Hello, neighbors. Our 2024 Board of Directors has been decided. Congratulations to our newly elected members Larry Siegel and Linda Aasen, as well as Terry Coon and Barbara Prezlock, who will serve their second year.

Thank you to the community for participating in the election process. While it is not uncommon for board members to have different goals and objectives, I believe what we all share is the desire to serve the community to the best of our ability and to work together to protect our investment plus our lifestyle in this beautiful community.

I want to thank Jerry Conrad, the outgoing Board President, for his leadership these past two years. I say confidently that Jerry was always motivated by what he felt was in the best interest of the community. You need only to experience our committees in action to truly appreciate how fortunate we are to have these dedicated volunteers who so willingly give their time and expertise for the betterment of us all.

This community is in a pretty enviable financial position given the sheer size of the small city that is Sun City Shadow Hills. I have always believed that we are more akin to a city than we are to a for-profit business model, as others suggest. We have infrastructure that is costly to maintain. Our largest expense is ensuring our common areas are updated and attractive to homeowners and home buyers alike. We have a number of large renovation projects currently ongoing and upcoming.

Design Review Committee (DRC)

AGI KESSLER | CHAIR

Question: Do I have to keep my big trees? The maintenance is expensive.

The developer planted fast-growing trees to enhance the property for sales purposes. These trees need expensive maintenance twice a year. Some may be in danger of causing damage to homes because of wind or heavy rain. Homeowners have reported removing these big trees along with their stumps and replacing them with smaller trees. There are many choices, some smaller palms, fruitless olives, and plumerias, none of which require expensive pruning. The DRC recommends you consult a reliable nursery when considering trees and plants for your yard. A change like this will require you to submit a Home Improvement Application (HIA).

Question: Can I change just the color of my garage door?

The quick answer is "no," I am sorry to say. We all follow color schemes at SCSH. However, it is okay to repaint something the same color. Please see the section from the Design Rules below for easy reference; this question often comes up. If you need to find your color, the HOA office can look it up for you.

4.19 Painting: Dwelling painting is based on color schemes. Owners repainting the dwelling unit but not changing the color scheme may do so without a DRC review. To change the color of a dwelling unit, the owner must choose from one of the eighteen approved complete color schemes and

submit an HIA to receive written approval by the DRC prior to work commencing. No individual item, e.g., doors, trim, fascia, etc., may be painted a color different from the approved color schemes. Exchanging colors between schemes is not permitted. The home's main color, that of its stucco, cannot be the same as that of the dwelling units on either adjoining lot. A photograph of the adjoining dwelling units must accompany the HIA. Additionally, the applicant must provide the approved Scheme Color number chosen, house model, and elevation. Property walls visible from the street, common area or neighboring properties must remain the same color as originally provided by the developer. Written approval by the DRC must be obtained prior to commencing any repainting.

Question of the Month: Is there an annual review of the financial records of this Association by an outside independent Certified Public Accounting firm?

The short answer to this question is YES. But why it is done and what is reviewed is far more enlightening for you, as a resident of Sun City Shadow Hills. The California Civil Code Section 5305 requires a review of the Association financials by a licensed accountant and further requires that the Association financial records must be prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP"). After the review, the audit report is to be distributed to residents within 120 days after the close of each fiscal year.

Sun City Shadow Hills contracts with an independent licensed certified public accounting firm annually for this review. The accounting professionals who conduct the review request the following as a part of the examination that culminates in the final audit report:

- Cash and Investments This includes the Bank reconciliations for all cash accounts with supporting bank statements. Plus, a schedule of all cash transfers between bank accounts for a period of five days before and after the year-end.
- Accounts Receivable This is a detail listing and/or ledgers of all accounts receivable, as well as, an analysis of all bad debts written off during the year.
- Inventory This is a listing of all inventory accounts with supporting count sheets from all departments, which must agree with the general ledger balances.
- Prepaid Expenses A schedule of all pre-paid expenses, which must agree with the general ledger. This includes all insurance premium billings which will be reviewed by the audit team.

