (one of which survives to this day).

Between 1875 and 1885, the number of trees grew from 90,000 to 2 million. By 1890, Riverside was the wealthiest city per capita in the United States. An industry was born that benefited thousands of people



and was the major contributor to the diversity of Southern California. By 1920, oranges were the second largest export of the state, second only to oil.

The orange industry brought many farmers (mostly Midwesterners) to California. Oranges were considered an easy crop to grow because the soil didn't need to be plowed, and news of the warmth and beauty of Southern California was irresistible.

An important, but not so happy, story is about the field workers that were necessary. The first were Native Americans. Because of racism, the natives were replaced by the Chinese. The Chinese were quite important because they knew about agriculture. However, the Chinese Exclusion Act resulted in Japanese workers replacing them. Finally, the Japanese were driven out, and Mexican workers replaced them. This sad history is what created diversity in Southern California, which has only grown in succeeding years.

Another major development was the packing house. William Hardison, who made his fortune in the oil industry, opened Limoneira Packing in 1893. Because he didn't know much about oranges, he brought in professional managers to run things. These corporate

managers did a great job of handling the explosive growth of the industry, and this became a business model for other industries.

The great challenge of oranges became selling them. As with any business, there is constant tension between supply and demand. Initial marketing put beautiful and suggestive paintings on the ends of the crates. Many of these paintings survive to this day. Imagine someone on the East Coast who had never seen an orange looking at one of those beautiful scenes in the wintertime. It was an irresistible offer.

At about this time, Sunkist Growers was created. In 1893, an advertising man suggested that only the best oranges be shipped east and that they be put under a cooperative label. This proved to be a great success, and Sunkist now encompasses all types of citrus and thrives to this day.

In an experiment, in 1906, a trainload of oranges was shipped to Iowa. They were deliberately promoted all over the state to see what would happen. Consumption of oranges that year increased 50%. The marketing of the oranges became as important as the production of them.

Probably the most important ad man for the industry was Albert Lasker. He found that it took two or three oranges to produce enough juice for one glass. He created a campaign called "Drink an Orange," and that is why people now drink orange juice in the morning.

Eventually, the land in Southern California became so valuable that vineyards were sold to housing developers. There is an Orange Grove Boulevard in both Pasadena and Orange County, a nod to the past. Later drivers of California's economy (Hollywood, aerospace, Silicon Valley) might not have happened here if the orange industry had not brought people's attention to the beauty of our state.

Nothing about a gold mine is beautiful. The second California Gold Rush was the one that produced the real gold for the people.

SCSH CITRUS ROUNDUP Be A Good Neighbor, Donate Your Fruit

We are blessed with an abundance of citrus trees here in the Coachella Valley, and many of us have a variety of these trees in our own backyards. Every season, I have more lemons on my tree than my family, neighbors, and friends can possibly use. The question is, "What to do with the extra fruit?" Well, finally, the SCSH Desert Gardeners Club has given us a solution.

Last year, the club organized a citrus donation center right here in Shadow Hills. Twenty volunteers collected over 3,800 pieces of fruit from 46 of our residents at the Citrus Roundup event. The fruit was assembled into 475 bags and donated to the Neighbor4Neighbor program at St. Margaret's Episcopal Church in Palm Desert. Chet Hecht, Director of Outreach for Neighbor4Neighbor, said they rarely have fresh fruit

The Desert Gardeners will do the rest. They will unload the fruit from your vehicle, wash, sort, and bag it, and deliver it to organizations that help feed those in need.

A new year brings a new beginning and a time for resolutions. I find as I get older that my resolutions tend to be centered more on my health. Be it mental or physical health, I am at that stage of life where I need to keep both my mind and body healthy so that I can stick around a lot longer. Now, just by looking at me, you know that I love to taste and eat the food I prepare. And we all know the old adage, "You can't trust a skinny chef." Well, times are changing.

This year my resolution is to eat much healthier. I am not a nutritionist, but for me that means cutting back on red meat, smaller portions, less carbs, and cutting back on sweets. So I am eating more fish and chicken in lieu of red meat. My recipe for Salmon Piccata is just the ticket. It is a refreshing dish that, when served with

vegetables, makes for a great meal. Salmon Piccata is also served at Shadows as part of our "From the Sea" Friday's special menu.

Salmon Piccata

2 to 4 skinless salmon filets

1 cup chicken stock

2 teaspoons lemon zest

1/2 cup lemon juice

1/2 cup chardonnay

1/2 cup of capers, drained and rinsed

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

2 tablespoons cold butter

2 teaspoons chopped parsley

2 teaspoons dill

- Spray the salmon with cooking spray, then season the filets.
- Place the filets in a grill pan to mark, then transfer them to an oven dish and place in a 375-degree oven to finish cooking. If you do not have a grill pan

place in a hot pan and sear each side of the salmon, then finish cooking in the oven. This usually takes four to five minutes depending on the size of the filets.

- In the meantime, in a separate pan, combine the chicken stock, lemon zest, lemon juice, wine, and capers. Bring to a simmer and reduce the sauce for five minutes.
- Take the pan off the heat and swirl in the cold butter. This will emulsify the sauce, and give it body and a nice gloss.
- Check the seasoning of your sauce, then add the salmon back to the pan while off the heat and spoon the sauce over the fish.
- Plate your salmon and spoon the sauce over the fish. Garnish with chopped parsley and dill, then serve.

Tip of the Month: Don't Go for Every Flag

Any golfers looking to score better can do so by playing more conservatively. By aiming at the middle of the green will essentially maximize the number of times you will hit the green.

If you play to a tucked flag, you put yourself in jeopardy of missing the green on the short side. It is easier to putt from 30-35 feet than to chip from a short side pitch.

Aim to middle and lower your scores.


Camera Club