- Fixed Assets This is a review of the details with reference to all fixed assets and the accumulated depreciation on December 31.
- Accounts Payable and Accrued Liabilities This includes a review of all accounts payable, accrued liabilities, sales tax returns, and the cash disbursements journal.
- Payroll and Related Liabilities The schedule of all accrued payroll and vacation.
- Unearned Income/Deferred Revenue This is the schedules and reconciliations of all unearned income including gift certificates.
- Long-term Liabilities Schedules of all long-term liabilities and capital lease obligations with statements reflecting current balances.
- Income and Expenses This request is for the gains and losses on all assets disposed of during the year and copies of all check registers.
- Income Taxes This includes fuel tax credits review and total tipped wages.

As you can easily see, this is an exhaustive list of financial records that are reviewed annually, as required by the Davis-Stirling Act. The goal of these audits is to assure residents that the Association is functioning accurately, openly, ethically, and honestly, and that the financial records are following GAAP.

All of us should feel very secure in that the Association's Financial records are under constant monthly review from the Finance Advisory Committee and the Board and an annual review by an outside

independent licensed Certified Public Accounting Firm.

I am pleased to let our residents know that we have received the 2023 Audit and it has been approved by the FAC and accepted by the Board. Our Association received what is commonly referred to as a "clean" audit. We had some minor adjustments made by the auditor, but none of them impacted our Association's financial health. We also had a renewed request that all Chartered Clubs in their quarterly reports submit the paid invoices that match up with the checks issued from the club accounts. The Lifestyle Department is to see that this is accomplished to the satisfaction of the Auditor in this fiscal year. The most important conclusion for this community is that this audit demonstrates that this Association is performing properly financially, and this is good news for each of us.

A HERO WALKS AMONG US

Our heroes often walk among us without honor. We know so little about them. Once or twice a year, we salute our veterans who have served during our world wars and the battles in Vietnam, Iraq, and Afghanistan. But do we appreciate how much these heroes have suffered? What do we know about their disabilities and the sacrifices they have made to protect us?

Juan Carlos Lopez-Mendoza, a resident of SCSH since 2010, is an infantry veteran who served three years with the US Army, of which he spent nine months in Iraq during the first Gulf War. Saddam Hussein attacked the Kurds in the north with chemical weapons, and Juan Carlos was assigned to a patrol to protect the Kurds and Iraqi civilians as well as to clean up the results of the attack.

Juan Carlos tells us,

The sand, filled with the waste of the chemical weapons, escaped into the air covering our exposed skin and clinging to our clothes. We didn't bathe for 2-1/2 months. Often at the end of the day, we would

burn equipment, tires, chemicals, plastic, clothes, and whatever we could not take with us. Everything we used was burned. The toxic air of the burn pits filled the environment.

This assignment went on as Juan Carlos and his platoon moved south with the redline toward Baghdad. As a result of exposure to the toxins, he developed a rare form of slow-growing leukemia called CLL (chronic lymphocytic leukemia). But this was not identified although he suffered for 22 years. CLL is not curable. Presently, the symptoms can be successfully treated as long as the patient follows his doctor's advice on diet.

Immediately upon his arrival from Baghdad in Vicenza (the Italian headquarters of the US Army), Juan Carlos developed a rash. This was the beginning of many years of illness. Since 1993, when Juan Carlos was discharged, doctors treated him for a variety of conditions such as allergies, sinuses, sore throat, rashes, and cysts. It was not until 2022 that doctors discovered those conditions were most likely the initial growth of his cancer.

"The worst," says Juan Carlos, "was not knowing what the source of my multiple sufferings was. I was a mess, depressed, and crying from emotional exhaustion as my condition got worse." Juan Carlos sought help unsuccessfully from the Veterans Administration (VA) because the Defense Department, the series of presidential administrations that followed, and Congress would admit neither the injury the burn pits had done to veterans nor the damage Agent Orange had caused in Vietnam.

Life changed substantially for Juan Carlos when Congressman Takano of Riverside successfully championed the passage of the Pact Act that President Biden signed in 2022. Thanks to a recommendation from our local Indio VA office by Dylan Schneider, who had processed Juan Carlos' application for VA assistance, Takano's office chose to recognize our hero by inviting Juan Carlos and his husband, Kevin, to President Biden's State of the Union Address on March 7 of this year. The invitation honored those veterans from Vietnam to the present who have suffered a variety of debilitating conditions during their service.

Juan Carlos and Kevin were both amazed at the royal reception they were treated to in Washington, DC. Juan Carlos returned home with something he felt he previously lacked: motivation and dedication to alert his fellow veterans to the benefits now available to them through the Pact Act.

After a 30-year struggle since Juan Carlos' discharge in 1993, this dedicated veteran finally received

attention for his disability. In 2022, he was granted a 20% disability certification, and shortly after, he gained full disability, which guarantees full VA support for life care. When the Pact Act was passed, his 100% disability was backdated to when he first submitted his application.

Juan Carlos has a message to veterans,

If you have not completed the disability paperwork, you must do so as soon as possible. Your disability payments will only go back to the date of your application. If you have completed it and have not heard back, follow up. The Pact Act has opened the doors for us to be heard.

USAF ROTC BOOT CAMP July 1957, MacDill Air Force Base, FL

Toward the end of boot camp, my squadron was scheduled to ride in a T-33 jet trainer, initially known as an F-80 Shooting Star. It was the Air Force's first combat jet and saw action in Korea.

I was scheduled to fly first, and I watched the pilot and ground crew do the pre-flight inspection of the T-33. There was a loud metallic cough and a whining sound as the jet's turbine engine turned over and then accelerated with a roar.

An NCO helped me up the aluminum ladder into the plane's rear seat. He buckled me in, hooked up the tube for my oxygen mask, and plugged in the heavy plastic helmet's communication cord. He gestured for me to strap on the mask and pull down the greentinted plastic visor.

"Welcome aboard, cadet," the pilot's voice sounded in my ears. "My name is Lt. Charlie Brown. You may call me sir."

"Yes, sir."

"Have you ever flown in a jet fighter before?" "No, sir."

"You see the throttle on your left and the stick between your legs?"

"Yes, sir."

"DO NOT TOUCH THEM!"

"Yes, sir." I looked at the forbidden objects and noticed the red gun button on the stick's handle. *Hot damn! Just like the movies.*

"There's a good forecast with unlimited visibility, so you'll see the world turn upside down and sideways while we're up," Lt. Brown said.

"Yes, sir."

"Okay, there's a barf bag hanging from the instrument panel. Please don't barf. If you must, get your oxygen mask off quickly, 'cause it'll be a real mess for you to clean out."

"Yes, sir." I started thinking, please don't barf.

We taxied out and swung into a 90° turn to line up for takeoff. I was shoved back against my seat as the pilot pushed the throttle forward. The jet rose into a beautiful blue sky with a few puffy, cumulous clouds scattered around. For several minutes, I enjoyed the ride.

"Okay, cadet. We've reached our assigned altitude. This is called a Flight Orientation. I'll take you through some basic aerobatics. It's not just stunt flying; you gotta know these for when you're in combat."

"This is called a barrel roll. It's like tracing a path around the inside of a barrel while it's lying on its side." The nose of the plane rose, and we began to roll over. So did my stomach.

I looked up, and there was the ground. It was not a comforting sight, but we rolled out and swooped down and up to fly straight and level again. Whew, I thought. Thank God that's over.

"Do you know what a loop is?" Lt. Brown asked.

"Yes, sir. I've seen it in the movies."

"Okay, now we're gonna do the opposite. It's called an outside loop." The nose of the plane dropped, and down we went, rounding out to fly upside down and curling up and around to finish the loop. The force of gravity lifted me off the seat and pressed me against my shoulder harness. I felt disoriented watching the sky disappear. The ground rose above my head and vanished as the sky filled the canopy.

My stomach spoke to me. *Don't barf. Don't barf.* I gritted my teeth and stared hard at the cockpit floor.

Lt. Brown asked, "You okay back there?"

I was afraid to open my mouth and mumbled, "Yes, sir," through clenched teeth.

"Now we'll do a spin." The nose of the plane rose, and Lt. Brown throttled back. The plane began shuddering, and he dropped the nose and put us into a spin. Down we went. The ground swirled by. I watched the same scenery spin by over and over. I thought, *enough*, and then we leveled off.

"Okay, cadet, so much for boring, basic aerobatics. Let's shake the kinks out of this old bird and see if we can do a falling leaf. This is off the books, so don't tell anybody. Okay?"

What do you mean "if"? My stomach lurched.

"Okay, here we go. I'm pulling the nose up, and I'm reducing power. Feel the shuddering? We're stalling out, so I'll drop the nose, and down we go. Now, I'll alternate rudder pressure and rock us back and forth while we fall. That'll keep us from rolling into a spin."

We began zigzagging down like a falling leaf, sliding first to the left, then to the right, then to the left, and then to the right. The horizon was shifting and tilting. I stared at the floor again. *Is this guy trying to make me barf*? Brown applied power, and we pulled out to straight and level.

"Okay, cadet, what'cha think of your ride?"

I didn't know what to say. "It was great, sir. Thank you, sir."

"Okay, it's back to base we go." We cruised along, and I relaxed, looking around the sky. It was beautifully clear, and I could see a blue fringe off to my left, the Gulf of Mexico. I enjoyed the ride. Soon, we flew lower, and, with a thump and a bump, we were down and taxied back to the run-up pad.

I walked away from the jet and was surrounded by my squadron mates. They were chattering like kids at a Christmas party. "How was it?" "Did you do any loops?" "Did you barf?"

"It was great," I said. "We really burned a hole in the sky. You'll love it."

MEETING MY POW


My prized possession

When I was in my early teens, like many others, I purchased a silver metal bracelet engraved with the name of a Vietnam POW and the date of his capture. At the time, I was attending Rincon Valley Junior High in Santa Rosa, CA. The bracelet was either two or three dollars, purchased from a group working to get our POWs and MIAs home.

The name of my POW was Paul Galanti, who was serving in the Navy and captured on June 17, 1966. This information was engraved on the bracelet, which I faithfully wore, even when my mom said I needed to take it off when showering. I told her, "No, they said we should not take it off until they return home."

When the troops started coming home in 1973, imagine my surprise as I was passing by the newsstand at my local grocery store and saw a picture of a returned POW and his wife on the cover of *Newsweek* magazine. It was *my* POW! I was so excited to see his

picture and name on the cover. I wrote him a letter, which I assume was sent to a veteran's office.

Fast forward a few years later. When the internet became available, I found Paul Galanti online and sent him a note. I learned that many people who had worn bracelets returned them either to the POW or their military branch. I wanted to contact him to tell him once again how happy I was that he had returned and to offer him the bracelet. He wrote a very nice letter back and insisted I keep it. I thought about him many times over the years and hoped all was well.

As I was planning a recent trip to see my son, Matt, who is serving in the Navy in Washington, DC, I thought I would do another search for Paul Galanti. I found a wonderful interview on a CBS station in Virginia and reached out to the reporter, Greg McQuade. Greg has a series called "Heroes Among Us," and I shared my story with him. He, in turn, reached out to Paul and put us in touch with each other. I can't even begin to describe what that call was like. And to top it off, Greg wanted to get us together once I arrived in Washington, DC, to do a story. But more than the story, I just wanted to meet Paul Galanti.

In May 2023, I went on the Camino de Santiago hike from Portugal to Spain before heading to Washington, DC. At the time, I already knew I was going to be seeing my son in Washington, DC, and meeting Paul Galanti. I brought the bracelet with me and wore it for the entire trip. I even carried it in my fanny pack on the Camino hike. For 50-plus years, that bracelet has been with me.

We finally met on May 25, 2023. As you can imagine, it was emotional. And what a terrific guy. Funny, kind, and empathetic are just a few of the words I would use to describe him. It was a day I will never forget. It was extra special that my son was there to meet Paul, and it was one of the most memorable moments of my life.



Pulte Desert Retreat

In the past, the problem was getting electric power to this development. Now, a new substation has been approved, and the equipment has been ordered. Because of supply chain problems, it will take at least a couple of years to get this running. Pulte will probably begin grading land and building infrastructure in the fourth quarter of 2024. There is enough power to build the models and possibly a few more homes. This won't happen for at least a year, though.

Jefferson-Varner Corners

Circle K is open, and there is great interest in the other three corners. Developers are attracted not only

by the housing coming online but also by the easy access from the freeway. Tens of thousands of cars pass by every day, and the City hopes that people will stop here, spend some money, and then be on their way. Our residents will be happy to know that a small grocery store is probably going to be one of the developments.

Varner Road from Jefferson to Monroe

One developer has assembled all the land there and is planning a large mixed-use development. The developer will present an overview of plans at the next City Planning Commission meeting. Residents can follow this by going to the City's website. About 200 acres are involved, so many different things will be proposed. The developer will build its own power substation.

Monroe-Varner Corners

In-N-Out Burger, Raising Canes, and Sumo Dog franchises are under construction now. More will be coming because there is lots of interest.

Large Pads by Walmart

Walmart may build a fuel station similar to Costco's. This will be helpful because studies show that Indio is losing lots of money to neighboring cities because we don't have enough gas stations.

This is a good time to remind our readers that it's important that we shop local. The largest component of Indio's revenue is sales tax, and that's where the money comes from to fund the improvements we want.

Jackson and 42nd Streets

The northeast corner, which currently has an Arco and an AutoZone, will also be the site of new Chick-fil-A and Dutch Brothers Coffee outlets. There are pads for sit-down restaurants, so be watching for announcements. The City Golf Course (The Lights) is getting a new clubhouse, so the opportunity to have dinner and golf will be nice.

The southeast corner currently has a new Handel's Homemade Ice Cream store, and Jersey Mike's will open there soon. The adjacent hotel is nearing completion, and there is a new El Pollo Loco. The northeast pad, next to Five Below, will have new Skechers and Tillys franchises. The northwest corner where Walgreens is will house one of the new cannabis locations the City has approved.

Downtown

College of the Desert has opened its childcare development building, where students can drop off their kids while they are in class. A second building (which will house classrooms, study areas, and a student union) is 80% completed.

The new library and City Hall are under construction. A performance venue (Centerstage) is being built at the corner of Smurr and Miles, which will become a focal point for Downtown. Two new restaurants, Indio Taphouse and Victoria's, opened recently, and two more are coming within weeks.

Downtown Indio used to be "the hub of the valley," and we are making progress toward returning to that. There is a monthly concert series, and a farmers market is open every Saturday.

CHEF'S CORNER CHEF JOHN DUTRA | EXECUTIVE CHEF

Springtime is in full swing and brings with it many fantastic seasonal vegetables. One of my favorites is asparagus. I can't wait for this time of year when you find local California-grown asparagus. It has so much more flavor than the product you find out of season. I grew up eating a lot of it when I was young, as it was one of my mom's and grandparents' favorites. Back then, I would smother it with mayonnaise and loved every bite. As I got older and became culinary savvy, I came to enjoy just the pure flavor of it.

I use asparagus in all kinds of applications, from pasta dishes to some of my favorite chicken dishes. One dish I like for breakfast is my asparagus and potato frittata. I use Yukon Gold potatoes and Gruyère

Asparagus and Yukon Gold Potato Frittata

1 tablespoon olive oil

- 8-10 asparagus stalks, depending on size (more if they are thin, less if they are thick)
- 8 large eggs
- 5 Yukon Gold potatoes sliced very thin (leave the skin on or peel, your preference)
 1 medium tomato, seeded & diced into small pieces
 2 medium-sized shallots sliced thinly, then chopped
 1½ cup Gruyère cheese, shred and divide in half
 1 tablespoon fresh chopped parsley
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Preheat the oven to 375 degrees.
- Prepare all your vegetables before assembling your frittata. Slice the potatoes as thinly as possible.
 Blanch asparagus in salted boiling water for 90 seconds to two minutes, then shock them in ice water to stop the cooking process. Cut the cooled asparagus into 1- to 2-inch pieces.

cheese, which takes the frittata to a whole new level. There is nothing better than sitting on the patio on a beautiful spring morning having breakfast with my wife, and enjoying a flavor-filled frittata.

- Crack the eggs and beat together with salt, pepper, and parsley. Once beaten, add half the Gruyère cheese and mix.
- Heat the olive oil in an oven-safe skillet. Add the shallots and potatoes, cooking until the shallots are soft and the potatoes have slightly browned and softened.
- Add the egg mixture, asparagus, and tomatoes to the skillet with the potatoes and cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until the eggs begin to set. Once the mixture becomes slightly firm when you shake the skillet, remove from the heat and top with the remaining Gruyère cheese. Then place in the oven for about 12 minutes. The top will brown slightly. Remove and allow to cool slightly before serving.



Summer Transition – What is it?

Winter overseeding in the Coachella Valley is a standard process that occurs in the fall. It allows golf courses to reopen at the start of each season with a winterized Ryegrass playing condition. By definition,

Overseeding is a process on the golf course in which Ryegrass seed is spread onto existing Bermudagrass turf. Overseeding, also known as top seeding, promotes new growth and can be used to swap out existing turf or dormant turf. A typical example of overseeding is when Bermudagrass goes dormant and is swapped with Ryegrass.

As temperatures begin to rise, the overseeded Ryegrass dies off, and in the warmer season, Bermudagrass comes out of dormancy. This typically occurs during the months of May and June and is called the "Summer Transition." Weather permitting, both the North and South courses will be fully transitioned into Bermudagrass by early July.

This process is normal and will present some visible and distinct changes to the golf course in the coming weeks. As the Bermudagrass comes out of dormancy, it will be the prominent playing surface during the summer months leading up to the overseed process again in the fall. Visible changes to the golf course during the "summer transition" will be the greening up of the rough areas and "thin" areas in the fairways and greens as the Ryegrass dies off and the Bermudagrass fills in. Although it may look abnormal, this "transition" is usual and expected. We will be moving into our golf shop summer hours of operation:

EFFECTIVE MAY 13

- North Course Golf Shop: 6 am 1 pm
- South Course Golf Shop: 6 am 2 pm EFFECTIVE JUNE 1
- North Course Golf Shop: 6 am 12 pm
- South Course Golf Shop: 6 am 1 pm EFFECTIVE AUGUST 1
- North Course Golf Shop: 6 am 11 am
- South Course Golf Shop: 6 am 12 pm

Closing hours of operation may change because of "High Heat Indexes."

Effective May 1, we will go back to a "Single Tee" consecutive tee time start on the South Course. This will continue through the summer months except for an "Open Play" shotgun each Saturday. Contact the golf shop for more details.

The South Course driving range will be closing when the golf shop closes except on Wednesdays, when mowing maintenance is performed. All players must register in the golf shop before the golf shop closing times. After-hours play is not allowed.

Tip of the Month: Spin it

The best training aid for generating more spin on your chip shots is your golf bag. Lay it on the ground two feet in front of the ball and across your target line. Hit chips over the bag using your sand wedge. The bag's proximity to the ball will force you to hit down on the ball sharply and with lots of acceleration—two keys for creating max short-game spin. Try this and learn to save strokes around the green.


